That is one way of understanding spiritual practice, but ultimately it is about attitudes and ways of living.

Minister's Column

Like a lot of folks at PBUUC and with Unitarian Universalists all over the USA, I have recently read The Third Reconstruction, a book by the Rev. Dr. William J. Barber II, co-authored with Jonathan Wilson-Hartgrove (http://bit.ly/2cdjcnX).



This book is this year's Common Read of the Unitarian Universalist Association (http://www.uua.org/re/adults/read), and it gives me hope to know that our fellow UUs nationwide are reading this text, discussing it, and being inspired and motivated by it. It is part devotional, part historical analysis, and part activism handbook. An important theme in the book can be found in this statement: "Resist the 'one moment' mentality; we are building a movement! No one victory will usher in beloved community; no single setback can stop us. We are building up a new world, moving forward together toward freedom and justice for all." This remark reminds me that the work of transformation is not just the work of days, weeks and months, but of years, decades, and generations. Patience, perseverance and a refusal to abandon hope are essential, as is the recognition that we will almost certainly not see all of our goals come to fruition in our own lifetimes. Much of our work is planting seeds; much of it is building on the accomplishments and sacrifices (and learning from the mistakes) of those who came before us. Incremental progress can feel maddeningly slow at times, but complex problems that took centuries to create often do not yield to quick solutions. These kinds of thoughts are all the more important in the times in which we now find ourselves, as longstanding problems like racism, xenophobia, sexism and irresponsible stewardship of the earth seem to now be newly emboldened by narrow-minded and cruel political movements in our country and elsewhere in the world.

I am also reminded of how this "movement, not a moment" mindset is a metaphor for institutional life. In the life of a church like PBUUC, we work ceaselessly to build upon strengths and past accomplishments and to constructively address challenges. No one person, no one leader, no one moment will resolve all the church's problems and create an ideal organization that perfectly resolves every conflict, achieves every goal, and never has any shortfall of resources, be they financial or human. This is certainly a moment in the history of this church that is full of extraordinary possibilities. But the long march of answering our call to compassion, creativity and lovingkindess takes many forms and is achieved along many different paths. *- Evan*

Board of Trustees

The BOT held it's regular monthly meeting on February 21, 2017. All current members of the BOT attended the meeting. Additionally the Secretary and Treasurer were in attendance. There were eight additional members of the congregation present who contributed their historical knowledge and ideas to the discussion of several agenda items. Carol Boston served as Process Observer,

The agenda was changed to postpone nominations from the Nominating Committee until the March 5th Town Hall meeting per John Bartoli. Regular reports were presented by the Minister, DMRE, Treasurer and submitted by the Administrator and MSC. The BAG report on a sound system upgrade was presented by Van Summers. Other BAG items like the parking lot were postponed until the next meeting.

Van Summers presented proposals for refinancing the church's mortgage. Options included refinancing at a lower rate or having members pay off our mortgage. There was a lot of discussion among BOT members and congregation members about these proposals. The BOT did not decide to move forward on any of these proposals.

The BOT voted to use a consent agenda process in preparing for our meetings; to take an online UUA sponsored course in leadership; execute a letter of engagement with GRE Financial to carry out a process review of our finances that we approved last month; and to submit last year's number of members to the UUA while we send letters to persons whose intentions for membership are unclear based on participation and giving.

In his report for February, the minister, having read and recommended a 2004 PBUUC report to the BOT, <u>Conflict Management Task Force</u>, presented questions for the BOT to consider. As a result, the BOT decided to revitalize the Mediation Program involving persons originally involved like Marj Donn, Dave Haberman, and Barbara Fairfield if possible. The minister Rev. Keely and Co-Chair Carmelita Carter-Sykes will work on this.

Board actions that remain outstanding are: approval of the January minutes, BAG reports on replacement of RE Building door, outdoor classroom, and parking lot; convening the Council of Committee Chairs and reviving the Personnel Committee.

Ministerial Search Committee

Greetings from the Ministerial Search Committee!

The Pre-candidating phase of our search is upon us! Interview questions have been prepared, references have been checked, plane tickets have been purchased, and hotel rooms have been reserved (special thanks to Kathi Yu for making all the neutral pulpit and travel arrangements for our pre-candidates and their families). We've put so much time and effort into planning for these weekends and it is FINALLY HAPPENING. You can't see me right now, but I am doing my Happy Dance.

