Notes from the Minister

Community Justice Project Update

The Paint Branch Community Social Justice Project is a year long project designed to discern a focus for the congregation's long-term justice work. We will get to know the people who live and work near the church and the issues affecting them, the organizations already working on these issues and where our neighbors think we can best partner with them.

Paint Branch minister Rev. Rachel Christensen and community minister Rev. Karen Lee Scrivo have met several times this summer to plan out this project. We have prepared a Project Plan, established our initial time line and detailed steps for implementation. The Project Plan is a work in progress and will be adjusted and revised throughout the year. We have prepared articles for the Branches, met with DARTT, SAC and the Board of Trustees. We met with former DMRE Carla Miller before she left. Karen has researched other grant opportunities and we are submitting our first grant application in mid-September.

Susannah Schiller has agreed to serve as the chair of the Steering Committee for the project. The Steering Committee will be guiding the project and inviting input and engagement of interested members of the congregation throughout the project. There will be many short and long-term opportunities for all ages to be part of this transformative approach to justice work during the church year. Watch for specific details in the coming months.

The project is aimed at approaching social justice work in a different way, taking time to discern a focus for future congregational justice work and provide opportunities for all ages. In addition, Karen and Rachel will encourage strengthening of our individual spiritual reflection practices to better sustain ourselves and our justice work.

We will start by getting to know the area around the church. We'll look at the physical boundaries, the major institutions and gathering places as well as the most recent census data. We will then talk to people in the neighborhood to learn about the issues they are facing, the organizations working on those issues and areas where the congregation might effectively partner with those most directly affected.

In addition, we will also be looking at the congregation's social justice history. Where has Paint Branch shown up in the past?

Board Chair Musings

On August 17-18, the board met for a summer retreat. We were fortunate to have Hope Johnson, UUA congregational life consultant, to help develop the agenda and lead us for our weekend of activities. With her help, we worked through a series of activities focused on a reaffirmation of the board covenant, outline process for good board discussions and communications, and then closed the second day telling the story of the church, both its past and what we hoped to see in the future. In the end, the Board created a long list of things we identified as needing to do based on our weekend discussion.

On Tuesday, two days later, the Board met again for our regular meeting. We discussed options for how to organize the leadership of our group, deciding on having one Chair and two vice-chairs. Elections followed. Noel Monardes and Marguerite Summers were elected as vice-chairs and I was elected as board chair for a second year. Social Action Committee

In our effort to coordinate and encourage the efforts of the PBUUC community to bring about a more just society, the Social Action Committee (SAC) meets monthly to find ways PBUUC can work to meet the needs of disadvantaged people locally, nationally, and globally. An important and powerful way to help those who have less power than we do is to unite with like minds in a united and forceful movement.

One opportunity we will have to do that in September is to join the InterFaith Conference of Metropolitan Washington (IFC) in their annual unity march. The IFC, created in 1978, brings together eleven historic faith communities to promote dialogue, understanding, and a sense of community and to work cooperatively for justice throughout the DC region (read more at https://itemw.org/events/).

On Sunday, September 16, the IFC will hold its 13th Annual Interfaith Unity Walk. "Each September, we walk along 'Embassy Row' on Massachusetts Ave., NW, and visit houses of worship and other religious centers in a public celebration of solidarity among different faiths and cultures in our region." Walkers will meet at the Washington Hebrew Congregation, 3935 Macomb St NW, Washington, DC 20016. Special performers include The Cathedral Band and more. The walk is scheduled for 1:45 pm to 6:00 pm. Of course, not all are expected to walk the entire route or for the entire 4+ hours. At SAC's August 18 meeting, we decided to support the Interfaith Unity Walk by showing up for it. It's not likely that we will be marching the entire time; two of our marchers plan to cover part of the walk in a wheelchair. We hope for pleasant fall weather and we plan to walk with our PBUUC banner. We are asking anyone who wants to participate to meet in the church parking lot at 12:45 pm that Sunday. The Paint Branch Community Learning Center (CLC) Wants You! The CLC is about to begin its Fall Semester of offering English classes to adults in our community. Volunteers are needed to:

TEACH. In teams of two, using a Co-Teacher model. Training/Orientation will be held Saturday, September 8 in the morning. Classes begin Sunday, September 16 and continue through Sunday, December 30 from 1:15 to 3:15. All materials and lesson plans are provided. There are usually four classes: two beginning, one intermediate, and one advanced.

What justice work does the church now feel called to do? We'll be talking to longtime members as well as newer members about the congregation's past and present justice work and visions for moving forward together. From there, we will begin to discern possibilities for the congregation's justice work in the future.

The project is generously supported by a \$2,500 grant from the congregation's Legacy Fund and matching contributions from individual Paint Branch members and friends. Additional funding is being sought from the Unitarian Universalist Association's Funding Program as well as other UU sources.

The Diversity/Anti-Racism Transformation Team, informally known as DARTT, is the lead group for facilitating antiracism and cultural diversity at PBUUC. DARTT coordinates numerous activities, both within our congregation and in the nearby community, to raise awareness about racism and to promote personal and spiritual growth. DARTT facilitates and coordinates. The actual work is the responsibility of all as expressed in the following resolution unanimously approved by the Congregation at its 2011 Annual Meeting.

"To more fully realize our Unitarian Universalist Principles, we, the Paint Branch Unitarian Universalist Church community, declare ourselves an Intentional Multicultural Congregation. Therefore, we commit ourselves, the Board of Trustees, staff, committees, affinity groups and lay leadership to inclusive actions to transform all aspects of congregational life in ways that affirm our multicultural identity as the foundation of the church's strength."

Diversity/Anti-Racism Transformation Team (DARTT) to Meet During Enrichment Hour on Sunday, September 16, 11:45 am To 12:45 pm in Kelley Room Left Side and every third Sunday thereafter. The September Meeting Focus will be a discussion about the PBUUC "home" for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, and Queer issues. A related issue will be a discussion/decision about recertification as a Welcoming Congregation. PBUUC was certified as a Welcoming Congregation to LBGTQ folks in 1994, using a curriculum guide developed by the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA). The UUA recommends periodic renewal. Come to the September 16 meeting and be part of this discussion. DARTT is hosting this meeting as a forum for open discussion and not making any statements about the LBGTQ portfolio.
