

Board of Trustees Column

Fellow Members,

My many thanks to everyone who participated in the Cottage Meetings on Ministerial Transitions. By my last count, 82 members participated. The Board and Committee on Ministry sincerely appreciate all of the thoughtful and discerning feedback and discussions held. We meet on Tuesday, March 24 to craft a recommendation for the Church Members to vote on at the Special Congregational Meeting on Sunday, April 26, 2015. The recommendation will be mailed to Members along with the official notice of the Meeting around April 6th.

The Special Congregational Meeting will be Sunday, April 26, 2015 from Noon - 1 pm and will be conducted as other Congregational Meetings. The only item on the Agenda is a Membership Vote on the proposed recommendation. The voting will be by closed, written ballot and counted by all three members of the Board Executive Committee. The Board is deciding at our next meeting what percentage of vote is required to be binding. For everyone's awareness, the Bylaws only require a majority decision by a quorum of the Voting Members. The Bylaws (Section VII) define a quorum as "one-tenth of the members entitled to vote at any such meeting, but not less than thirty."

Proxies will be available from the Secretaries in the meeting house for the two weeks before the Special Congregational Meeting. By our bylaws (VII): "A member who will be absent from the meeting and wishes to vote may notify the secretary in writing in advance of the meeting of such intent and may appoint another member to vote as proxy. A member may service as proxy for only one other member at that meeting. The secretary must have the name of the member holding the proxy."

We encourage all Members to participate in this important decision about our Ministerial Transition.


Membership Messages

Meet Marilyn Moors, Our Guest Speaker for April 12th

Marilyn Moors spent her early years in Massachusetts, growing up in the Universalist church, graduating from Tufts University with a B.A. major in religion and minor in sociology. She received an M.A. in anthropology from The George Washington University and received two National Endowment for the Humanities grants to study Latin American Economic History and Central American History.

For over thirty years, she was a professor, first at Montgomery College, then at Frostburg State University. When she retired to her farm in western Maryland in 1990, the beauty of the area deepened her understanding of the need for conservation and protection of natural resources and places. She joined the Sierra Club and has been active in the western Maryland group Citizen Shale. She is also a writer and editor, primarily of material dealing with Central America and Guatemala. She served on the Board of the Maya Educational Foundation for 20 years, and as Board President for the final ten, helping to distribute scholarship funds to talented Maya young people.

Marilyn is the widow of a Unitarian Universalist minister, mother of three sons, grandmother of six and great-grandmother of three. In her 'spare' time, she is an organic gardener, opera enthusiast and reader. She is a member of the UU Fellowship of Greater Cumberland, MD.

UU Lenten Practice a reflection on Cultural Appropriation

Last month, I started a Lenten practice that is being shared among Unitarian Universalists throughout the world. As I am writing this, 35 days have passed since I began this practice (because Sundays were included, there are actually 47 days in this Lenten practice.) Each day, other UUs and I use social media to post a picture or a reflection on a spiritual word, chosen by the good people at the Unitarian Universalist Association. Lent is traditionally celebrated by Christians, especially Catholics, between Ash Wednesday and Easter, as a time of prayer, fasting, and good works.

One of the first questions I received about my Lenten practice was, "Aren't you (and other UUs) appropriating a cultural tradition that is not yours?" I thought long and hard about this question. I have spent a good amount of my adult life learning about, identifying and fighting against cultural appropriation, especially in Hip Hop and indigenous cultures. So this question hit me hard.

Growing up in a culturally Catholic family (and being married to someone who identifies as Catholic), I have practiced Lent to varying degrees throughout my life, so for me, a UU Lenten practice feels right and it is part of my own cultural tradition. It is a way for me to walk on a parallel path with my family, friends, and associates without walking on the same path. It is a way for me to celebrate all I love about my own cultural heritage in a way that feels safe and authentic to me. After reflection, it seemed clear that, for me, practicing Lent was a part of my culture and could not be considered cultural appropriation.

So what about Unitarian Universalists in general? Much like me, Unitarian Universalism comes partly from a Christian heritage. One of our six sources of inspiration is explicitly outlined as, "Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbors as ourselves." Given that the teachings of Judaism and Christianity are specifically lifted up as one of our sources of the "living tradition of wisdom and spirituality," a UU Lenten practice seems not only appropriate, but necessary for some of us on an ongoing spiritual journey. In every way, this Lenten practice has brought me closer to "loving my neighbors as myself."

I am particularly grateful to the person who "called me out," on the issue of cultural appropriation. We live in community with each other for a reason: to help each other make meaning. Her question helped me get in touch with, and even celebrate a part of my cultural heritage that I sometimes dismiss. Her question grounded me in my ancestry and committed me more fully to this spiritual practice (I even called my grandmother to tell her about it.) Even more importantly, her question showed me that members of this congregation are not only thinking about cultural appropriation, we are willing to have the tough conversations surrounding it. If you would like to learn more about cultural appropriation and misappropriation, there are many fabulous resources at uua.org. Let's keep this conversation going.


