Minister's Column

For any organization, community or even any individual person, when faced with change, certain questions cannot long be avoided: What must we change or do differently in order to adapt? What must we continue to do in order to maintain the integrity of who we are?



The Compelling Conversations that began in March have been a rich opportunity to ad-

We know that no institution can thrive if it continues doggedly to do the exact same things year after year, changing nothing while the world around it evolves; we know that abandoning everything we have known and striking out on a new path is not often wise, especially when there might well be very good reasons to continue what we have been doing: when there are things we have learned, strengths we have developed, and blessings we have given and received, it is irresponsible and wasteful to abandon all that. The question, then, becomes one of balance. How much change is too much, and how much is too little? These are not easy questions. It is of the utmost importance that we explore them together and that we permit a multiplicity of voices to be heard as we find the way forward for Paint Branch Unitarian Universalist Church. Board of Trustees Column

Fellow PBUUC'ers,

Thank you to everyone who attended the Town Hall the last week of February. If you were unable to attend, the minutes are on PBUUC's website. You can either type in the following URL www.pbuuc.org/news/article.php?id=280 or go to the Calendar listing (February 28) and click on the Town Hall.

On March 13, Rev. Bruce Marshall, our Ministerial Settlement Representative, presented to everyone in attendance an overview of the Search process. Bruce highlighted that the purpose of a search is to find the minister who will best serve our congregation as you move into the next decade. He then reviewed who all the players are in the process and gave us an overview of the timeline for finding a settled minister for August 2017. The process for empaneling a Ministerial Search Committee is determined by the Board of Trustees.

At our meeting on March 15, the Board appointed the DMRE Hiring Team and another member to the Nominating Committee. We received an update on Stewardship (if you haven't turned in your pledge cards, please do!) and reviewed the current projects in process at the Church. We then spent the second half of our meeting determining the process and timeline for empaneling a Ministerial Search Committee. That process is included in this month's Branches and will be emailed to all members, posted on our Facebook page, and included in the Bulletin.

During our April meeting, we plan to discuss what it would take for PBUUC to be ready for a Capital Campaign, hear about multi-site ministry options, receive an update on the outdoor classroom, and start setting the agenda for the Congregational Meeting.

Speaking of the Congregational Meeting, the Board decided to change the date for the Congregational Meeting to **June 5th**. Please mark this on your calendar and plan to attend, as on top of the usual business will be the vote to approve the slate for the Ministerial Search Committee.

Process to empanel a Ministerial Search Committee

The Board of Trustees has decided to form a Ministerial Search Committee consisting of seven members. The Board will solicit and collect written applications. A slate of seven individuals will be selected from the pool of applicants by the Board. The slate will then be presented to the congregation for approval at a congregational meeting.

Applications will be available as of **01 April 2016** on the church website. Completed applications are due by **24 April 2016**, preferably, to mscapplications@pbuuc.org or can be left in a brown envelope in Liz Citrin's mailbox in the Church office by noon. All members of PBUUC are welcome to apply. As we are selecting the slate, currently serving Trustees are excluded from applying for or serving on the Ministerial Search Committee. Otherwise, we encourage everyone able to meet the criteria below to apply.

The Board will use appropriate criteria for selection to the Search Committee as outlined below, which is taken from the most current Unitarian Universalist Association guidelines. Search Committee members will be:

- * Known and respected by others in the congregation
- More strongly committed to the congregation as a whole than to any subgroup
- Well informed about the demands and time requirements of search committee membership and be prepared to give about 250-400 hours over the coming year
- → Balanced by sex, age, interests, and tenure of membership to reflect the diversity of the congregation. Major areas of church life such as religious education, social action, property management, finance, and music should be represented by participants, not partisans
- ♦ Balanced by attributes: organizational ability, broad theological awareness, computer skills
- Pledged to conduct a search that is fair and nondiscriminatory with respect to race, color, disability, sex, sexual orientation, age, and national origin
- Committed to maintain confidentiality and to seek consensus
- ♦ Capable of both self-assertion and compromise
- Not prone to extreme reactions to ministers. The previous ministers' strongest supporters or opponents are rarely the best choice
- Well suited to teamwork: a search committee is no place for Lone Rangers!

The Board of Trustees will send the slate out to the membership by **20 May 2016** so that everyone has time for discernment prior to the vote at our annual Congregational Meeting on **05 June 2016**.

