Notes from the Minister

October 31 was the 500th anniversary of the beginning of the fter the service
Reformation. It made me wonder, what are the reforms that we, as Unitarian Universalists so sorely need to make? What are the changes that will save our faith, will save us, and will help us?
How will we live into our values more fully?

Here are some areas where we need some reform:

Race and Class – Unitarian Universalism has perpetuated a bias for whiteness and higher class in action and policy. We are working on this bias, and might be at a turning point, but this has happened before. Will we this time make a meaningful and significant shift?

we villainize Christians and Christianity – and yet these are our roots. We come from many different religious roots, and yet tend to be most critical of Christianity as a faith. Some of us have been wounded by Christianity, and some of us have found our way to Christianity. And together we seek to be here, in a pluralistic worship community, where we espouse a tolerance and welcoming of each spiritual path, mine and yours. Let us work to be as inclusive of Christianity as we are of other spiritual journeys.

★ We know how best to help − We too often think we are the ones to help and advise. let us move instead into a posture of being with: Being with, being in relationship with; let us come from a place of believing that each person knows what they need, and asking that question: What do you need? What is the most important thing here for you. Let me be with you in that deep need, let me follow your lead, let me affirm that you are the

➢ A smugness about spiritual path - Let us remember our commitment to pluralism, to finding meaning, to the spiritual shift that sometimes happens for us during our lives, that it might happen for me, it might happen for you. We need more humility.

We seek to build an inclusive religious community, connected by love spirit and service. We are a saving faith. Our Unitarian Unita

love, spirit and service. We are a saving faith. Our Unitarian Universalist faith and teaching is needed by so many, and resonates with people who have not found our Universalist message in other places. We value You. We value each person, and each person's faith journey. People are emotionally and spiritually rescued and Saved by this message. We are valued and valuable, just the way we are, and are meant to be in relationship. None of us are perfect, and none of us are more perfect than another. We – each of us – have things to teach, things to learn and ways to grow.

May it be so.

I want to start out by saying that I am very appreciative of all the people who have participated in the life of this church. Every person who passes through doors makes a difference. This month, I want to especially call out everyone who participated in the auction, from planning to execution to participating in bidding to cleaning up and tallying the proceeds. The event was a wonderful success and goes a long way in providing funds to keep the church going.

As a new board member as well as Chair, I have the unique opportunity to introduce minor changes in board process, simply because I am looking at everything with fresh eyes. The bottom line, both figuratively and literally, is that we "Each take responsibility to make this the best darn Board of Trustees ever."

Our Famous UU for December: Charles Dickens



Charles Dickens (February 7, 1812-June 9, 1870), a great English novelist of the 19th century, was a Unitarian. He is well-known as a voice for social justice, exposing the heartless oppression of the poor in his novels and stories. His story, <u>A Christmas Carol</u>, has become a classic of the Christmas season, with

its story of the transformation of the human soul.

Although Dickens was baptized and reared in the Church of England and was a nominal Anglican for most of his life, he turned to Unitarianism in the 1840s and associated with Unitarians until the end of his life. In 1842 Dickens traveled to America. He hoped to find in the United States progressive religious bodies, free from state control. Although disappointed with most American churches, he returned home full of enthusiasm for New England Unitarians in general, and Reverend William Ellery Channing in particular.

In The Life of Our Lord, Dickens summarized his faith as "to do good always." He believed humanity, created in the image of the divine, retained a seed of good. He preached the gospel of the second chance. The world would be a better place if, with a change of heart, people were to treat others with kindness and generosity.

Northwest Arkansas Worker Justice Center: Magaly Licolli was born in Leon, Guanajuato, Mexico. She's been living in Arkansas for 13 years, and throughout those years working closely with the immigrant community, she learned the struggles of the immigrant community in this area. She's currently working to bring the GFPP (Good Food Purchasing Program) campaign to Arkansas by collaborating with local farmers, environmentalist and other allies to keep supporting workers efforts in quest of dignity and respect in poultry plants.

Greater Minnesota Worker Center: Ahmed Ali has been the Executive Director of Greater Minnesota Worker Center since January, 2017. He has served as the Lead Staff organizer from December, 2014 to December, 2016 and as a founding board member and the board vice chair for the two years before 2013-2014. He has a decade of experience in nonprofit management, planning, community and labor organizing. Ahmed is pursuing Master of Business Administration at St Cloud State University and has studied Mass Communications (BS), Political Science (BA) and International Relations (BA) at the same university.

News and notes about Paint Branch

What's up with the new parking lot?

The County has to do some additional design work in our parking lot, because they are now going to route the runoff from a section of Powder Mill Road through the wet-weather ponds. Additional survey work is in process to support the additional design work. At this point we think the construction will happen Summer 2018.

How is it going with the new Sound System and Internet Improvements?

The new sound system and hearing assist loop is basically finished. We are still working to ensure that we can use some of our previous equipment and resolving a few questions. We are training and supporting our Building Managers so that we have a consistently good quality experience during worship. In addition, Van Summers has developed a guide and training to help those who need to know, so they can start up the system and get it working. We have just begun work improving the WiFi in both the Meeting House and the RE Building, so that better internet connectivity is available in those two buildings.

On-Line Presence? What's that about?

We have a team of folks looking at how to increase our visibility so people can find us when they might be looking. And you can help! We have two types of Facebook presence: one is our <u>Facebook Page</u>, which is public, and the other is our Facebook Group, which is private. If you haven't gone to both, here's how to do it: Go to our website. At the top is a listing of options. Hover over Community and click on the top option, **PBUUC Facebook**. Unitarian Universalist Association Makes Call for Personal Testimony

The Board of Trustees of the UUA appointed a Commission on Institutional Change last Spring. The Commission is charged with long-term cultural and institutional change that redeems the essential promise and ideals of Unitarian Universalism. Its focus is an analysis of structural racism and white supremacy within the UUA.

Longer term Paint Branchers will notice that one of the Commission members is Rev. Natalie Fenimore, our former Director of Religious Education.

The Commission wants to hear from us—<u>all</u> of us because oppression hurts everyone including those who appear to be its beneficiaries. Here are the personal testimony guidelines.

The Commission on Institutional Change requests personal accounts and stories about how racism has affected individuals and groups within Unitarian Universalism at the personal, institutional, or systemic levels. It is seeking to document incidents that occurred between individual Unitarian Universalists, within a congregational or Associational setting, or as a result of white-centeredness embedded within the greater Unitarian Universalist culture. Within this context, the Commission asks you to respond to the following questions with specific examples:

- In what ways have you or your group or community been hurt by current racist and culturally biased attitudes and practices within Unitarian Universalism?
- In what ways have we, as a faith community, been living outside of our values and commitments?

Please note that no information provided in these testimonials will be shared with attribution without the prior consent of the author. The Commission is mindful that certain details in submissions can be revealing and commits to treating all submissions with full trust and confidence.
