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Ministerial Search Committee by John Bartoli

We Retreat Together and Advance Towards Our Goal and Beyond...

he eight members of the Ministerial Search Committee went on an overnight retreat to Bon Secours Spiritual Center in Marriottsville, Maryland, at the beginning of July. The Joseph Priestley District provided us with a facilitator, **Judith Bauer**, who was well experienced with running retreats and in particular retreats for search committees. Judith led us through a number of playful and thoughtful exercises that helped us learn more about each other, discover what our talents are, and reinvigorate our reasons for being on the search committee.

We created a covenant where we pledged to dedicate ourselves to the ministerial search in a confidential, honest, and communicative process. Above all we dedicated ourselves to find out, to the best of our ability, what the congregation was looking for in its next settled ministry in particular and the future direction of the church in general.

With this as our core, we were able to consider more of the business of the committee. We discussed some principles for making the many decisions we will have to make along the way to finding a successful candidate(s) for Paint Branch. Judith also led us through the basic techniques of interviewing potential candidates, both on the phone and in person.

All this preparation led up to the parceling out of the individual tasks that comprise a Search Committee's work. Within a few minutes, all the jobs were filled. Bettie Young and Michael Leger will Co-Chair the committee. Michael and Bettie also agreed to be point persons on checking references of prospective candidates. Bettie Young will also be the MSC member on the compensation committee that determines the financial package we will offer our future minister(s). Muriel Morisey will continue to keep the minutes and monitor internal communication within the committee. Rene McDonald will head the effort to create and edit our "packet," the information that we send potential interested candidates about our own congregation. Rene will also arrange appropriate hospitality for candidates that make the first cut.

Marge Owens will be the committee
Treasurer. Tricia Most will arrange the neutral pulpit sites for the "pre-candidating" weeks. Beth Lyons will head the information gathering phase of our work, looking at congregational survey results and organizing cottage meetings. John Bartoli will work as "communications czar," keeping the congregation informed of the committee's progress through newsletter articles, web presence, and other public relations vehicles.

By the time you read this article, we will have met with our District Search Representative, **Nancy Dean**. This will be our chance to coordinate with her our planned calendar checklist of tasks to perform to keep us on track for a successful search.

We have also arranged for a UU- sponsored congregational service and workshop called Beyond Categorical Thinking (BCT) to promote inclusive thinking and help prevent unfair discrimination in the ministerial search process. On Sunday, August 24, our new interim ministers, Phyllis Hubbard and John Manwell, along with Keith Kron of the UUA and Worship Associate Tosha O'Neal, will present a search-related worship service at 10a.m. followed by a 3-hour workshop designed to help us consider our hopes, expectations and concerns in regard to our search for new settled ministry. Lunch and child care will be provided. We will continue to meet on a weekly basis through the summer and through the entire search process. The Ministerial Search Team Needs Your Participation On Sunday August 24, 2008

s you know, the Search Committee's work in seeking new settled ministry is underway.

One of the first steps in the search process is the Beyond Categorical Thinking program at church on Sunday, August 24, 2008. The program begins with the 10:00am worship service, after which there will be a congregational luncheon, followed by a 3-hour workshop. Both the worship service and workshop will be led by **Keith Kron** of the UUA to help Paint Branch members and friends think about new settled ministry.

The Beyond Categorical Thinking (BCT) program works with Unitarian Universalist congregations to promote inclusive thinking by creating opportunities for conversations and reflection, and for the congregation to identify issues related to identity. We will be encouraged to consider our hopes, expectations, biases, and concerns regarding new ministry, learn more about the search process, and explore how thinking categorically about people interferes with choosing the best candidate. Congregational involvement in the August 24 worship service and 3-hour workshop will help us to think about next steps in our Search process, such as further consultation, education, or training beyond the BCT program.

The Search Committee urges your participation in this important program! Please mark your calendars now and plan to attend both the worship and the 3 hour workshop and to enjoy the gourmet luncheon in between.



Our facilitator for the Beyond Categorical Thinking program, **Keith Kron**, is the Director of the Office of Bisexual, Gay, Lesbian and Transgender Concerns from the UUA Office of Identity-Based Ministries. He will lead the worship service with worship associate **Tosha**

O'Neal. **Phyllis Hubbard** and **John Manwell**, our new interim ministers, will also be involved in this important BCT program.

O Child Care and the luncheon are being provided to encourage you to commit to full attendance in the worship and 3 hour workshop. Financial Notes by Ellen Cotts, Treasurer

It is the dog days of summer. Very hot and it has been humid, although not today. Fortunately I don't mind the heat but I know that fall is coming with an upsurge in church activity. We seem to be off to a good start with wonderful summer services led by our talented and resourceful Worship Associates. I know we are all looking forward to having Phyllis Hubbell and John Manwell with us as Interim Ministers.



But that brings me to another financial topic, and that is the search for a new settled minister. I am very familiar with the process since I work with search committees in this area on behalf of the UUA (Although they won't allow me to work with my own congregation). Nevertheless, I know that it is expected that the search will cost about \$24,000 over two years.

What, you ask, could possibly cost so much? First, the Search Committee (SC) goes on retreat. This has already happened and I am told that it went very, very well. An experienced facilitator was provided by the JPD. For this we received a discount because we pay our Fair Share Dues to JPD.