We may not have been around much during this phase, but I promise we're not goofing off. If you're asking yourself, what exactly goes on during one of these weekends, you're in luck, because I'm about to tell you. There's a lot more to precandidating than just going to hear a minister preach at a different church on Sunday... the journey begins on Friday night. On Friday, the minister will fly or drive into town with their spouse/partner/kids (if any) in tow. Families are encouraged to come along so they can get the lay of the land and see if they could be happy living in our area. That evening, the MSC, the minister, and their family will have dinner together, either at a restaurant, or at an MSC members home. This is a casual event, where we break bread and spend some time getting know each other. On Saturday, the minister (and family) will get a guided tour. One or two members of the MSC will accompany the minister on a tour of our facilities. Remember all those requests to keep the place clean? Well, this is why. We'll also go on a real estate tour through local neighborhoods so they'll have a rough idea of the location and size of homes in our area. Saturday is also interview day. This is a private meeting where the minister and the MSC will share another meal and dive into some tough questions. The interview lasts about three hours, and that's NOT including the meal. We ask questions on the wide range of topics you've told us are important to you. We cover administration, church finance, RE, social action, staff and lay leadership relations, and everything in between. The MSC has talked a lot about finding the best possible match for us, but it's important to note that WE are being interviewed as well. Our pre-candidate needs to feel that PBUUC is a good match for THEM. This interview is our opportunity to have the "warts and all" conversation necessary in order to determine if we could have a successful ministry together. It's a long day for everyone involved, so we take Saturday night off to rest up for the next day.

On Sunday, the MSC will travel, incognito, to a neutral pulpit where we'll get to see our pre-candidate in action. We'll get to see them do Together Time, hear them preach, and scope them out during coffee hour. After service, we'll head to a restaurant where we'll share one last meal together. The aim here is to give both the MSC and the minister the opportunity to ask and answer some "last chance" questions. Once the bill has been paid and we've said our goodbyes, the MSC may choose to meet briefly to recap the weekend and give each other our initial impressions. ...and then we do it all over again.

As always, we thank you for your support as we inch closer to settled ministry.

Religious Exploration

The Time is NOW!

Now is the time to tell us you will teach in Children's Religious Exploration classes in 2017-2018. No, we are not asking you to teach now. We are asking you to make that commitment to teach now so that you can begin next year.

Why Now?

Each spring and summer, training workshops are offered through the UUA for teachers in Spirit Play and for Our Whole Lives. These classes fill quickly, and are held infrequently. NOW is the time to know if we have candidates ready to register for training.

What do R.E. Teachers do?

Teachers work in teams of four, with two adults in the classroom each Sunday. Each person teaches two Sundays per month. Our teachers learn alongside the children, from the material and also from the young people!

There are several teaching roles to fill for next year. SPRIT PLAY

Grades Pre-K and Kindergarten, and Grades 1-3 follow the Spirit Play model, a Montessori-based program. Children enter the sacred space of Spirit Play through an opening ritual in their circle of community, song, and story. They are then invited to make individual choices of creative activities for their "work time."

The Spirit Play classroom is a peaceful and cooperative environment in which teachers experience minimal

"discipline" challenges, as each child chooses what is most appealing to them. *

The most important qualification for Spirit Play is that you enjoy children!

Our stories are drawn from many sources.

In 2017-2018, our focus will be UU Identity- UU biographies, living our principles, and other aspects of Unitarian Universalism.

Spirit Play Doorkeepers- greet each child warmly as they enter, help them to settle, to get the supplies they will need for their worktime, and support the peaceful flow of a Spirit Play class.

Spirit Play Storytellers- tell the story that is the center of any Spirit Play class, and lead the discussion of the story through "wondering questions," like those we use with our Wonder Box in Together Times. Learning the story is made simple by the use of objects representing the characters and main elements of the story. No storytelling experience is needed- a love of stories, and of children, are the best qualifications you bring!

