# REGARDING MULTI-PLATFORM WORSHIP PLANNING AND IMPLEMENTATION

From Reverend Lynn

Speaking of new challenges and joys, the staff and I have been in dialogue about how to move toward multiplatform worship in a safe and gradual way that follows guidelines in place for our congregation and is in step with other UU congregations. No area UU church is yet fully open for worship. Each faces different challenges with varying financial, staffing, and volunteer resources.

At its monthly meeting on June 22nd, the Board passed the following motion: (approximate wording)

Rev. Lynn will establish a Multiplatform Coordinating Team to develop staged plans for reopening. The Team will include representatives from the Worship Associates, the Continuity Committee, tech teams (multiplatform and Zoom), staff, the Board, and BAG. The goal it to aim

for a multiplatform service from the Sanctuary on July 18th and to notify congregation frequently of updates as the situation changes.

I will convene a Working Group with representatives from staff, Worship Associates, Pastoral Care Associates, tech teams, the Continuity Committee, the Multiplatform Worship Team, the Board, and other committees as needed. We hope to meet early in July. The current recommendation from the Multiplatform Worship Team for a staged reopening is:

Phase 1 – Week of June 26th: Test sound equipment and camera angels in the Sanctuary.

July 18th - The first multiplatform worship. Inauguration of PBUUC's multiplatform worship will happen on Rev. Lynn's last Sunday at PBUUC! ONLY worship participants and tech and Zoom team in sanctuary, everyone else at home.

Phase 2 – Service in August (date to be announced). In attendance will be tech teams, ushers, greeters, and worship participants.

Limited attendance of congregation (approximately 25 preregistered families).

Phase 3 – September 12th, Ingathering Service – The development of this worship will be created in consultation with Developmental Minister, Rev. Ann Kadlecek, who begins August 1st.

Limited pre-registered attendance.

As we work together through these phases (and more to come), please be kind to all. We are working hard to meet all of our hoped-for goals for our Worship Life together.

# **Board Chair's Column**

Good Day Paint Branch,

Summer is in full swing and here at Paint Branch we are full of anticipation for what the coming months will bring. Here is what we know so far:

- 1. <u>Ministerial Transition:</u> Rev. Lynn Strauss will give her final sermon with us on July 18th. All are invited to remain after the service as we celebrate her time with us. Please keep an eye on the ContinUUm for additional details. Rev. Ann Kadlecek will give her first sermon with us on August 8th. Please join us as we welcome her to Paint Branch.
- 2. A New Deck: Work is underway to replace our deck. We currently anticipate, barring unforeseen delays, a new deck will be in place by the end of 2021. Until construction starts, we will continue to use our current deck only as a corridor. No congregating is allowed. This is for the safety of all. Thank you for your understanding and cooperation.
- 3. <u>Possible Other Improvements:</u> The Board of Trustees has authorized a mortgage amount that could, in addition to funding the deck replacement, cover other needed repairs -- replacing the leaky roof, upgrading the HVAC system for improved ventilation, and renovation of the meeting house bathrooms are some possibilities.
- 4. <u>Multi-Platform Programming:</u> A team of dedicated volunteers is currently working to make sure that we can maintain a virtual worship presence even as we resume in-person services and activities. As we consider our next steps of returning to our facilities, we know that it can't be just as it was. Many of us have come to expect and even enjoy some elements of our virtual experience. We have also realized that offering multiple paths and timelines towards returning and engaging both now and in the future is a way to live into our values, to respect the worth and dignity of all within our community.

- 5. Intentionally Slow Resumption of In Person Activities: Many of us are anxious to return to our Meeting House to be together again and to welcome our community to use our facilities as well. And at the same time, there are still vulnerable groups, both in our congregation and the wider community, for whom a full resumption of in person operations poses a unique risk. These include our children under 12 who cannot yet be vaccinated and those whose health may prevent them taking full advantage of vaccinations. We will move on a timeline of reopening that honors inclusivity and safety for all and provides time to implement the logistics of a multi-platform reality. With this in mind, July will include:
  - a. Increased coordination of lay leaders from Worship, Tech, Pastoral Care, and other key areas to work with the Minister to plan logistics for a phased return.
  - b. Bringing additional worship participants into the Meeting House for selected Sunday Services.
  - c. A congregational survey regarding readiness in the community for gathering again in person.
  - d. A BOT public comments opportunity during coffee hour on July 25th dedicated to resumption of in person gatherings.
  - e. Consideration by the BOT at the July business meeting of updated recommendations provided by the Continuity Committee related to guidelines for staff, rentals, and other small gatherings.

