Minister's Column

It is not at all unusual for an explicit understanding to be intentionally formed between an interim minister and a church's former minister, especially if the former minister continues to reside in the community. So when Reverend Diane Teichert suggested that she and I form such a covenantal agreement and



share it with the congregation, I readily assented. In the course of the conversations that lead to a written document, Diane exhibited her customary thoughtfulness and wisdom.

Below is the text of the covenant between Diane and me. When the next PBUUC minister arrives, Diane will work with him or her to make a new covenant.

In the spirit of the Guidelines of the Unitarian Universalist Ministers Association to which we both belong, and always with the ongoing health of the congregation in mind:

- ➢ We acknowledge that Diane knows many PBUUC children and adults and is still held in their hearts, and they in hers. However, we agree that on-going relationships or intentional contact between her and individual congregants or staff members could impede the ministry of the congregation during the interim period. This is especially true because she obviously cannot carry on relationships with all, and so therefore should not show preference for some. We both recognize this is painful for her, and may be to some congregants.
- Diane will not attend congregational activities or accept invitations from congregants, staff, or groups within it during the interim period, or until such time that this Covenant is changed.
- ➢ If Diane receives a request for pastoral care or to officiate child dedications, weddings, or memorial services from a congregant, former congregant, or their children, she pledges to refer them to Evan. Evan will notify Diane of deaths and births in the congregation.
- Evan and Diane pledge to consult regularly and openly with one another, to support one another as colleagues and for the good of PBUUC.

We each want the congregation to have a successful ministry now and in the future; to this end we do covenant.

Board of Trustees Column

Fellow PBUUC'ers,

It seems I may have jumped the gun a little with last month's article. At this point, the Board is committed to growing Paint Branch and recognizes that we need some improvements to make our space more welcoming. Doing so may mean a capital campaign, but that is not chiseled into stone. There may be a way for us to repair the parking lot without paying for it ourselves. BAG presented information about the Prince George County Alternative Compliance Program for stormwater runoff to the Board, which involves allowing the County to install stormwater best management practices, which includes parking lot improvements! BAG is taking our questions back to the County and working to provide additional information for the November Board meeting. We have more than one option for how we can improve our facilities, hence my statement about jumping the gun. The Board did agree that a big question for Paint Branch to answer right now is to state where we currently are and then determine where do we want to go and what are the next steps for getting there.

At the October Board Meeting, there was a lengthy discussion about long term facilities needs and the parking lot with BAG. Also, we asked Rev. Evan and Tess Morrison to explore the need for a Personnel Committee and what its roles and responsibilities would be. Then, we passed guidelines for Third Party vendors to sell their goods at Paint Branch. For more information on those, please see the Finance Committee. Additionally, we decided to meet with the UUA Congregational Stewardship Consultant regarding capital campaigns and other fundraising options. Finally, DARTT sent in a recommendation regarding posting a "Black Lives Matter" banner. After much discussion, the Board concluded this was not a decision we wanted to make alone. We have asked DARTT to take the lead in hosting a congregational conversation about posting a "Black Lives Matter" banner with a vote to be held at the February Town Hall.

Finally, it is with regret that we accepted the resignation of Melody Lawrence from the Board of Trustees. We thank her for her dedication and tireless work for 3 years as Board Secretary and 2+ years as a Trustee. We are sorry to see her go for health reasons and wish her a speedy recovery.

Religious Exploration

This fall, our fourth through sixth graders are embarking on a special journey. They are taking an eight-week Our Whole Lives (OWL), human sexuality course led by two facilitators from Goodloe Memorial Unitarian Universalist Church. I have to admit, prior to becoming a professional Religious Educator, I had not thought about OWL as being more than just a "sex ed" course. After educating myself, and watching the first OWL class take place last Sunday, I can say with certainty that OWL is a sacred ministry that we can offer to the entire congregation. OWL classes are built on a culture with four basic tenants:

- \Rightarrow Responsibility.
- \Rightarrow Respect.
- \Rightarrow Relationship.
- \Rightarrow Religion.

I wonder... I wonder what would happen if people of all ages walked around living their daily lives using these four words to guide their decision making. As a religious educator, I am most interested in the fourth word: religion. Many of us are grounded in the meaning and importance of responsibility, respect and relationship. In fact, those first three words are woven into the core of our seven principles.

Since I grew up in a secular household, I sometimes still get a bit "itchy" around the word "religion." Prior to a few months ago, I might have found myself particularly "itchy" when talking about how my religion might or might not inform my sexuality. However, it is clear to me now, that most religions do relate to human sexuality in some way. Some religions shame and others celebrate human sexuality, but all religions address sex. Unitarian Universalism is no different, and OWL offers a way for us to live into our most important ideals. As Rev. Lena Breen states in her essay "Supporting Sexuality Education in Your Congregation," "to offer sexuality education in a congregation is to acknowledge that human sexuality is simply too important, too beautiful, and too potentially dangerous to be ignored in a religious community."

