Minister's Column

Last spring, the whole congregation was invited to engage in what we called Compelling Conversations. What we learned from those encounters can be summarized succinctly:

and building a more just and compassionate world
in Prince George's County and beyond.

Our conversations highlighted the church's strengths and our sources of pride.

- The setting of the church in the woods and the unique architecture of the buildings were mentioned in every conversation as being not only treasures, but wholly unique features of this church.
- Social action is very important to our congregation.
- Creativity expressed through music and the visual arts are vital priorities for this congregation.
- We are deeply invested in a thriving Religious Exploration ministry and strongly committed to continuing to develop as a multigenerational community of faith.
- This church is a home of many deep, lasting friendships and is a place where we sincerely strive to welcome and care for one another. Personal sharing is a sacred value.
- We are cognizant of being the largest, most stable Unitarian Universalist congregation in Prince George's County.

We also explored the church's challenges and concerns.

- We are still seeking ways to maintain our facilities in a way that makes good use of our resources (our money and the time and effort of volunteers and staff).
- Like many churches, we make plans around a budget, but we do not always raise the funds that we wish to in order to fulfill our vision.
- Volunteer burnout continues to be a concern. There are many instances of individuals who fulfill multiple roles and/or of persons who continue to serve in the same capacity for extended periods.

Minister's Column, continued

Like many faith communities in America today, PBUUC perceives itself as a "greying congregation," and there is a desire to equip and empower a new generation of UU leaders.

We spoke candidly of our hopes for the future.

- In every one of our conversations, the prospect of a capital campaign in the near future (e.g., within the next seven years) was discussed, often with enthusiasm.
- Many expressed the hope that we will have a full-time Director of Multigenerational Religious Exploration in the coming years.
- Much excitement is invested in the search for the church's next settled minister.
- Many expressed a yearning for the church to have clearer goals so that the abundant energies of the congregation could be more focused. A unique and shared sense of identity and purpose is understood to be essential to this.
- We dream of being more of a presence in the community.

These conversations helped us see more clearly some of the tensions that exist in our congregation.

- In many of our conversations, we heard expressed a longing to see the church grow numerically. At the same time, the current size provides intimacy that we cherish.
- Congregants treasure the freedom to be creative and to feel empowered. At the same time, many expressed the hope that the next settled minister will be a dynamic leader.
- We value everyone and are committed to continuing to build a
 congregation that is authentically and joyously multigenerational, but many of our conversations and hopes are focused on attracting and retaining young people and young families. Persons
 of all ages in our community might find the saving message of
 Unitarian Universalism life-giving; how are we truly welcoming
 everyone, not just those whose presence might ease some of
 our anxiety?
- We continue to strive toward being a multicultural congregation and are still learning what that means. Committing ourselves, as we did this past June, to aligning the church with the Black Lives Matter movement is a new endeavor for us. We also continue to explore matters like different styles of worship and how that can be a vehicle through which our commitment to multiculturalism and inclusion can be authentically lived.
- We want to encourage the creativity and passions of everyone, but we wonder if we are trying to do more than is achievable or healthy for us. We yearn for both freedom and boundaries. How do we find the right balance?

In our Sunday worship service on October 16, the Transition Team and I will be sharing some reflections on these learnings.

Board of Trustees

The September board meeting was held Tuesday, September 20 with all but 2 in attendance. Our new DMRE, Carla Miller reported that Fall classes began September 11 with 16 youth in attendance, about half the full enrollment. We have teachers, but still need nursery volunteers and youth advisors. Please contact Carla if you are interested in helping out in this manner. Evan Keely noted in his Interim Minister's Report that he and the Transition Team will be leading worship on October 16 and will be presenting a summary of the Compelling Conversations session held this past spring and early summer. We hope to have a full congregation in attendance. Treasurer, David nation reported that PBUUC received a donation from the Bonnie and Peter Hurley Giving Account. Thanks Bonnie and Peter!

Elaine Shell and Muriel Morisey from the Board will be working with Janet Overton on the MSC along with Mark Shute, (our volunteer webmaster) to help update our website, updating materials and making it more manageable to navigate. The Board voted to continue our liability insurance with long time insurer Church Mutual (who covered for the fire.) Progress is being made on stairs to the outdoor classroom and entrance signage. BAG is planning a Church Beautification Day, Saturday, October 22. Bettie young was voted to be PBUUC's representative to the UUA Capital Cluster group for 1 year.

At our Retreat in August, Board Goals for the year were drafted, and these were approved at the meeting. The Goals are:

- Fulfill Board of Trustees responsibilities with regard to the Ministerial Search Committee.
- ➢ Improve communications within the Board of Trustees and information sharing with the PBUUC community.
- » Clarify leadership roles and decision making processes.
- ➢ Pursue strategic plan (which potentially would include development of a capital campaign within the next five years).
- Review, evaluate, and (as needed) establish charters for church committees and other entities.
- ≈ Follow-up on application of processes and procedures that were first established by the 2015-16 Board.
- Manage for financial sustainability. (Which may include directions to the Budget Leadership Team to develop plans for an audit or outside, independent evaluation of the church finances.)

A sub-group of the Board will develop specific and measureable actions that will be associated with each goal.

Ministerial Search Committee

BEYOND CATEGORICAL THINKING

Greetings from the Ministerial Search Committee! I first want to thank you all for completing your surveys and lending your voices to the cottage meetings and individual interviews. Your participation will help guide and inform MSC decisions over the coming weeks and months.

