From Rev. Russ Savage:

Last month I attended the annual UU ministers' retreat at Lewes, DE. Diane was there, too, along with about 30 other UU ministers from Delaware, Pennsylvania, Maryland, DC, and northern Virginia. The program was presented by Rev. Dr. Larry Peers, who coaches and teaches pastoral excellence to ministers of many faiths (although his background is UU). I had known Larry many years ago in Boston and it was a pleasure to see him again.

Larry skillfully immersed us in two and a half days of thinking and reflecting about something we all knew anyway: that we cannot change the people we interact with, but we can always change the way we react to them. We cannot change where we have been, but we can change where we are going. With a little effort, we can work to find a new perspective from which to view our relationships and our life situation, and perhaps we can change and grow from that perspective.

It was refreshing to spend this time with colleagues and to have the luxury of contemplation apart from the usual daily concerns (even though the temptation of e-mail was ever present). Try to remember this lesson for yourself from time to time: you cannot change that irritating or troublesome person, but you can always change how you react to her or him; you cannot change your past, but you can alter the direction of your future. If you watch me closely, you may be able to see me trying to do some of these things.

I'm grateful for the support of PBUUC in underwriting my attendance at professional gatherings such as this re-

treat and the General Assembly I'll attend later this month in Portland, OR.

Fellow Members,

The Board is very happy to let you all know what we have hired an Interim Minister!

Beginning on August 1, 2015, **Reverend Evan Keely** will be our Interim Minister. Rev. Keely has previously served Unitarian Universalist Congregations in Massachusetts, Texas, New Jersey, Virginia, Pennsylvania, and Maryland, six of them as an interim minister, and has been an Accredited Interim Minister since April 2013. Rev. Keely is coming to us from Main Line Unitarian Church in Devon, PA and prior to that was as Interim Senior Minister of Cedar Lane Unitarian Universalist Church in Bethesda, Maryland. He has prior experience serving as an Interim Minister for a church whose Minister had to retire due to health reasons and is looking forward to helping us ask "Who we are?" and "What is most important to PBUUC?"

Raised on Long Island, New York, in a UU home, Evan is a graduate of Harvard Divinity School and lives in Reston, VA with his family. His wife Sarah is a psychotherapist and they have two school-aged sons. Evan and Sarah met when they were active members of a UU church, First Parish in Cambridge, MA, at a music committee meeting. Evan has a bachelor's degree in Music History from Boston University. He enjoys composing and arranging music and has been known to do some singing. He also describes himself as "an avid (but not very good) chess player."

The Board plans to have Rev. Keely as Interim Minister from August 2015 through July 2017. In accordance with standard practice for UUA congregations, Rev. Keely's contract ends in July 2015 and can be renewed for the second year if Evan and the Board agree that that is in PBUUC's best interests. Religious Exploration

Together Time and the Wonder Box

If you have attended a Sunday Service in the past two years, you may have noticed we have started having Together Time every Sunday, no matter what (even over the summer), and we have been using a Together Time method called "The Wonder Box." As we enter into the summer and the Sunday Services are lay-led, worship leaders sometimes ask if we have to use the Wonder Box or if we have to have a Together Time. The answer is yes... and no. There is no "have to" in Unitarian Universalism, with a few exceptions. So no, you don't have to have a Together Time or use the Wonder Box during Together Time. However, there are a few reasons I strongly advocate for using the Wonder Box and having Together Time every single Sunday.

Why Have Together Time Every Sunday?

The Multigenerational RE Team made the recommendation to the minister and the Worship Associates prior to last summer that PBUUC should use the Wonder Box and have Together Time every Sunday as part of our goal of being more welcoming to families and children. Having a Together Time every Sunday, ensures that each Sunday all-ages are engaged in worship in a meaningful way. It communicates to the children and youth that their presence in worship is meaningful and valuable. It helps them create a mindset of belonging in this faith community. It communicates to visitors that the congregation wants families with young children to participate in our community. It illustrates, in an experiential way, that we are a vibrant community filled with the life and energy of young people. When Together Time becomes an expected part of the PBUUC liturgy, children and youth become an expected part of the PBUUC community and that is a good thing.

Why the Wonder Box?

The Wonder Box provides a consistent framework for Together Time that can be followed by anyone who has ever told or listened to a bedtime story. It is largely considered best practice in the field of religious exploration and was featured at General Assembly in 2013. Having one item in a box can anchor the story being told and it gives the children and youth something to focus on while the story is being shared. The idea of opening a box and finding something mysterious in it contributes to the sense of wonder and awe that comes from any sacred or spiritual experience.

Why not just gather the kids together and read a book?