JUNIOR YOUTH

Our Junior High class encompasses roughly Grades 4-7. (Varying somewhat dependent on the age distribution of the kids). Enjoying fun activities and probing conversations with young people are your best qualifications to lead our wonderful junior youth! Next year, we are offering a FUN and interactive class for this age group called "Riddle and Mystery." This curriculum of the UUA addresses the Big Questions at the heart of all world religions; Who am I? What is my path in life? Where am I going? What happens when I die?

Junior Youth Leaders plan for and lead engaging activities and discussions. The primary activity of next year's class will be videotaping a "UU News" program, presenting their answers to these questions. No great technical skill is involved as the youth will script and film this show. A good camera- on your cell phone or other- will be helpful.

Senior Youth Leaders- Our senior high youth group is small and is not holding meetings at this time. As we organize ourselves for next year we will need to regroup to engage our senior high students. Your enthusiasm for working with this age group will be the key!

OUR WHOLE LIVES

The Our Whole Lives Human Sexuality classes offer comprehensive sexuality education in the context of Unitarian Universalist values: Rights, Responsibilities and Relationships. O.W.L. is taught through a series of ageappropriate classes at different stages of development. We need trained leaders at ALL stages of this amazing curriculum to continue to offer this to our congregation. **Elementary O.W.L.** is offered at two different levels at PBUUC; Grades 1 & 2, and Grades 4 & 5.

Next year, we will be offering the class for **Grades 4 & 5**. We need at least one male and one female teacher for this class! It is taught in **just 8 sessions**, and offered after service. Teachers may still attend all worship services. Teaching O.W.L. is one of the most rewarding experiences in UU RE!

Junior High O.W.L. will be offered at the UU Church of Silver Spring. We would like to offer one teacher to the team if possible, and begin to build a trained cohort of teachers at PBUUC.

Adult O.W.L. classes may also be offered if we find teachers! You will need to attend the weekend long O.W.L. training. This class is very popular in many UU congregations. We'd love to offer it at Paint Branch; and extend our O.W.L. program to "Our Whole Lives."

All of our teachers receive the training and support they need to succeed in nurturing the learning, growth and faith formation of our children and youth. You will enjoy the experience of teaching in religious exploration classes; and you will be surprised how much you learn and grow yourself and your own faith and UU identity.

When you choose to teach, you choose a meaningful and essential role in the life of this congregation.

Early Registration Open UUA General Assembly 2017 Our Denomination's Annual Gathering

General Assembly (GA) is the annual meeting of our Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA). Attendees worship, witness, learn, connect, and make policy for the denomination through use of the democratic process. There are many things to do virtually every hour of the day, from June 21 to June 25. Paint Branch will probably be entitled to four delegates and four alternates, but anyone who registers may attend.

This year's GA will be in New Orleans, Louisiana, one of America's most historically and culturally rich cities. Going to GA is a significant expense. However, there are ways to economize.

Register Early. March 1 to April 30. After May 1, all fees increase.

Adult: \$360; Youth (Grades 9-12): \$215; Off-site Registration: \$140 (you can participate in the general sessions, mini-assemblies, major worship services and view some workshops the day after they go live from the comfort of home, with the appropriate computer equipment.)

Apply for Financial Assistance or Volunteer to Work at GA to Waive Your Registration Fee from March 1 to March 30.

Book Housing Early. The <u>UUA Housing Website</u> is now open. Inexpensive and/or close-in housing often sells out within hours. Once you have registered, you will be added to an online GA Forum where information on transportation and hotel/dorms options will be shared.

UUSJ's Immigration team was asked to follow-up on this development, provide documentation on the troublesome exchange, and ask its members to share stories of problematic interactions with ICE. Of particular interest is any instance of access to facilities being denied that is paired with documentation of said refused access.

What Now? We Have a Plan

One positive outcome of the Trump presidency is the continuing wave of activism it has generated. Initial angst and rage seem to be transforming into organized resistance. A problem, however, is there are so many new organizations and groups asking for participation, support, and funding, it's hard to slog through the emails, and the number seems to be increasing.

The New Social Justice Coalition. Here at Paint Branch, some have expressed concerns that social justice activities seem to be all over the place, with committees competing for time and space and people from a limited pool of resources. So, the chairs of SAC, DARTT, and the Green Team met recently to discuss forming a coalition—the Social Justice Coalition.