Religious Exploration

Last year, at the RE service, I wondered out loud the following wondering question: "I wonder how our faith community might look different if we had five adults commit to creating relationships with each child or youth in the congregation." I am happy to say, we are well on our way to finding out what our community would look like with more adults committed to creating caring relationships with children and youth in the congregation.

The Mystery Buddies program is taking us closer to becoming an authentic multigenerational community. A diverse cross-section of PBUUC adults have agreed to pair up with a child/youth buddy, to whom they will write a brief message each week for a total of four weeks. Hopefully, the child/youth will also write back. They won't know who their buddy is, until the "reveal" at the Mystery Buddies Tea on Sunday, April 24.

Mystery Buddies is more than just a program, it is a ministry. Like the characters in the book Zen Ties, by John Muth, the generations have an opportunity to minister to each other as mystery buddies. This is a great volunteer opportunity to connect with others that you might not see in your regular church life.

Women's Group

The Women's group activity for April is a walk on the Matthew Henson Trail. This is a newer trail in Montgomery county, and is named after the African-American explorer Matthew Henson. Matthew Henson went with Robert Peary on many expeditions, including to the Arctic; where Matthew Henson and Robert Peary and four Inuits (Ootah, Ooqueah, Seeglo and Egingwah) were allegedly the first people to reach the North Pole.

This is not an interpretive trail like the previous Women's group visit to the Underground Railway trail in Olney. This is a regular suburban trail, like the Sligo Creek trail (Montgomery county) or Greenbelt Lake trail (Prince Georges county). We are going in April because we are hoping for wildflower sightings, and walking weather that is neither too hot nor too cold.

We will explore the Matthew Henson Trail starting at 11:30 am on Saturday, April 23. The group will meet at the trail parking area at the intersection of Layhill Road and Middlevale Lane in Layhill, on the west side of Layhill Road. The path includes asphalt and boardwalk sections, and is stroller/wheelchair accessible. We expect to walk for about an hour or a bit more. Roots of Injustice, Seeds of Change: Toward Right Relationship With America's Native Peoples

On Sunday, April 24, Paula Palmer, Director, Toward Right Relationship Project, Boulder Friends Meeting, will be the guest speaker at our Sunday Service. (See "Meet Our Guest Speaker" for a brief bio and picture; and page one for a description of her talk during the morning service.)

After the Service, the Social Action Committee and the Diversity/ Anti-Racism Transformation Team will host an interactive workshop on the Doctrine of Discovery led by Paula. She created this Workshop in response to calls from Indigenous leaders at the United Nations and the World Council of Churches and with the guidance and encouragement of Native American educators. It traces the historic and ongoing impacts of the Doctrine of Discovery on Native Americans. The goal of the Workshop is to raise our level of knowledge and concern about these impacts, recognize them in our institutions and ourselves, and explore how we can begin to take actions toward "right relationship" with Native Peoples. Lunch will be served at 11:30 am. The Workshop will be from 12:30 pm to 2:30 pm. Something ADOREable Is Happening at Paint Branch

From a series of gatherings that began last summer, the congregation has signaled that it is leaning in to move toward implementation of the resolution unanimously approved at the June 2011 Annual Meeting, but never fully implemented.

"To more fully realize our Unitarian Universalist Principles, we, the Paint Branch Unitarian Universalist Church community, declare ourselves an Intentional Multicultural Congregation. Therefore, we commit ourselves, the Board of Trustees, staff, committees, affinity groups and lay leadership to inclusive actions to transform all aspects of congregational life in ways that affirm our multicultural identity as the foundation of the church's strength."

A significant number of members of the Paint Branch community have attended meetings at Paint Branch and gatherings of other Unitarian Universalists designed to help us reach Beloved Community. Out of these conversations has emerged an interest in improving communications across race and ethnicity within our own doors. Some PBUUCers and our Interim Minister have been meeting to plan sessions where a diverse group of Paint Branchers can learn to talk about race and ethnicity until it loses its power. These sessions will be modeled on ADORE, A Dialogue On Race And Ethnicity. This process of deep sharing was developed by Paula Cole Jones, Joseph Priestley District Social and Racial Justice Consultant, and is or has been established in several local congregations including All Souls, Annapolis, Arlington, First Church of Baltimore, Columbia, Davies, and Towson. We are now recruiting a diverse group of facilitators for this work. Please watch upcoming Bulletins/ContinUUms for more information about ADORE.

