From Rev. Russ Savage:

The New Year provides us the opportunity to say farewell to things from the past and embrace the new things which are now only in formation. This is certainly the case for PBUUC this New Year! When it became clear she would not be back for a while, I was asked to step in and fill the gap for a time.

We've all seen Diane's progress recently. She has visited services several times, walked to the front and lit the chalice recently, and took part in one of the demonstrations seeking racial justice in our country. In January, Diane plans to take a more substantial part in a worship service. She and I are planning on co-preaching the stewardship sermon on Sunday, March 8; and Diane aims to preach the sermon on her own on a Sunday in April. Then she will begin to try out what additional ministerial duties she can begin to take on. I'm ready to step back at any time, making space for Diane to do as little or as much of the work of PBUUC's ministry as she feels is right for her.



As the New Year unfolds, keep sending healing thoughts to Diane and good vibrations to PBUUC.

From Rev. Diane Teichert:

On Tuesday December 2, I walked, without a cane for the first time at home, for about 125 feet! I was thrilled, and I was thrilled again to see on the video of it that my left knee was bending a little. That's a thrilling change!

That week was a very full and notable week of transition toward independence for other reasons as well. It was the last week on the job for wonderful full-time home health aide, household helper, dog walker, driver, personal trainer, exercise supervisor and all-around good companion. She has started a new job, which I think will be a good opportunity for her; and good for me, too, because I no longer need as much assistance as I did when she started in mid-June, and full-time assistance was very costly. But, I really do miss her company!

Instead, we hired a first-year college student for just a few hours in the morning as a household helper. Coincidentally, her mother is the minister of a church in our neighborhood! I'm organizing volunteer drivers to outpatient therapy appointments and elsewhere as needed via https://can.lotsahelpinghands.com/c/716747/. Please feel free to sign-up if you might like to help.

And, I am interviewing for a personal trainer to help me keep up with my exercises when I don't have therapy. These changes signify for me that I am stepping up for the challenge of self-managing more complexity in my life.

In another example of transition planning, on Tuesday, December 2 (that was an unusually full day for me!)... With Rev. Russ Savage, PBUUC's Interim Caretaker Minister (ICM) and the Committee on Ministry, we developed a very gradual series of "stepping-stones" for me to return to minimal work duties: dates in the winter months on which I will do more than just "visit" on one Sunday morning each month, but will take minor roles of increasing responsibility in the service itself.

The first of those was December 14, when I lit the chalice flame, symbol of Unitarian Universalism. This required me to rise and walk to the front of the Meetinghouse (with my cane), for the first time in public, with over a hundred people watching. Upon returning home afterwards, I had to laugh when I discovered that my fleece cardigan had been buttoned crookedly all morning! I thank anyone who noticed for not telling me at the time.

If all goes well with these stepping-stones, I aim to copreach with the ICM on March 8th for Stewardship Sunday, and preach by myself for the first time in April. The "what" and "when" of resuming other ministerial duties are yet to be determined and the ICM will continue in his current capacity until they are.

These transitions are both exciting and trepidating! (is that even a word???!)

I continue to feel deeply grateful for the ongoing care and

support I receive from the congregation and its lay leaders and staff!

I look forward to seeing you more often on Sundays!

Board of Trustees Column

We are approaching the New Year. It's an artificial construct, this beginning of a new year, but it does give us a set time to look back and look forward at the same time. The Board set a vision for this Church Year and we've accomplished a few things. The Board wanted to investigate starting small group worship at the Church and decided that the middle of a ministerial transition is not a good time. We've added this to the Parking Lot to take back up in the future. Thanks to the energies of Dayna Edwards, our Multigenerational Director of Religious Exploration, the Church is improving it's inter-generational activities.

Some items on our Vision need your support and help. The Board would like to craft a 5 Year Plan for Financial Stability. What does that mean? That means taking a good look at where the Church is now in terms of finances, stewardship, and staff. Then coming up with a Vision for where we'll be in 5 years and working with the Board, Committees, and Congregation to establish Goals and Steps to get there. Some items under our 5 Year Plan include returning to being a full Fair Share Congregation and Fair Compensation for our Staff. Where do you imagine PBUUC over the next few years? If interested, please contact me.

Second, the Board realized we need to re-establish our Personnel Committee. We need a dedicated group of 3-5 individuals to review and propose personnel policies, help with Staff reviews, make recommendations on compensation and benefits, and be available to mediate in situations where appropriate. This is for all staff except the Minister, who falls under the Committee on Ministry. Do you have experience in hiring, office management or administration, good interpersonal skills, or have served as a manager? If so, the Board needs you! Please contact John Barr if you'd like to help.

Third, our sound system isn't the greatest. We'd like to fix that. However, no one on the Board has any experience or expertise in Audio/Visual systems. Do you know something about how to set up or run an AV system? Do you have experience as a stage tech? If so, please contact Peter Dowling. We'd really like to have a sound system that is clear and works for everyone.

Fourth, the Building and Grounds Committee (BAG) will be doing a review of the Church from the perspective of accessibility. The Board wants to know if there are any changes we need to make for our buildings to be friendly to everyone visiting our Church. If you have any ideas, then contact Lowell Owens, Chair of BAG. Finally, the Annual Town Hall is in early February. Look for announcements coming soon. The Agenda right now consists of presentations on the Board Vision, Accessibility (if we can), the Budget Process, and Ministerial Transition.

"Caretaker" Ministry Nurtures Both Our Congregation and Our Minister!

