Minister's Column

Excerpts from the Interim Minister's 2017 Annual Report:

I view this church's Religious Exploration ministry as of the healthiest and most dynamic elements of congregational life. I have striven to continue to give the new Director of Multigenerational Religious Exploration my enthusiastic support. Multigenerational worship has been rich this year, and programming for children has continued energetically. I am especially optimistic about a new multigenerational program that the DMRE and the MRE Team have launched this spring: Food, Fun & Faith Fridays.

I think that one of the most notable achievements during the past two years was the placement of a banner in front of the church which incorporates motifs of the rainbow, a distinctive Standing on the Side of Love heart, and the phrase "BLACK LIVES MAT-TER." I feel like the process that went into this decision, culminating last June with a banner, was a constructive, inclusive and healthy one. I felt strongly that before the banner went up, there should be some dialogue with the local police, and I was gratified that congregational leaders reached out and participated in what I thought was a beneficial conversation with the local police chief and some members of his staff. I doubt I was the only person who was both saddened yet not surprised when our rainbow/ SSL/BLM banner was stolen. We replaced it right away, with some congregants eagerly contributing money and time to the effort. While none of us can be glad that some ignorant, fearful person(s) stole the sign, it was an opportunity to reaffirm our resolve to witness for black and LGBTQ lives.

Passing the Torch

Saturday, June 17, Beacon House celebrated its 25th anniversary with a fund-raiser celebration to honor Rev. Donald Robinson, founder of Beacon House: a fund raiser for obvious reasons, a celebration because Rev. Robinson is retiring. Many in the PBUUC family have worked with Rev. Robinson and the children of Beacon House and know of the wonderful work that organization has accomplished.

Rev. Robinson founded Beacon House in 1991 to fill a need for youth-oriented social service programs and decided to start it in Edgewood, then a drug- and violence-plagued neighborhood. At that time, Robinson was a federal employee and an educator working with D.C.'s youth services administration. In a 2016 interview, Robinson said it seemed to him that the people he worked with "... were not concerned about improving the lives of the kids they were supposed to be serving." So he left his federal job and, using his own savings, began a program that today has provided educational, tutoring, mentoring, cultural, athletic, recreation, and nutrition programs as well as college and vocational training to thousands of at-risk, low-income children. Beacon House's educational and athletics programs have laid the foundation for hundreds of children to attend college, many on full scholarships, and go on to build prosperous, successful lives.

Based in the Edgewood Terrace housing complex, Beacon House serves not only the children of the complex but children throughout the neighborhood and D.C.; and since 1991, Edgewood has been transformed from a drug-infested blight to a welcoming community. In 2007, when the 31 members of the Beacon House Falcons 90-pound Peewee Division won the national football championship in the Pop Warner Super Bowl in Orlando, on their arrival back at Edgewood Terrace they were met with welcome-home banners and balloons as these 10 through 12 year olds arrived from the airport with their police escort, cheered on by a crowd from not only Edgewood, but from all over DC. Because of the Beacon House programs, a strong sense of community has developed. Dr. Monica Ruiz calls it "the Beacon House effect."

Monica S. Ruiz, PhD, MPH, is an assistant research professor at the George Washington University. In 2012, Beacon House asked GWU to formally assess its athletics program, measuring the physical and mental wellbeing of the youths and comparing them to their D.C. peers and young people nationwide. Dr. Ruiz took on the assignment and 57 Beacon House athletes were surveyed in 2013. The finding was that compared to their peers, Beacon House athletes had higher levels of selfesteem, were more resilient, less likely to succumb to peer pressure, and more likely to stay in school. "The kids know that this community has their back," said Ruiz. "There's something about the community of Beacon House itself that really lends support to the kids.... We see this in the mental health variables."

Thousands of lives have been touched, perhaps hundreds saved as a result of Rev. Robinson's vision. And through the years, members of PBUUC have been actively involved in realizing that vision.

Rev. Robinson retires and PBUUC goes on, there is still so much work to do to make our world a better, safer place for all children. In doing the work of social justice, we work to make our world a better, safer place. We now begin a new chapter here at PBUUC, with our new minister. Let us now renew our dedication to UU principles and commitment to UU values because work done for the cause of social justice—wherever we see a need—is ultimately work in service to all children.

Help Open Hearts and Doors in West Virginia

The Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Charleston, WV is West Virginia's largest and only minister-led congregation. For many years we have been a beacon of progressive religion and an incubator of activism in the capital of a red state. Since the election, we have been experiencing a spike in attendance during Sunday worship and throughout the week, which has made our already problematic entry spaces an even bigger problem.

People are coming for spirit and community and have been getting these - but our physical capacity has been preventing some of the folks who try to get here from getting inside. Whether an inability to find parking, get up our ramp, or open our doors - our physical space has prevented people from entering into the sanctuary they are seeking. Help get more folks into our congregation in a time when our state is in need of space for community, healing and inspiration.

Help us to:

- Purchase new entrance doors, as the current doors are difficult for many to open and close
- Fix entry ramp, as it has developed a large drop from ramp to lot, making it very difficult to get onto