Again, there is no reason that you can't do this if you choose. However here are some factors to consider. Picture books are wonderful. However, there is no way for people beyond the first row to see the pictures. Those who can't see may feel left out, especially if the pictures are critical to conveying information in the story. Adults, as well as children, can gain meaning from a well told tale, no pictures necessary. Spoken stories are powerful. The tradition of oral story tell-ing is as old as humans. There is a reason people sit around and tell stories at family gatherings and around camp fires. Together Time is a part of the service where all-ages can get spiritual messages, not just children. Let's all worship together, as the name implies.

As we fully commit to becoming a multigenerational faith community, Together Time and the Wonder Box can be one of our touch stones of success. If you are leading a service and feel nervous about the Wonder Box or Together Time, please talk with me. I love matching the perfect story with the perfect service and sermon.

Everyone has heard the story of the American chestnut tree, how the Chinese chestnut was brought to America carrying a fungus to which the American chestnut had no resistance. Luckily there were a few trees showing some resistance. It was hoped these survivors may have some resistance, perhaps by a genetic mutation? By crossing these old survivors, new seedlings were produced and nurtured.

The American Chestnut Foundation now has some seedlings to give away. I contacted Bruce Levine, president of the Maryland chapter and obtained two of these young saplings. Buildings and Grounds Chair, Lowell Owens planted and protected them from deer with screening. They are about a foot-and-a-half tall. You may see them by standing out from the office door and looking up on the slope.

Social Action Committee (SAC) News



Habitat for Humanity **Special Collection Scheduled** for Sunday, June 14 Habitat for Humanity Metro Maryland (HFHMM) is working to increase the inventory of low-cost and safe housing in the Metro Maryland area. In the **Habitat** for Humanity[®] in Gaithersburg and sold them to the partner families who all construction on 19 townhomes to the partner families who all moved in before Thanksgiving. In addition, since July 1, 2014,

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they completed 15 weatherization projects with a projected annual household savings of \$451 and 13 repair projects including HVAC replacements, roof repairs, and plumbing repairs. Four of the projects were completed in Prince George's County with one scheduled to be completed in May and three in June. HFHMM is now accepting applications for additional work in Prince George's County.

HFHMM accomplished all this, and more, by bringing together, members of different faith congregations to volunteer. Churches, synagogues, mosques, other houses of worship and interfaith organizations have partnered with HFHMM to promote unity and create low-cost, energy efficient, safe, and attractive homes for low income families. For example, Annapolis area UU's will be building an entire home for a local family. HFHMM even has a program called Act! Speak! Build! Week. It is Habitat's student-initiated advocacy campaign. Act! Speak! Build! Week empowers young people to educate themselves and their communities to move toward social action. The program was developed for youth ages 5 to 25 involved with Habitat affiliates and Habitat volunteers around the world.

This past April, the members of SAC signed an HFHMM Interfaith Unity Initiative Commitment that includes:

- promoting understanding among various houses of worship across Montgomery and Prince George's Counties by embracing interfaith unity and partnership,
- participating in the Interfaith Steering Committee,
- working side-by-side with the future homeowners as they put in their time, talents, and sweat equity toward creating their new home;
- securing volunteers to work on Habitat projects and in Habitat's ReStore;
- working to secure donations to Habitat through congregational and individual giving; and,
- supporting advocacy efforts at local and states levels by participate with HFHMM in organized meetings to

hold elected officials accountable for their promises to support affordable housing.

As part of their Interfaith Unity Initiative, HFHMM's goal is to raise \$35,000 through donations and events. On Sunday, June 14, our special collection will go toward HFHMM's goal.

Maydale Conservation Park

The Green Team has been supporting the work of PBUUC member Renee Katz as a member of the community work group collaborating with Montgomery Parks to explore options for nature programming at Maydale Conservation Park in eastern Montgomery County (about 6.3 miles from Paint Branch UU Church). Montgomery Parks will be hosting a community meeting to gather input. From a recent announcement by Montgomery Parks:

Maydale Conservation Park Community Meeting Wednesday, June 10, 2015- A community meeting will be held to begin the process of formulating a communitybased vision for the future programming at Maydale Conservation Park. The first of a series of meetings will be held on Wednesday, June 10, 2015 at 7 pm at the Eastern Montgomery Regional Services Center, 3300 Briggs Chaney Rd in Silver Spring, MD 20904. The Maydale Conservation Park housed programs focused on offering young children the opportunity to learn about nature and the environment. The Nature Center building served as an orientation and instructional space until severe budgetary constraints discontinued programming and closed the building in 2008. There has been renewed interest in restoring naturecentered programming and the Department of Parks wants to obtain community input to help formulate a vision for the future use of the park.