Moving forward from there, we remain hopeful that we can offer some level of true Ingathering related to the service on September 12th and are currently planning for an in-person Auction on November 13th. As with all events at this time, they are tentative and hopeful plans, dependent on the continued reduction of pandemic conditions, the logistics of multi-platform programming, and the evolving status of the deck.

And as I close, I would like to once again thank outgoing members Ebony Contreras, Wendy Schlegel, and Sabrina Jones for their service, particularly during this year of so many transitions in the life of our congregation. And welcome to incoming Board members Muriel Morisey, Abi Hanley, and Patty Daukantas. I look forward to working with you in this coming year. May it be a bright year for Paint Branch.

Now, I'm not entirely sure about the God part, but I am convinced of the scandalous grace part. And what if scandalous grace was a spiritual practice? What would that look like for me? For you? For us as a community?

I imagine it would start with curiosity. Staying open to the possibilities that lie within a person. Putting down defensiveness and assumptions for the duration of a conversation. What might we learn? What could happen if we made a spiritual practice of curiosity?





# RACIAL CLIMATE AT PBUUC AND "WIDENING THE CIRCLE" IN THE DENOMINATION: AN INTERIM REPORT AND WHERE WE WILL GO FROM HERE

The change of the church year is a good time to take stock of where Paint Branch Unitarian Universalist Church is and where our faith community might go next to improve the racial climate in our congregation and the denomination.

The following reviews our recent history in prioritizing anti-racism, outlines what's happening on the PBUUC journey now, and suggests where we might go in the future.

Since chartered in 2007, the Diversity/Anti-Racism Transformation Team (DARTT) has led the work of anti-racism in our community. It initiated the annual Kwanzaa Service (2007); urged our congregation to resolve to be an intentional multicultural community (2011); and ensured the community's decision to install the Black Lives Matter banner on our property (2017). DARTT members also played the leading role in our congregation's June 6th adoption of the 8th Principle that calls on us to journey:

toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions.

DARTT will continue to champion this work; however, PBUUC needs to establish the structures and build the relationships that will make us more accountable to each other so that anti-racism is part of our congregation's DNA.

This spring the Board of Trustees established a Racial Climate Leadership Team (RCLT) consisting of members of the former Conflict Transformation Team and the Board's Thriving Congregations workgroup.

The RCLT's purpose is to convene members to address the issues of race-related conflict in our community identified by our consultants in the PBUUC Racial Climate Assessment Report. This group includes Carol Boston, Carol Carter Walker, Ebony Contreras, Deb Rubenstein, and Paul Wester.

Earlier this spring Chris McCann, PBUUC's director of Religious Education, organized a covenant group of PBUUC members to study "Widening the Circle of Concern: Report of the UUA Commission on Institutional Change." Through an action/study guide, the report lays bare the theological, organizational, and cultural challenges in communities like ours and the larger denomination. Generations of overt and systemic racism, as well as other forms of oppression, infuse these areas of challenge.


The inaugural PBUUC Widening the Circle study group will conclude its biweekly study sessions in August and report on its experience, lessons learned, and potential next steps for structured reflection and action.

Also in August, Deb Rubenstein and Paul Wester will start a new Widening the Circle study group to deepen and extend these conversations in our community. This will be a community-wide opportunity for members with energy and interest. Sign-up announcements will be made in the July and August ContinUUms and Branches.

With support from Chris McCann and Reverend Ann Kadlecek, PBUUC's incoming Developmental Minister, the RCLT will convene a Racial Climate Coalition. The coalition will organize activities that address challenges outlined in the "Widening the Circle of Concern" report and the PBUUC Racial Climate Assessment -- activities consistent with the PBUUC goals for developmental ministry.

Some Racial Climate Coalition activities will be discrete, stand-alone events, like training around the intersection of diversity, equity, and inclusion, and welcoming new members. Others will be larger, ongoing community activities, like covenanting to hold ourselves accountable to be anti-racist and build our Beloved Community consistent with the 8th Principle. There will be opportunities for groups like DARTT and others, and for individual members, too. It will likely be messy as we learn together, but the work is necessary for our community and denomination.

The RCLT will provide more information about organizing the Racial Climate Coalition in later July and August as we enter the new church year with Reverend Kadlecek.