The past eight months have been a period of transition in the ministry at Paint Branch. The BOT's quick action to hire Rev. Russ Savage as our "Interim Caretaker" Minister, along with the work of our wonderful Worship Associates have preserved continuity in this time of uncertainty. Here's a snapshot of what the COM and the ministers are doing to ensure that the ministry continues to nurture the congregation.

The COM's monthly meetings with the Minister have included both Russ and Diane since August. As a group, we have discussed Diane's gradual return to the congregation, so that it is manageable for her, yet supportive of our community. Each month Diane's recovery has progressed and she has become more certain of when and how she can return to the ministry.

At this point, the COM is looking forward to continuing this transition through the winter. We will be following a gradual series of "stepping stones" that Diane has identified in conjunction with Russ and the COM. One Sunday each month in the winter months, Diane will do more than just visit, taking minor roles of increasing responsibility in the service itself. Our hope, if all goes well, is that she and Russ will co-preach at a service in March and that Diane will preach a service on her own sometime in April.

Our congregation is very fortunate to have an Interim Caretaker Minister who is taking good care of the congregation and uplifting us with thought-provoking services. Throughout this process, Russ has been wonderfully flexible in supporting and encouraging Diane to do as much as she is ready for.

The Committee on Ministry (COM) serves to nurture the ministry and the spiritual health of the congregation. Current members are John Bartoli, Susannah Schiller, and Sabrina Jones. Stress Relief and being a Multigenerational Church

How many times have you thought to yourself, "why didn't they teach me THAT in school," or "I wish I knew that when I was younger"?

Take a moment and close your eyes, and imagine what you would say to yourself, if you could speak to a younger version of yourself?

Now open your eyes, because I want to share something with you. The younger version of yourself is sitting on a couch in Room One of the RE Building on Sunday mornings. The younger version of yourself is also pretty wise already and thoughtful and ambitious. Yes, our youth are, in many ways, the younger versions of ourselves, since we are all connected. Their challenges and stressors might be slightly different, but they are trying to make sense of the world, much as you did as an adolescent. While we have to watch them make their own mistakes and struggle with the consequences of their own decisions, we as members of their faith community have a unique opportunity **to minister** to our youth in a way that teachers, parents, family members and friends can't.

What does it mean to minister (as a verb) to our youth? The Webster's Dictionary defines the verb to minister as, "to give aid or service." Our youth have said they want, from their faith community, skills that they may not be gaining elsewhere: leadership training and stress-relief services. Imagine if someone had taught you how to relieve stress in a healthy, effective way in high school. Imagine if someone had not just thrust you into a leadership position, but instead had given you real skills in listening and conflict resolution before you got to college. Perhaps someone did teach you stress relief and leadership skills. Lucky you! We as a faith community can give aid or service, we can minister to our youth, by sharing the skills and wisdom that we've spent years fig-



uring out on our own and with the help of teachers. Ministering to our youth is also an act of social justice. It equips our young people with the healthy coping skills they will need as the older

generations pass the proverbial torch of creating the Beloved Community.

Let's minister to our youth as a congregation, because we are uniquely capable of doing so. Pick one Sunday and one skill, activity, or hands-on workshop that you can share with our youth and use the link to sign up for a date to minister to our youth: http://tinyurl.com/refacilitators. Once you sign up, I will be in contact with you to talk about logistics. Popular workshops/services that have already taken place include Reiki, full-body relaxation techniques, dream interpretation, LARPing (Live Action Role Play), Non-Violent Communication, and "Being the Observer". As always, our Lead Youth Advisor, Sonny Katz or I will be present with our youth to assist you in this ministry.

I will leave you with a wondering question. I wonder, how your interactions with our youth would change if you viewed the interaction as a ministry to our youth.



Social Action Committee (SAC) News

Escalating Inequality Study Guide Focuses on Four Key Subject Areas for Congregations.

After attending a December 6th briefing on this Congregational Study/Action Issue (CSAI) selected by the UUA General Assembly for study and action from 2014 - 2018; the following highlight the study guide's four key areas for congregational engagement in the escalating inequality in our country. They range from the personal to local, state, national, and global levels and involve both education and ideas for action in partnership with other organizations. SAC and our Economic Justice Coordinator, Deb Rubenstein, will continue work on this issue with Paint Branchers - as together we reflect and explore our on-going commitment to make a difference in this critical area. The four subject areas are; 1) Class and Classism - as we expand our ability to build relationships across class differences. 2.) Economic Inequality: Its Roots and Realities; 3) Inequality, Class, and Our Congregation; and 4) Interrupting Cycles of Inequality – as we discover and offer to wider communities what is most deeply true about ourselves.

As an example of our learning together, Marge Owens has been our PB bookseller on this issue. Thanks Marge! Already many of us have copies of the book Billionaires' Ball: Gluttony and Hubris in an Era of Epic Inequality by Linda McQuaig and Neil Brooks. And Marge is ready to place another order if there's interest. Deb R. has been in touch via e-mail about when is the best timing for setting up a January book discussion following the holidays. Learn About Upcoming Maryland Legislation

Please come to a meeting about protecting the environment, sponsored by our own Green Team and the UU Legislative Ministry of Maryland. Brooke Harper of the Chesapeake Climate Action Network (CCAN) will present a power point program about some important legislation to be introduced in the Maryland General Assembly this winter. The Maryland Climate Coalition (which includes many local environmental groups (Sierra Club, Environment Maryland, UULM-MD and more) are pushing for a higher renewable portfolio standard (RPS). This bill will raise the proportion of our power that must come from wind and solar from 20 % by 2020 to 40% by 2025. Join us during Enrichment Hour on January 11. A light lunch will be available.
