Minister's Column

So much of what we take for granted is not necessarily what we assume it is. We think of "Jingle Bells" as a Christmas carol, even though it has nothing whatsoever to do with any religious observance; it would actually be even more appropriate to sing

Wonderfully decorated evergreen trees, wreaths, and mistletoe are indissolubly linked with Christmas, even though those symbols predate Christianity and have no ostensible connection to the Christian religion. We think Hanukkah is eight days because of the story of the one day's worth of sanctified oil that miraculously burned in the rededicated Jerusalem temple for eight days, even though Hanukkah had already been an eight-day celebration for about six centuries before that imaginative bit of Talmudic embellishment was written down. We often make these assumptions and suppositions without conscious awareness, and when we examine them we might well find a whole new world opening up for us.

> Do we make similarly unwitting assumptions and suppositions about our faith? Do we have ideas about what Unitarian Universalism "should" or "shouldn't" be that we simply haven't bothered to question? Do we assume that certain customs, attitudes, words and symbols don't belong in our practices — even though they might well be if we chose to interpret them our own way? Do we give of ourselves to the cause of our faith as much — or as little — as we do because no one, including ourselves, ever asked us why we don't give more - or less? Do we find ourselves ensnared in that trap, all too easy to fall into, of justifying ourselves with "But we've always done it that way!" without really asking ourselves and each other if that way is really what's best for us — or whether or not we have, in fact, really always done it "that way"?

> One of the greatest blessings of our faith is the high value we place upon inquiry. Indeed, our religious path essentially obliges us to question unceasingly, to probe the depths of even our most cherished assumptions in a lifelong search for greater understanding, for greater truth. A transitional time like this one is an ideal time to ask of ourselves and each other: Who are we? What are we proud of about ourselves, and how can we continue to nurture that part of who we are? What do we wish were different, and how can we change? It is a time when old, unquestioned assumptions need to be examined candidly. That can be disorienting and anxiety-provoking. But if we trust in ourselves and one another, it can also be invigorating and liberating.

May we all be blessed this holiday season with cherished convictions and new discoveries alike.

The Board did not have a full meeting this month. Due to various personal emergencies and illnesses, we were unable to meet on our regularly scheduled night. We did meet on two other occasions.

First, the Board held a conference call with Mark Ewert, a congregational stewardship consultant for the Unitarian Universalist Association. What we discussed during that call is what a Congregation needs for a significant stewardship project, otherwise known as a Capital Campaign. Mr. Ewert advised that before a congregation moves toward a Capital Campaign that it have a well developed 5-10 year Strategic Plan that melds with its Church vision and mission. The Board will discuss this more in depth at our December meeting.

Second, the Board met briefly to ensure that in the absence of a Church Secretary that there is a plan for reviewing our Membership as those numbers are due to the UUA at the end of January. We also approved PBUUC's continued involvement in the UU Common Endowment Fund, which is undergoing major legal structure changes to reduce risk to the Congregations involved. Ken Montville has more details on that if you are truly interested.

December's Meeting will have a packed agenda. Outside of the normal Board business, I want to thank everyone who has coordinated, helped, participated, and supported the numerous stewardship events at Paint Branch in the last few months. In closing, I wish you Happy Holidays and the best of health, happiness, and peace throughout the upcoming year.

Religious Exploration

The last time I spoke to my uncle Vic was about 11 years ago when my step-father died and he came to our house to share his condolences. He didn't have to visit. He and my aunt (my mother's sister) had been divorced for a few years by then, but that's the type of guy he is. He sits with the grieving family – because that's the right thing to do.

There's no good reason that we haven't spoken other than, I grew up, he moved to Florida, and he doesn't have Facebook. Despite our lack of communication right now, he had (and has) a profound impact on my life. I can make a direct link between my uncle Vic and my current employment as a professional religious educator. I am sharing this with you, to illustrate how any caring adult, not just a parent, can change a person's life.

My uncle Vic's daughter, Melissa, was five month's younger than me and for a good part of our childhood we were best friends. Our childhood friendship meant many sleepovers at each other's houses. Whenever possible, I would try to sleep over Melissa's house, instead of her sleeping over mine, because I knew that when I slept over at Melissa's we would *have* to go to church on Sunday morning. No matter how late we stayed up giggling, no matter how uncomfortable the floor was where we choose to sleep in our sleeping bags, we were going to church first thing Sunday morning. We went to the 7:30am Mass every Sunday I slept over, no matter what – no negotiation. Empty bellies, sleep still in our eyes, we would get in the car and silently drive to the large Catholic Church, named after St. Francis of Assis, where my cousin also attended parochial school.

I never told anyone this as a child, but I loved going to St. Francis on Sundays. I loved the ritual. I loved memorizing The Lord's Prayer. I loved that could, ask God to forgive me my "trespasses" and I could forgive those who "trespassed" against me. I loved that regardless of what else was going on in the world, the same things would happen in the same order every Sunday. There was also something very spiritual and healing about the bodily worship of the Catholic Mass kneeling down, and getting up, standing up, and sitting down, almost like a Catholic Sun Salutation. I would always space out during the homily, because that seemed like unnecessary adult talk, and during the homily, I would try to decipher the pictures on the stained glass windows. I would stare are the statue of the Virgin Mary and I would will her to do something magical, something to let me know that God was real; she never did. My uncle Vic gave me a gift that I did not receive from anyone else, the gift of worship, of church, as a safe and predictable place.

