Minister's Column

I've shared with the congregation some of my thoughts about Donald Trump. One comment I have made more than once is that I find plausible the idea, suggested by some, that he suffers from a mental illness, namely some form of narcissistic personality disorder. I want to be clear about two things. One is that these remarks of



mine are not intended as any kind of joking or ridicule; I'm not trying to blithely say, "He's crazy!" I actually find the prospect of a president with a serious mental illness quite terrifying. The other thing I want to make clear is that I am in no way implying that someone with a serious illness — mental or physical — couldn't or shouldn't be president, or have some other important responsibility. What terrifies me about Trump is not the possibility that he is ill; it is the likelihood that he is ill and seems utterly unaware that he has an illness. The problem is not the illness itself as much as it is a lack of self-awareness.

We all have mental, physical and yes, even spiritual challenges; no mortal being can escape them. They might limit our capacity to do certain things, but in many cases, they do not limit us if we are aware of those challenges and taking appropriate steps to manage our challenges. That can involve looking honestly at ourselves and facing things which may not always be pleasant to face. A person diagnosed with diabetes will probably have to look at eating habits, lifestyle choices, and may have to give diligent attention to things like medication regimens. One diabetic person I know doesn't enjoy the constant blood level checks, but says, "It beats the alternative!" There is a self-awareness in this, a healthy sense of responsibility that recognizes a difficult truth: in order to live well, we have to adopt disciplines of honesty with ourselves and of putting aside our personal preferences sometimes to do what's truly good for us, rather than succumbing to the temptation to do what may feel good in the evanescent moment.

Self-awareness is a spiritual discipline. When we participate in the life of our church, how self-aware are we? How honest with ourselves are we about our anger, our fears, our personal needs? How attentive are we to the need to manage our own personal challenges in a healthy way? Religious life calls us to these disciplines. It also calls us to be in community with others who are striving and struggling to be self-aware. Do we call one another to be our best selves in ways that are both honest and respectful?

As we do the work of the church in these times, we feel a sense of urgency about the challenges of our country and our world. PBUUC is also a congregation in search for new clergy leadership. Facing these opportunities and challenges, and managing in an honest and healthy way the anxieties they cause us, are among the most important disciplines of our shared faith journey.

Board of Trustees

The BOT held a retreat at PBUUC on Saturday, January 14 facilitated by Rev. Megan Foley, Regional Lead Congregational Life Staff, all members attending. She worked with the BOT on reviewing the BOT Covenant. The agenda also included discussion of our successes, focusing our energies, strategic planning, Rev. Keeley's sermon on engagement, role of BOT as congregational leaders, and review of BOT goals.

All current members of the BOT attended the regular January meeting. Additionally the Secretary and Assistant Treasurer were in attendance. There were eight members of the congregation present for all or part of the meeting. Since the last Branches article the BOT has experienced the following changes: Muriel Morisey resigned and Carmelita Carter-Sykes assumed the vacant Co-Chair position and Tess Morrison became the Vice-Chair.

The Interim Minister, DRME, Treasurer and MSC submitted monthly reports.

Ken Redd presented his report as BAG liaison including a proposal for upgrading the sound system and a status report on the parking lot.

Carmelita Carter-Sykes will convene the BLT Committee.

There was a presentation by three long time members of PBUUC to the BOT discussing their concerns about financial and governance matters.

The BOT voted to:

- Have independent process review of the church's books this year followed by a full audit next year;
- To only include BOT voted on actions and discussions in the Branches article;
- To reimburse Liz Citrin for Amazon cards she bought for the staff;
- To establish a Council of Committees and Personnel led by Rev. Keely and By-Laws Review committee that will be worked on by Muriel Morisey.

There was discussion of committee charters liaisons and POC's, housekeeping and office organization, the Member Review list that Chuck Bury is working on that is due February 1, 2017. BOT must schedule a meeting to approve it and work on the February Town Hall Meeting.