It's in the early stages but we've already planned to coordinate efforts in the form of "Conscientious Projector" nights. We will be offering movies and documentaries covering a variety of social justice issues, including environmental justice for our planet. Please visit the Social Justice Bulletin Board in the hallway to find out about new and upcoming events and the next featured Conscientious Projector screening. In coming months we will offer other collaborative ventures. We heard your concerns and are working toward developing a more focused, cohesive approach to Social Justice at Paint Branch.

UU-Wide Efforts. UUs for Social Justice (UUSJ) has also been working to order the chaos. Through training, conferences, and campaigns, they hope to harness the determination of UUs nationwide to live into our Seven Principles. In the National Capitol region, UUSJ is channeling UU energies and focusing our efforts to create the change we want to see by using our proximity to the national seats of power and the accessibility of congressional offices and staff.

UU Advocacy Training: UUSJ invites UUs interested in making regular visits to Capitol Hill to join their Advocacy Corps to make regular visits to members of Congress and their staff on issues that protect human rights, our planet, and our democracy. We UUs in the national Capitol region are uniquely positioned to be the Hill presence for our denomination. The first of these monthly Capitol Hill visits happened on February 14. Harry Schomberg reported on the visit.

Reversing Escalating Inequality Conference. UUs for a Just Economic Community (UUJEC) and UUSJ are or-

ganizing this Conference for UUs nationwide with justice allies including <u>Sister Simone Campbell</u> and <u>Chuck Collins</u>. The conference, which will run from Monday, April 3, through Wednesday, April 5, will give UUs an opportunity to advocate for UU values and promote UU Principles. During the Conference, we will learn about the issues and how to build advocacy skills. We will then visit Capitol Hill to talk with decision makers. KITCHEN CONCERNS

In taking a good look at our Meeting House kitchen after using it for so many years, I've made some observations which I'll pass along here for all to consider. It is of course, as old as the rest of the building and showing its age and evidence of many years of wear of tear. It's important to us both in terms of our own use, and how it presents to any potential renters of our space. In my opinion we should be exploring plans to upgrade it, maybe doing that in three stages.

The first would be to improve its general appearance as we spruce up the rest of the building in preparation for a new minister. Some of us have been working on that after Sunday services for a few weeks. Anyone who would like to join us in that effort need only to stop by any Sunday and pitch-in. If you use the kitchen for any purpose during this time, please respect the work being done and leave it as tidy as you found it. If you've left any of your own dishes, pots, pans, utensils or food in there following any recent events, please retrieve them as we will soon be removing and disposing of any excess. The windows and window sills need to be washed and the plants removed and given some intensive care before returning. The untidy and nonhygenic trashcans, brooms and mops in the corner should be contained and perhaps relocated. The floor needs to be washed and waxed so, any staff responsible for this task, please let us know what this requires and when it can be done. Thank you so much to Jerome Louison for fixing the drawers and cabinet doors! What a difference!

The second stage would be a group, ideally made up of people who regularly use the kitchen and are familiar with it, to spend some time doing a more thorough cleaning, maybe this summer. Some suggested tasks include reorganizing the cabinets and drawers. Items of any type which we don't use or have too many of, should be disposed of (tossed, donated, recycled, or offered for donations). The remaining inventory and the new locations of all items might be listed in a small binder so all users could find and, just as importantly, correctly replace any item they use. The stoves, including the ovens, should be cleaned. The warming oven and its trays need thorough cleaning. The refrigerator should also be purged and thoroughly cleaned. Non-

kitchen items currently taking up space in the kitchen should be identified and relocated.

The third stage would be a group growing out of this process who would act as an on-going committee to form a plan for renovating the kitchen over the long-term. This would include replacing appliances, replacing or refinishing countertops, and repainting walls and cabinets. And possibly, a dream of mine, replacing the curved tables, dingy but oh so essential, with two similarly sized islands with storage underneath and locking wheels so they can be moved for floor cleaning or perhaps to occasionally serve as buffets in another space. Financing for much of this could come from Legacy Fund grants over a period of several years.

Then I hope, after investing all their thought and work into this project, those involved would remain working as a kitchen committee to keep a watchful eye on the kitchen and continue to maintain what is one of our primary assets.

I offer all this as observations and suggestions. I'll be happy to help if others are like-minded, but would like to see it as a cooperative venture with no one (especially me!) in charge.
