Minister's Column

We should have a sense of accomplishment and feel hopeful as we find ourselves approaching the halfway point of the two years we've chosen to walk together in this voyage of interim ministry. During the past year, a thoughtful and inclusive process lead the congregation to vote to place a Black Lives Matter banner on the church property; a series of Compelling Conversations gave eve-



ryone the opportunity to think about the purpose of this beloved church and to dream about its future together; we continue our work of being a Welcoming Congregation, a Green Sanctuary, and an intentionally multicultural and multigenerational faith community; together, we have continued to do the healing work following a period of loss and uncertainty in this church.

What questions might we address together in the second year of this transition? Here are three that I find myself asking.

How will we be responsible stewards of the church's future? What kind of planning and dreaming might we do together (including the continuation of conversations that have gone on in the church in recent years) to revitalize the church's physical space, strengthen current programs, and launch bold new initiatives? What would it take for us to accomplish those goals together in the coming years?

What kinds of relationships do we want to have with one another?

How can we continue to bring out the best in ourselves and one another? How do we confront broken relationships and difficult interactions in our midst with compassion and equity? How can we wisely inhabit the paradox that true freedom can only exist with clear boundaries?

What kind of relationships does the congregation want to have with its ministers and staff?

What are the expectations in the congregation's culture about the roles of leaders, especially clergy and staff leaders? How might we renew our vision of the possibilities of those relationships as the church prepares to begin a new chapter with a new settled minister?

I look forward to the conversations.

Board of Trustees Column

The Board of Trustees held its last 2016 Fiscal year board meeting Tuesday, June 21 with all of incoming Board members as well as the new Assistant Treasurer and Secretary able to attend. The Assistant Treasurer, Louise Waugh and the Secretary, Erin Gebhart were appointed. New Members will be installed during the July meeting. The bulk of the meeting was given over to the proposed budget. The MRE training budget was increased from \$400 to \$800 since we need to train OWL/Coming of Age leaders which the team did not know about during the budgeting process. The budget was passed as amended. Special Fundraising events MUST be cleared by our Church Administrator, Chuck Berry to be placed on the Calendar well in advance of said event in order to prevent overlapping of events, etc.

The Board approved the recommendation by the MRE Search team to appoint a team to negotiate a final offer package to a prospective Director. Stay tuned for more news!

Quentin West was approved to be hired as our second Building Manager, replacing Romeo Ndonfak who has accepted another position outside of PBUUC.

Soltez Engineering submitted a preliminary design for water abatement/new parking lot and requested that the Board approve moving to the next phase, a detailed design at no cost or obligation to PBUUC at this stage. The board approved moving to the next step. When we have received the detailed designs, we will be bringing the project to the church as a whole for discussion.

Hope Christian Academy has caught up on its rental payments and Muriel Morisey, incoming Board Member, will be taking over as the Board Liaison.

Fiscal Year-End Reminder

PLEDGES, DONATIONS AND YEARS: RECORDING THEM CORRECTLY

This month, July 2016, is the first month of PBUUC's new fiscal year. There are two different "years" for which you may be monitoring your financial donations to Paint Branch. One is the calendar year, which began January 1, 2016 and runs through December 31, 2016. The other is the fiscal year referred to above. FYs overlap two calendar years so are referred to by both. FY 2015/2016 just ended June 30. This new one, FY 2016/2017, is the one you may have recently made a pledge for, and it begins July 1.

Why should you know or care about these two years?

The Calendar Year is the one the IRS will be looking at when you report your charitable contributions made in 2016. PBUUC will provide you with a summary of your 2016 donations early in 2017, all of which must have been received by PBUUC in 2016; IRS's rules; not ours.

The Fiscal Year is the period in which you want to try to satisfy each pledge, and you have some choices in how you do this. Pay it in one lump sum, pay it quarterly, monthly, weekly, or however works best for you. What's important is that you correctly identify each contribution so we can record it in the computer according to your wishes. That's done via the memo line on your check. Here are some examples. Putting "FY 2016/2017 pledge" on the memo line for any pledge donation in this FY is adequate. If you pay monthly or weekly, you could instead write "July '16 pledge" or "January '17 pledge" etc. on the memo line. If you make irregular payments, but still want to satisfy your pledge within the FY, break it up however you like; just let us know the FY you intend each payment for. Any check which has nothing in the memo line will be assumed to be for the FY in which it is written. And remember, for IRS purposes, each payment will be recorded as a donation for the calendar year in which it's made.