Ministerial Search Committee

Greetings from the Ministerial Search Committee!

Every month I feel like I share how busy we are, and every month feels like we're more busy than the month prior. Over the last few weeks we have received the much anticipated Ministerial Reports of the ministers interested in coming to Paint Branch. We had a nice number to work with and we took about a week to review them. After that initial review, we decided on those applicants with whom we'd like to exchange full packets. We took another week to delve deep into those packets and to get "virtually" acquainted with those interested ministers. We listened to audio files and YouTube videos of their sermons, we read some of their writings, and we tried to learn as much as we could about their ideas and experiences in ministry. We are now at the point where we are talking to the ministers we'd like to interview, which thanks to technological advances, will occur via video chat. All of this has happened in a matter of three weeks.

Before the next Branches comes out, we will all but vanish from Paint Branch and be off on several consecutive precandidating weekends. As such, I'd like to talk a little bit more about confidentiality.

Remember this bit from last month's article?:

"Going forward, as we begin interacting with these prospective ministers, who may or may not have a congregation with whom they may or may not have shared that they may or may not be leaving... you get where I'm going?"

You all know that we can't tell you who we're talking to or where we're going for pre-candidating. That's not new news; you've heard it before and will likely hear it again before all is said and done. What I want to talk to you about today is what to do if you discover this information on your own. The answer, if I may be so bold, is nothing. If you happen upon precandidating information on your own, we remind you that we can't talk to you about it and we ask that you don't talk to anyone else about it either. Even if, by happenstance, you're visiting another congregation and you notice us from across the room, intently listening to the guest preacher... don't be a stranger; come and say hi! But we can't talk to you about the minister. Even if after hearing the sermon, you think "Wow, they were great!" or "Yeesh, they stink!" we STILL can't talk to you about it. There are so many factors that are going in to our selection process that the sermon alone can't and won't determine whether or not we think a pre-candidate is right for Paint Branch. We appreciate your help with this, as always.

Staying on trend, the next month or so will be incredibly busy. We'll start (and finish) the initial interviews and make decisions on who our pre-candidates will be. We'll somehow coordinate and synchronize schedules for at least eight people and then we'll start the actual pre-candidating. There is so much left to do, but I can see a glimmer of light at the end of the tunnel. I hope you can see it too.

Others attend once or twice, drawn to a workshop or theme, or feeling the need for a retreat. Many parents take the kids for a shared family experience. Are you curious? intrigued by the possibility? Maybe you never knew that there ARE UU Camps! Now as camp registrations open for

<u>So, what is it like to attend a UU camp?</u> Let me guide you through a typical day at UUMAC, the UU Mid-Atlantic Community, and the only UU camp I've attended and have done so for many years. Located at De Sales University in Allentown, PA, UUMAC is closer to PBUUC than any other camp or conference. This summer I'll be back at UUMAC as children's director - and I cannot wait!

the coming summer; a good time to learn more!

So, here is one UUMAC day, yawning and stretching as the sun slants through the dormroom blinds:

It's morning! The kids ride their bikes up the hill to the cafeteria for breakfast while clusters of adults and teens amble toward a much-needed cup of coffee. Some of us are in yoga pants and carrying our mats; others ride electric scooters or carpooling from the dorm.

After breakfast, worship gathers the kids, teens, young adults, parents and older adults in *a truly* multigenerational celebration of our UU faith. The children leave for their classes. The children's program focuses on the annual theme, and fills the children's mornings with creative camp activities, outdoor games and a social action project of the week. These kids will form the kind of group spirit and friendship that happens only at camp. UU camps are the best way I know to support your child's development of a strong UU identity.

Adults attend the Theme Talk, and then a workshop of their choice. This summer's theme at UUMAC is "Across Generations, Across Time," exploring the rapid cultural changes and resulting differences in experiences and perspectives of recent generations. After the theme-talk, workshops range from creative arts, dance and music, to intellectual discussions and spiritual / religious explorations. Lunch time brings my personal favorite: an awesome salad bar, and the kids' line-up for ice cream!