Now that the information gathering portion of the search is coming to a close, we are turning our attention to the Beyond Categorical Thinking workshop. Every congregation in search goes through this workshop in order to ensure that we find the best possible match for our community.

Some questions you may be asking yourself...

- > Will the new minister hear me?
- Will my concerns and needs be met?
- > Will the minister understand what I'm living with?
- > How will the community respond to our minister?

In answering these questions, a picture of the "ideal minister" (categorized by age, gender, gender identity, nationality, physical ability, race, and sexual orientation) may come to mind. With this picture in place, it can be easy to unintentionally exclude ministers who fall into certain categories. At times, as we get caught up in comparing candidates to our "picture," we can even forget what it is we hoped for in a minister in the first place.

On Sunday October 23, from noon to 3pm, PBUUC will participate in the Beyond Categorical Thinking (BCT) workshop offered by the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA), for congregations involved in the search for a new minister. The PBUUC Ministerial Search Committee invites and encourages all congregational leaders, members, and friends to participate in this workshop.

The Beyond Categorical Thinking program is designed to promote inclusive thinking and help prevent unfair discrimination in the search process for a new minister. This program includes a Sunday morning service with BCT workshop facilitators, immediately followed by lunch and a three hour workshop. It's a long day, but an important one. In the workshop, we will:

- * Consider the hopes, expectations, and concerns we have for a new minister
- * Learn more about the ministerial search process, and

* Explore how thinking categorically about people sometimes interferes with choosing the best candidate.

Come on Sunday October 23, directly after service to have some lunch and to participate in this UUA-sponsored workshop, to be held in the Meeting House, led by Amanda Schuber, UUA facilitator, with the PBUUC Ministerial Search Committee. We specifically invite PBUUC's Youth to join us, and of course, childcare will be provided for those youngest among us.

The selection of a minister is very important to the future of our church. The Beyond Categorical Thinking workshop is another opportunity for everyone in our congregation to be a part of that process.

Religious Exploration

Peeking in on the Religious Exploration Classes for Children and Youth

Those of you who are sitting in worship on Sunday mornings may be curious.. "What happens in the Religious Exploration classes at PBUUC?" As DMRE, I am fortunate to be able to peek in on each class. Let me share a peek with you! I see rapt faces, captivated by a story. Next door, children with their hands raised look eager to share their responses to the story of the day; and some more personal sharing of their own experiences. I hear their clear voices while the other children and the teachers turn toward them, listening attentively.

Something catches my eye in the room across the hall... our junior youth are waving the sparkling, colorful magic wands they've created in the "Harry and U.U." Harry Potter-based class. They are casting spells to change life for the better. Along with the senior youth, they are also learning about the very real problems of illiteracy, and planning for a book drive.

Then I smell pizza wafting through the doorway of Room 1. (Yes, even at 10:30 am, teens are happily eating 'za!) The youth are gathered in a circle with their advisors, checking in about their own experiences as school begins. The conversation shifts into issues of illiteracy, and the inequality of learning opportunities in many vulnerable communities. Their book drive is one small step toward providing access to books.

In sum, what happens in our R.E. classes?: Young people sharing thoughts, listening to one another with interest and compassion, get silly and laugh, create unique, "magical" projects and reflect on issues of justice and such big ideas of faith as compassion, justice, and equality. Our teachers are every bit as engaged in sharing and listening, being silly and serious, reading and reflecting as are the youth. Together, they gather as one to create their own sacred space and spiritual community through the common bond of being and ever-becoming U.U.'s.

What happens in PBUUC's RE classrooms? On Sunday mornings, I catch glimpses of the transformative process of faith development, which will shape the hearts and consciousness of these young people throughout their lives. There's a lot going on over here in R.E.! More than meets the eye.

Request for Stories: How Unitarian Universalism Changed My Life

Skinner House Books announces a call for short, personal stories about how Unitarian Universalism dramatically changed the course of people's lives. These will be collected into an anthology and published as a book, edited by Rev. Meg Riley, senior minister at the Church of the Larger Fellowship. This collection will show through real-life stories the ways that Unitarian Universalist (UU) congregations and UU theology, community, and justice making can transform us. Many introductory books about Unitarian Universalism provide heady explanations of UU history and theology. But this anthology would show the felt impact of the faith on real people through their personal testimonials. The stories may be characterized by, but are not limited to, phrases such as, "The love of this community brought me back from a place of despair," "I thought churches didn't accept LGBT (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender) people until I discovered Unitarian Universalism," and "Unitarian Universalism saved my life." We believe that Unitarian Universalism changes the lives of all who are committed to it, but for this book we're looking for the stories that show Unitarian Universalism tangibly and dramatically changing the course of a life.

Taken together, these personal narratives will introduce Unitarian Universalism to readers and demonstrate its transformative potential. The stories may be published anonymously at the author's request, though the editor and publisher of the book will know the author's identity.

October. ADORE's (A Dialogue On Race & Ethnicity) Next Focus: A Book Discussion

ADORE is planning a book discussion as its next focus. The two books under consideration are Between The World And Me, by Ta-Nehisi Coates and The Third Reconstruction, by Rev. Dr. William J. Barber II.

DARTT envisions a three-part discussion once a month, beginning in October and ending in December. Participants would be expected to attend all three sessions. The chosen book would be available in early October for purchase after Sunday Service.
