In March and April, the Board, Transition Team and I will be communicating with the congregation about how everyone can be involved in one of the Compelling Conversations.

Fellow PBUUC'ers,

By the time you get this newsletter, the 2016 Town Hall will just be over. I can't write a lot about what was said there because other than the Agenda, I don't know everyone's talking points. On the agenda was a update on current projects from Buildings and Grounds, an update on the Multicultural and Multigenerational Plans, a presentation on Leadership Vacancies, a review of the Board Vision and overview of the Church Projects Process, an update on the Transition, and an introduction to the upcoming Compelling Conversations. My intent is to include more information on each of these topics in the April Branches.

Otherwise, the Board decided to offer a contract extension to Rev. Evan and he accepted. I'm not sure it was clear that per UUA recommendations our contract with him was for one year with an option to extend to a second. Evan will be with PBUUC through July 2017, which the Board is rather excited about.

It is with mixed emotions that we accepted Dayna's resignation. Our DMRE will be moving to a full-time DRE position in Rockville and while we'll miss her, we wish her the best of luck. This means the Board will need to appoint a hiring team to find us a new DMRE – if you're interested, please let one of the Trustees know.

We'd like you to keep two dates in mind:

March 13 - the Ministerial Settlement Representative will be meeting with the Congregation after Church to explain the Search Process and answer questions. Lunch and child care will be provided.

April 17 – Breakfast with the Board; before the service, come join the Board for Bagels & Coffee (no, we're not as ambitious as the Stewardship Committee) to share your thoughts and ask questions.

Bold Steps For Our Future:

What does the future hold for Paint Branch? We are midway through the Stewardship Annual Campaign for 2016-2017. Even if you missed us at Commitment Sunday, there is still time to make your pledge. A Visiting Steward will be contacting you soon or you can stop at the Stewardship Table any Sunday in March after the service. Every contribution will make it possible to reach these important goals for our community:

- o Embark on a search to select a new full-time minister
- o Expand our multigenerational community of explorers
- o Support the UU Association with our Fair Share
- Improve and maintain our facilities to provide for future generations
- Support income equality through a living wage for our hourly workers
- Provide for professional development of our staff.

To have a successful ministerial search and reach our other goals means the budget needs to increase by around 10% to about \$426,000 for the coming church year. An increase in pledges to about \$330,000 will take us a long way towards meeting that goal.

So far, the response from the congregation has been terrific. As of Commitment Sunday we have received a total of \$210,000 in pledges which is 64% of our total goal. Have we received your pledge? If not, there is still time to make your pledge. We hope that everyone will share our commitment to Paint Branch by taking Bold Steps For Our Future by increasing their pledge. It's time to be Bold!

Legacy Fund

Each year the Paint Branch Legacy Fund provides grants for special projects that fall outside the normal operating budget of the church. This year there is a total of \$2,400 available. Religious Exploration

Last month, my husband and I traded-in our old car and bought a Prius. I started to think (as DREs are wont to do) about how car shopping and "church shopping," might be very similar in the 21st century.

Like most young families, I started car shopping online in the evenings after the kids had gone to bed. My husband and I would email each other facts about different cars and compare notes, sometimes face-to-face, sometimes via text or email. If we were searching for a church, I imagine a similar exchange would have happened. We would have started online. We would have looked at the Facebook page of the church and of course the website. The UUA website states that, "some of Unitarian Universalism's most powerful outreach tools are websites, blogs, Facebook, Twitter, and other social media."

In a car, gas mileage was the key factor for us. I am sure it is different for other young families in search of cars. Some families might want room for more kids. Some families might only drive green cars. So it is, I imagine, in church shopping. When looking for a church, families, and other seekers, are looking for whatever it is they have decided is important to them, and they are looking to see if it is there in the church's online presences.

Once we had narrowed our search to two possible cars, we called two different dealerships. We decided, that we didn't want to spend an entire Saturday (my only weekend day off) in a car dealership, so here's how my phone conversation went with the first dealer:

Me: "Hi I am interested in buying your 2010 Prius, but I have two small kids and don't want to spend the whole day in the dealership. I'd like to agree on a trade-in value for my old car and the price for the Prius over the phone and then we will come in sign all the paperwork."

Dealer 1: "I'm sorry, our policy is that we don't negotiate over the phone, and we certainly can't give you a trade-in value without seeing the car."

Me: "Ok, thanks. Have a nice day."

Here's how my conversation with the second dealer went:

Me: (same as above.)

Dealer 2: "I have two kids too. I totally get it. If you have a CarMax report, we'll match their price on your trade-in. Can we agree to the online price for the Prius, we just lowered it \$1000 yesterday."

Me: "Sounds great."

The first dealer gave me the car dealer equivalent to the church answer of "but we've always done it this way. This is the way we do things" The second dealer, was flexible and found new solutions to meet the needs of a young family. The second dealer and I communicated through text and email throughout the day to finish the deal. This allowed me to take my kids to dance, go grocery shopping and have lunch at a restaurant with my family. Then, once the kids were in bed with a babysitter, we drove to dealer and picked up the car.

I am telling you this story because, I wonder...