He didn't know it (I don't think), but I watched my uncle Vic, because he gave me the gift of church, and noticed the other actions he took, that were, for him, just the right thing to do. He mentored my brother. He took my cousin

and me to visit ailing older aunts. He swam with us in the pool and cooked on the grill at cookouts. Is he a "saint"? No. He is and was a fallible, human soul, just like the rest of us, but in his fallibility he taught me that we always know in our hearts what the "right thing to do" is, and even if we mess up, we can always go back to our basic sense of knowing the right thing to do.

Now that I am an adult, about the same age as my uncle Vic was when I was watching him, I am aware of all of the children who are watching me, maybe even your children. The fact is, being a part of any community (in your family, in school, in church), means that you are already in relationship with multiple generations and you have an opportunity to give the gift of church and worship to someone.

I wonder, who in your life, young or old, needs the gift of church. Can you bring them on Sunday?

UUs for a Just Economic Community

We are now in the second year of the CSAI (Congregation Study Action Initiative) on Escalating Inequality that was passed at GA in 2014. UUJEC had important accomplishments in 2015:

1) Networked with congregations to assist them with promoting and providing educational materials related to economic inequality and its correction;

2) Organized an Economic Justice Conference in Evanston IL in Feb of 2015. There were over 100 participants from over 40 congregations, many from out of the Chicago region. A second conference was held at UU headquarters in Boston in May;

3) Provided input to the UUA task force commissioned to create a study guide on Economic Inequality as well as creating our own curriculum and posting others from congregations;

4) Hired a consultant to help us update our website with easy-to-use resource materials and actions for their congregations and communities. Check it out at www.uujec.com

In the coming year, UUJEC's next steps include:
1) Two conferences (so far!), growing out of our work to combat Economic Inequality, concentrated on local efforts: "Economic Justice in Ventura County," February 20; and a summit in Ashland for Southern Oregon in March.

2) Development of a draft Statement of Conscience (SOC) to start the conversation in congregations on what they would like to see in the SOC on Economic Inequality at GA 2017;

3) A survey of our activists leading to a retreat for the UUJEC Board to do strategic planning on how UUJEC can best serve congregations and our justice movement in years to come;

4) Co-sponsorship of workshops at GA 2016 and in Districts and Regions on actions being taken to reduce economic inequality;

5) Development of further easy-access resources and links on ways to impact your local communities in meaningful ways.

UUJEC board members are available to consult with congregations to develop local projects and networks to create a more equitable economic system. Social Action Committee (SAC) News

At SAC's November 21st meeting a number of important matters were discussed and decided on. As agreed to earlier, we'll be meeting with representatives from Habitat for Humanity at Paint Branch on Monday, November 23rd to learn more about how we can partner with them. We'll also be continuing our work with the Housing Initiative Partnership (HIP) by attending a grand opening on Tuesday, December 1st of their new energy efficient prototype home designed to be affordable for lower income home owners. Other affordable housing initiatives were also discussed.

We planned special collections for January, February, and March 2016 and also reviewed updated special collections guidelines. We agreed to help pay for a new rainbow flag for Paint Branch because the former one is missing. Additionally we agreed to recommend that the Hope Christian Academy banner at the entrance to Paint Branch be taken down on the weekends so it is clear that Paint Branch is a Unitarian Universalist Church - as our new roadside sign indicates. Also their banner makes it an unsafe walk from the bus-stop because one has to walk around it in the street to enter Paint Branch.

We agreed to go with the religious exploration folks to help out at the Capital Area Food Bank. Updates were also given about UUSJ and our fair share contribution for this church year. And a reminder that the annual meeting of the UULM-MD will be on Saturday, January 23rd at the UU Church of Annapolis - along with a new brochure about their important activities. Work continues on updating the social justice brochure and arranging a speaker on wage stagnation SAC also continues its strong support for our Community Learning Center and its English classes - with a recommendation on how its childcare expenses can be shared with those of the religious explortation program on Sunday afternoons.

Internationally we discussed the UUSC's call for supporting 200,000 Syrian refugees seeking safe haven in the United States - far more than the 15,000 to date agreed to by the State Department. Also Maryland Governor Hogan's stand of not accepting refugees was criticized by the organization Peace Action Montgomery in a flyer handed out about how to organize against his position.

SAC is not meeting in December because of all the holiday activities. Please join us when we meet again on Saturday morning, January 16th from 10 - 12:30 in Room #4 of the RE Building!

PBUUC's Kwanzaa services are designed to be an annual celebration to reaffirm and reinforce the bonds between us all, to remind us that we each have inherent worth and dignity, and to bring us together as a multicultural community. Everyone is invited to Kwanzaa, a secular celebration of the resilience of Africans worldwide and of African-Americans and their culture.

Resilience and the need for community are inherent in people of African descent and certainly in African Americans. Despite slavery and its continuing legacy—racism, the old Jim Crow, the new Jim Crow, disenfranchisement, redlining, continuous police violence against black people, and more—we survive through love of family and belief in the goodness of the majority of our fellow human beings. The seven principles of Kwanzaa:

- (1) umoja/unity;
- (2) kujichagulia/self-determination;
- (3) ujima/collective work and responsibility;
- (4) *uijamaa*/cooperative economics;
- (5) nia/purpose;
- (6) kuumba/creativity; and
- (7) imani/faith

speak directly to the communitarian vision and values of African cultures throughout time and throughout the world.

Both the Seven Principles of Kwanzaa and the Seven Principles of Unitarian Universalism evolved within a "living tradition" of wisdom and spirituality, and both are drawn from diverse sources. And like UU Principles, the Principles of Kwanzaa call for sustained reflection on what it means to be human, especially in terms of how we understand and live our lives and engage the critical issues confronting our families, our community, and the world.

So please come on Sunday, December 27, for the Service and the Feast.