Meet Our Guest Speaker

Paula Palmer April 24th

Paula Palmer is a sociologist, writer, and activist for human rights, social justice, and environmental protection. As director of Toward Right Relationship, a project



of the Indigenous Peoples Concerns committee of the Boulder Friends Meeting (Quakers), she created and facilitates workshops titled, "Roots of Injustice, Seeds of Change: Toward Right Relationship with America's Native Peoples" (for adults) and "Re-Discovering America: Understanding Colonization" (for middle schools and high schools). She is the 2016 Pendle Hill Cadbury Scholar, conducting research on the role Quakers played during the era of the Indian Boarding Schools. For 17 years, as executive director of the non-profit organization, Global Response, Paula directed over 70 international campaigns to help Indigenous peoples and local communities defend their rights and prevent environmental destruction. In Costa Rica, where she lived for 20 years, she published five books of oral history in collaboration with Afro-Caribbean and Bribri Indigenous peoples, through a community empowerment process known as Participatory Action Research.

From 1995 to 2001, Paula served as editor for health and environment of Winds of Change magazine, a publication of the American Indian Science and Engineering Society (AISES). She holds an M.A. degree in Sociology from Michigan State University and has taught courses in the Environmental Studies Department of Naropa University. She is profiled in American Environmental Leaders From Colonial Times to the Present (ABC-CLIO, 2000) and Biodiversity, A Reference Handbook (ABC-CLIO 1998).

Paula is a recipient of the Elise Boulding Peace-maker of the Year Award (given by the Rocky Mountain Peace and Justice Center), the Jack Gore Memorial Peace Award (given by the American Friends Service Committee), the International Human Rights Award (given by the United Nations Association of Boulder County), and the Multicultural Award in the "Partners" category (given by Boulder County Community Action Programs).

Social Action Committee (SAC) Activities: SAC's March meeting was a full and interesting one. It included important special collection news (see below). Also covered were updates about the new rainbow flag for Paint Branch and planning to move ahead with its placement here as a witness to our strong support & caring for the LGBT world. Also updates on the English classes held at our Community Learning Center were covered. As was its important expansion to the Broad Acres Elementary School! A Habitat for Humanity/Black Lives Matter rally is planned for Paint Branch on June 25 - with an important planning meeting being held here on Saturday afternoon, April 23 from 2 pm-4 pm. We also discussed our current budget and plans for our budget request for the coming church year. Work is also continuing on updating the social justice brochure and reviewing a PBUUC social justice priorities survey done in 2013 and whether or not do now do another such survey in 2016 with the Green Team & DARTT. We also are considering having a speaker at PB on Income Inequality - with a suggested title being Social Action as a Spiritual Practice. With Warm Nights coming to Paint Branch from April 17 - April 24 SAC members agreed to sign up to help on Monday evening, April 18. SAC will also be helping DARTT to organize a light lunch and workshop for the April 24 Sunday Service on Native Americans. We've also been asked to co-host a film called How to Die in Oregon with the Goodloe UU Fellowship which SAC will follow up on. And a thank-you to Janet Overton as the new PB Beacon House representative - and for all else that she does for social justice work! With chair Nancy Boardman's upcoming retirement move to the New York City area - focus also will turn to new SAC leadership soon. And importantly - please join us at our next SAC meeting on Saturday morning, April 16 at 10 am in Room 4 as we focus on social action in our social justice work together! Nancy B.

Special Collection News:

Announcing: Janet Overton is our new Special Collections Coordinator! Thanks, Janet. We welcome suggestions of recipients for our special collections. If you have suggestions, please contact Janet.

A new guideline (well, yes, it's a rule!): The Social Action Committee announces that we will no longer accept special collection donations after the Sunday of the collection. The process has become too cumbersome for the church treasurers. They are all volunteers, after all! If you cannot attend on the Sunday of the special collection and want to contribute, please get your check to the church office no later than that Sunday. If you miss that date, we will try to have the address of the recipient available, so that you can mail a check to them or you can donate online.

A special collection will be taken at the dance service May 1st. It will benefit a fragile cultural treasure in a totally black city suffering from despair and racial isolation. A celebrated African American dancer, choreographer, and anthropologist, Katherine Dunham, purchased a historic mansion in East St. Louis, Illinois, after she was honored by the Kennedy Center as a National Treasure. She saw this as a way to inspire young people who would come after her. The University of Southern Illinois, no longer supporting any presence in the town, initially helped with housing her memorabilia, costumes from her troupe's world tours, and a collection of hundreds of video tapes of her troupe. It is feared the tapes are deteriorating. Now we hope to help rescue this valuable, vulnerable resource. (East St. Louis completes the circle around St. Louis, composed of St. Louis County and containing Ferguson.)