So, what does our religion guide us to do in relation to human sexuality? In my opinion, our religion holds us accountable to modeling for our young people how to make decisions based on our best understanding of responsibility,

respect, relationship, and religion. Our religion, leaning heavily on our humanist teachings, requires us to know the scientific facts about human sexuality so that we can articulate our beliefs about human sexuality in responsible and respectful way. Our religion pushes us to move beyond what is comfortable to support each other in community as we all grapple with our changing bodies, sexual identities, and reproductive decisions, regardless of our age.

As our 4th through 6th graders embark on the beginning of their human sexuality journey by taking OWL, I hope that our congregation will support them by thinking deeply about how each of us lives the values of respect, responsibility, relationship, and religion. I envision a time in the near future when the culture of the OWL classroom permeates through the entire congregation.

Social Action Committee (SAC) News

The October 17 SAC meeting brought an important update about the Paint Branch Community Learning Center's (PBCLC's) English classes from its coordinator Carmelita Carter-Sykes. And also great pride, as the following evening SAC members Emma Sue, Nancy, and Rene joined Rev. Keely and Carmelita's family at the UU Church of Arlington when this important Paint Branch program received the Beloved Community Award at the Gala of the Unitarian Universalists for Social Justice in the National Capital Region. UUSJ includes 25 area UU congregations and affiliate organizations such as Beacon House. So this recognition held special meaning for our Paint Branch program and all who have been a part of it since it started four terms ago! At our SAC meeting we also began the review of special collection guidelines, discussed how to best share childcare expenses between PBCLC and Religious Exploration classes, and agreed to support the upcoming book drive for a high-need school in Montgomery County that Rene and Sonny Katz are sponsoring. We also began work on updating the Social Justice brochure, agreed to meet soon with Dayna Edwards, PBUUC's Director of Religious Exploration, to plan how SAC could work with the Youth Group on social justice undertakings, and to contact Doyle Niemann who has worked in the State Attorney's office, to come and speak at Paint Branch about affordable housing issues and having paid sick leave in Prince George's County. Additionally we plan to have a speaker on the key issue of wealth inequality come soon. Other issues of concern were also briefly mentioned, to be followed up at later meetings, such as reducing gun violence, the refugee crisis in Europe and the Middle East, and specific actions we might take to work with Habitat for Humanity following our June special collection for them.

Looking ahead to future meetings - which are normally on the third Saturday morning of the month from 10 -12:30 in Room 4 of the RE Building - we'll meet next on Saturday morning, November 21. Because of all the holiday activities in December, we discussed and decided to cancel the SAC meeting on December 19. We then plan to return to our regular Saturday morning monthly meeting time and place on the following dates: January 16, 2016, February 20, 2016, March 19, 2016, April 16, 2016, May 21, 2016, and possibly June 18, 2016.

DARTT Reverberations on Race: Policing in Black and White, October 18, 2015

Have you ever heard the phrase, "don't talk about it; be about it"? You may interpret "being about it" to mean go to a demonstration, post on social media, or even boycott certain companies. Yes, these actions are doing something. However, the 18 people in attendance at the Reverberations on Race on October 18 know that "being about it" also means being in conversation with each other, being present with each other, and listening to each other. As one attendee stated after the event, "We took another significant step toward Beloved Community."

The main lesson learned at the Reverberations on Race was, in order to keep taking significant steps toward Beloved Community, we need to keep the conversation going. In the session, each person was asked to put themselves in the place of a parent who has to explain to their child of color what might happen if they are stopped by the police. Then roles were reversed and the exercise repeated. For both the "parents" and the "children," the experience of having to live through just that conversation was traumatic. This Reverberations was inspired by the experience of the two facilitators, Janet Overton and Dayna Edwards, who both have Black husbands and young Black relatives they love and whose lives matter.

Your participation in our church's Reverberations on Race is an act of social justice, an act of solidarity, and an act of resistance to the status quo. By listening, you will learn something about yourself, about members of your church family, and feel more connected to the people in your faith community. Our PBUUC Church Banner

Our beautiful church banner is once again hanging in the front of the church, following a cross-country trip with the Gerson's to General Assembly this summer. It is important the Church Community is responsible for following these guidelines:

For transportation purposes, there is a gray bag well marked (PBUUC BANNER), with carrying straps. Inside this bag are the poles that carry the banner for parades, marches, etc. as well as a sheet of instructions about assembling the banner and how to carry it. When in transport, the flag should be rolled around these poles and all placed inside the enclosed white muslin bag. Usually the banner will need to be pressed on the underside (do not place a hot iron on the felt side of the banner) with a steam iron set on cotton, before being hung again.

This transportation bag, along with a long pole to hang the banner on it's "peg" in the window in front of the church, is located in the RE Building room 6 closet. If the banner must be stored before hanging, please put it inside the gray bag as if it is traveling. Please notify the Church Administrator when the banner is in your possession, and when you have returned it.

If we all take responsibility for our colorful beautiful handmade designed and stitched banner, it will serve us well for many years to come.