I wonder, how Paint Branch (and Unitarian Universalism) can be more like the second dealer. How can we be flexible and agile in the 21st century? How can we listen to the needs of those in our community and do our best to meet those needs in new and interesting ways? How can we leverage the tools available to us in the 21st century to reach more people and reach them in ways that work for them?

Diversity/Anti-Racism Transformation Team (DARTT) News:

Black Lives Matter at PBUUC

Saturday, January 30, PBUUC hosted the Third Black Lives Matter Summit sponsored by the Joseph Priestley District (JPD). The summit was co-facilitated by Paula Cole Jones, JPD Social and Racial Justice Consultant, and Kerridwen Henry, a member of the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Columbia and a Black Lives Matter organizer. The more than 60 attendees represented 18 UU congregations throughout DC, Maryland, and Virginia. The event was billed as an opportunity to be in conversation and community with other UUs grappling with how to engage and to hear from those already deeply engaged in racial and social justice issues in the JPD region.

The day started with two separate caucuses—one for those identifying as people of color (including, but not limited to, people of African descent) and those identifying as white (including, but not limited to, people of European descent). The separate gatherings for the first 45 minutes of the Summit were to allow the two groups to bond and share among themselves their concerns as well as their hopes for the day.

When the groups came together, after an opening statement from Rev. Keely, we heard from a panel of activists involved in issues relevant to the Black Lives Matter Movement in Prince George's County. The panelists were:

- Elsa Lakew is an undergraduate economics major at Howard University, an organizer for Progressive Maryland, active in the Black Lives Matter DMV, and a member of the Montgomery County Civil Rights Coalition.
- Jonathan W. Hutto is an organizer with the Prince Georges County People's Coalition, a doctoral student in the Political Science Department at Howard University, and author of Antiwar Soldier: How to Dissent Within the Ranks of the Military.
- Marion Gray-Hopkins is a retired banking executive who began her work as an activist in the movement for justice and for police accountability and transparency

in 2000, the year after her unarmed 19 year-old son, Gary Hopkins, Jr., was killed by Prince George's County Police Officer Brian Catlett. She is also active with the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU), Code Pink, Progressive Maryland, Amnesty International, Mothers for Justice United, and ONUS Inc.

After each panelist's opening remarks about their work and the importance of becoming active in support of police accountability and Black Lives Matter, the floor was opened to questions from the floor. The panelists were also joined by Angela Angel, State House Delegate from Maryland's 25th District. Issues covered included other UU churches' experiences with hanging Black Lives Matter banners and with congregational discussions about the issues. We also learned about upcoming legislation relevant to police accountability. The UUs then separated into regional groups to discuss their congregations' events and experiences in supporting the Black Lives Matter Movement. Much useful information was shared.

The Summit provided not only a forum for open discussion but also an opportunity to develop new friendships and alliances.

As noted, this was the Third Black Lives Matter Summit. Each summit presents a chance for all to learn and share about the work for racial justice that has already been started and about how we as UUs can position ourselves to be effective partners in continuing that work while enjoying fellowship and food, inspiration, and music. The next UU Black Lives Matter Summit will be Saturday, March 12, hosted by the River Road UU Congregation in Bethesda. The focus will be on self-care. Rev. Bruce Marshall to speak March 13

Bruce Marshall is Ministerial Settlement Representative for the Joseph Priestley District. He is retired from fulltime parish ministry, having served congregations in Michigan, New York,



Ohio, Tennessee, and Maryland. Bruce is currently chaplain to the UU community at Riderwood Village. Special Collection News:

Supporting Unitarian Universalists for Social Justice (UUSJ) in the National Capital Region with our March 27th Special Collection: Paint Branch has been a member of this important regional UU organization since its founding in 2000. It includes about 25 area congregations in D.C., Maryland, and Virginia as it coordinates advocacy and educational opportunities in our national capital area. Priorities include the environment and climate change, immigration reform, LGBT rights, and the widening wealth divide. For example our own Carmelita Carter-Sykes received a UUSJ award at their annual gala for her leadership as the coordinator of our Paint Branch Community Learning Center where English classes help international students improve their speaking, listening, reading, and writing. Recently UUSJ members joined with interfaith groups at the Dar al Hijrah Islamic Center in Falls Church, Virginia to help pack thousands of blankets and coats collected by the mosque for shipment to refugees in Syria and Iraq. UUSJ leaders have held meetings with congressional offices about federal legislation of importance to UU's and given social justice awards to members working with the Black Lives Matter movement. And much more too!

Please be as generous as you can when we have our special collection for UUSJ on Sunday morning, March 27th. You will be helping Paint Branch meet its fair share contribution to this important regional UU organization which represents our faith so actively and meaningfully. Our Contribution to Kenya and Clean water

We had to re-think our October special collection, because the UU Church of Tallahassee did not make their goal. After getting input from others in the congregation, the Social Action Committee has decided to give \$643 to an orphanage in Kenya and \$200 to the Flint Child Health and Development Fund, a consortium of groups dealing with children's health in Flint, Michigan, where the drinking water was poisoned by lead. The orphanage runs an elementary school and then supports their students throughout whatever other education they have the talent for. Most of these children are orphanage because of the wide prevalence of AIDS among heterosexual people in that part of Africa. - *Marj Donn*