If you wish to finish paying your FY15/16 pledge even thought that FY has ended, please try to do so in July. We can no longer apply your donation to expenses due before that, but we can credit the payment to your FY 15/16 pledge payment before we close the books. Just be sure to put that on the memo line.

UU Church of Annapolis Lighthouse Dinners

UUCA volunteers cook dinner at the Lighthouse Shelter at 10 Hudson St. in Annapolis on the 2nd Saturday of every month. You can get together with a group (e.g. covenant group, family, or friends) and prepare an entire meal together or sign up as an individual and be matched with others to provide dinner. A group of 4-5 people is usually plenty to cook and serve

Arrive at the shelter at 4 pm to prep/cook the meal. Serve dinner cafeteria style at 6 pm sharp.

The shelter kitchen has cooking gear, but you might want to bring your favorite knife for chopping. Meal clean up is handled by the residents.

You can be reimbursed! It usually costs \$150-200 to buy groceries for the meal. If this is not within your/your group's current financial constraints, you can get reimbursed. Social Action Committee (SAC) News

Please join SAC in a farewell reception for Nancy Boardman who is moving to New Jersey to be closer to her sons and their families and to her new grandson. We will hold the reception Sunday, July 3, in the sanctuary after service.

Nancy joined PBUUC more than 20 years ago. Since joining, Nancy has been an enthusiastic and active member of this congrega-



tion. She has been a member of the choir for at least 14 years; and in 2010, after retirement, she became a cochair of the Social Action Committee. She has served as its chair for the past 5 years. In that role she has also been a member of the board of UUs for Social Justice (UUSJ) and spearheaded PBUUC's drive in support of marriage equality, which became Maryland law in 2013. In addition, Nancy has been very active in her Greenbelt community in support of a variety of social justice issues.

Nancy will be departing from our midst this month. She will be sorely missed by the many friends she has here. She says she plans to return for visits. We will hold her to that.

Though we will miss Nancy greatly, SAC will continue her efforts to serve PBUUC in support of its goals as they relate to promoting "the inherent worth and dignity of every person" and "justice, equity and compassion in human relations"—the first two of UU's seven principles. As Rosemarie C. Smurzynski, Minister Emeritas, wrote:

The note of spirituality that Unitarian Universalists have heard over this past decade has become a distinct melody. . . . Today we hear it in our own voices as we seek what is holy. We find it in the quiet of our hearts, in the voices of fellowship, in the work of justice, and in the wonder of nature. The sound calls us to discipline and practice and manifests itself through inward spirit and outward action.

We have a number of email alert lists about various social action and global warming issues. Recipients receive emails telling them about campaigns to influence legislators or others. If you receive such a message, it is then your choice of whether or not to send the message in. When you do send it in, you help to create huge responses to specific issues.

I'm now forming such a list about gun control. If you want to contact legislators about outlawing assault weapons, for instance, please send me your email address. You can opt out at any time.

Our other alert lists are on these issues: the environment, affordable housing, peace, anti-racism, GLBTQ, health, human rights. Israel-Palestine, mental health, nuclear power, poverty, prisons, refugees, trade globalization, the widening wealth divide and women's issues. Warm Nights Update:

Over the course of 35 weeks, beginning in mid-October, 2015 and running through Saturday, June 12, 2016, together we provided 8,908 Nights of Shelter to 260 individuals including 91 children. During this period, CCSI, Warm Nights coordinator, was able to help one family and one individual move into permanent supportive housing; move 3 families into transitional housing; help 4 families rent their own apartments; help 3 individuals rent their own apartments; and moved 5 families into the Family Emergency Shelter. It is good to see the overall picture of our church's efforts toward a continuing need in our community. Many Thanks for everyone's help.