Afternoon activities include the excitement of white-water rafting and amusement park rides, quiet museum tours, and the ever-popular option of relaxing, reading or crafting on campus; while kids ride bikes and play.

After dinner there may be multigenerational games, a mov-

ie, or other activities. Every night, after children are tucked into bed, adult campers provide cooperative babysitting in the dorms so that parents can dance and socialize at the "Night Owls" gatherings, or attend the evening Vespers service.

SUUSI, in North Carolina this year, is the next closest camp; and the largest in the nation. There are almost unlimited options for workshops and activitiesthough less opportunity to feel part of a close-knit community. (http://suusi.org/)

Starr Island is a very popular retreat that runs weekly camps most of the summer. (http://starisland.org/)

Our Church Administrator, Chuck Bury, has been going to Unirondack in upstate NY for 50 years and is the father of two youth campers there. He would be happy to answer any questions you have about that UU camp. (http://unirondack.org)



General Assembly (GA) is the annual meeting of our Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA). Attendees worship, witness, learn, connect, and make policy for the denomination through use of the democratic process. There are many things to do virtually every hour of the day, from June 21 to June 25. Paint Branch will probably be entitled to four delegates and four alternates, but anyone who registers may attend.

This year's GA will be in New Orleans, Louisiana, one of America's most historically and culturally rich cities. Going to GA is a significant expense. However, there are ways to economize.

Off-site Registration \$140 (You can participate in the general sessions, mini-assemblies, major worship services and view some workshops the day after they go live from the comfort of home, with the appropriate computer equipment.)

On January 8, the Prince George's Peoples' Coalition met here at Paint Branch. The meeting, initiated by Rev. Issues discussed included efforts to ban fracking in Maryland, to keep Metro from eliminating bus lines that low-wage workers depend on to get to work, to reform bail policies that unfairly disadvantage poor defendants, and to place citizens on internal police trial boards. The discussion included reports from organization representatives on progress and upcoming activities and provided opportunities to share information and volunteer to help.

In addition to giving us the opportunity to learn about a wide variety of important issues that we need to support in our wider community, the meeting gave us the opportunity to witness firsthand the kind of coalition building advocated in Rev. Barber's book, The Third Reconstruction. We will keep you informed of future meetings and hope you'll consider coming to learn about what's going on and how you can help.

On January 18, SAC hosted training for Bystander Non-Violence Intervention sponsored by the Women's March on Washington. Trainers provided by the Montgomery County Civil Rights Coalition (MOCO) trained participants in non-violent strategies to de-escalate tensions in situations of bullying, sexual harassment and assault, intimate partner violence, and race- and gender-based violence. The training was offered in advance of participating in the Women's March on Washington, January 21.

Fortunately, the training wasn't necessary. The March, with a crowd estimated at more than 500,000 in Washington alone was energetic yet peaceful, angry yet joyful. To participate along with hundreds of thousands of people—millions worldwide—in such a historically significant and righteous demonstration for inclusion, love, and resistance was, for me, a soul expanding experience that, I hope, resonates for a lifetime. With all of that, though, the struggle continues. On their website on January 22, March organizers thanked the millions of people around the world who, on January 21, came together to raise their voices for peace and sanity but noted that the "march forward does not end here." The organizers ask us to now join in a new campaign: 10 Actions for the first 100 Days (see their site). The March and the PGPC are steps on the way to a beloved community. It's nice to know we've got so much company walking with us as we go forward.

Furthermore, research has shown that intergroup contact in collaborative settings builds cultural competence and lowers bias for all. To this end STRIDE provides tuition assistance, gear, transportation, and orientation to families in the program as well as inclusion and equity training and consulting to camp and organizational staff.