From now until about October, the SC will be putting together the materials that will tell candidates who we are and what skills and talents we need in a minister. That part of the process costs a bit for materials, phone calls and mileage, but really not very much.

Then soon after Christmas, the SC will begin interviews with several (probably 3 or 4) of the final candidates. These candidates will fly here for a weekend of intense meetings with the SC. The church will be responsible for paying their air fare, hotel bills and meals. Obviously this can be rather expensive.

Later, say around April or May, the final candidate and his/her entire family will come here to meet the congregation. They will be here for a full week, including two Sundays. Again the church is responsible for air fare, hotel bills and meals.

That much of the Search process is expected to cost about \$12,000. Next year we expect to spend an additional \$12,000 to move the candidate and his or her family to this area and to have a wonderful Installation celebration. So the long and the short of it is that we need about \$12,000 this year and another \$12,000 next year.

However, due to the shortfall in pledges for this year, the BLT was able to budget only \$2,000 with the understanding that this cannot be allowed to limit the SC in its task. They will spend whatever they need to spend and we will have to find whatever money they need.

There are a number of ways we can meet this need. First of course, we will always accept donations. Just put Search Committee in the memo of any check you send in. As the year goes on, we may have special fund raisers for the Search. You can also

donate Frequent Flyer Miles or Hotel Points. If you wish to do either of these things, please call Marge Owens and let her know. As a member of the SC, she will be responsible for working out the details.



The Search is the most important thing we will do this year. We are fortunate to have a group of dedicated and wise people working on it. I am confident that they will make the best choice of a minister to move us ahead in the future. And we WILL provide the resources they need. Keep the faith! h

Social Action Committee News By Marge Owens

Review of "Ultimate Punishment: a Lawyer's Reflections on Dealing with the Death Penalty" by Scott Turow.

Assembly the author Scott Turow spoke before an evening meeting called by CASE (Citizens Against State Executions) and MD ACLU. His book follows his own struggle with his stance on capital punishment through accounts of criminal prosecutions as well as legal defense work he took on. The account of his service on the Illinois Governor's Commission on Capital Punishment between 1999 and 2002 is as compelling as his bestselling novels, which often take up a large section of airport bookstores.

In May of 2002, Maryland's governor, Parris Glendenning, followed the Illinois governor, George Ryan, in imposing a moratorium on the death penalty. The work of the Maryland Commission issued a report very similar to that produced in Illinois: Recommendations were made for the elimination of the death penalty and the substitution of life without parole for those convicted of heinous murders.



Scott Turow builds his book around his own conversion from holding that there were any number of reasons to impose the death penalty. He finally came to the conclusion that there is never going to be a case where there is no

doubt at all of the guilt of the person convicted. He participated in clearing many of those on death row in Illinois, often through DNA analysis. These were long struggles. His writing through the 115 pages of text keeps the reader glued to the page. He includes a section reprinting the report of the Commission on Capital Punishment he helped write, and 38 pages of legal citations at the end of the book.

The efforts to pass legislation, substituting life with no parole for capital punishment in Maryland this year, failed by a small margin. Gov. O'Malley has appointed another study commission. The issue will be pursued again with vigor. h

Congratulations to 13 members who have just received certification from the Maryland Board of Elections and Ethics as Voter Registration Volunteers.

On July 13, Mel McCottry, NAACP Voter Empowerment Project Coordinator for the Prince George's County Chapter, trained Bob Baker, Carol Boston, Marj Donn, Emma Sue Gaines-Gerson, Muriel Morisey, Tricia Most, Marge Owens, Raman Pathik, Carol Roberts, Amy Steiner, Carol Carter Walker, Peter Wathen-Dunn and Evangeline Wells.

We are now empowered to register voters, process change of addresses and party affiliations. This activity is being jointly sponsored by the Diversity/Anti-Racism Transformation Team and the Social Action Committee. Look for announcements in the Bulletin and Branches as the group plans its outreach activities.

Health Care Update for Maryland

As of July 1, 2008 tens of thousands of Marylanders are now eligible for Medicaid who had previously been left in the dark. House Bill 6 from the 2007 Special Session, The Working Families and Small Business Health Coverage Act of 2007, enacted by Governor Martin O'Malley and members of the Maryland General Assembly took effect July 1. As the law is phased in over the next couple of years, eventually over 100,000 Marylanders will now have access to great comprehensive care because of this legislation.

New Program, New Application

With the new expansion, there is also a brand new Medicaid application. The state Health Department has streamlined the new application a bit, including the removal of barriers to access such as the previously needed in-person interview. These steps were taken to try to make the process easier.

With the new application, Baltimore Health Care Access volunteers have put together an income guideline chart for Marylanders to refer to enroll new people. It has guidelines for Medical Assistance for Families (Medicaid), the Maryland Children's Health Program (MCHP), and the Primary Adult Care Program (PAC). The chart can be found on the internet at:

"Soul Work: Reflections on a Book Discussion Group."

ne of the most interesting and meaningful experiences that I have had in my eight years at Paint Branch was my participation earlier this summer in a book discussion group led by **John Bartoli** and **Carol Carter Walker**. For ten weeks, a group of Paint Branchers met every Sunday evening to discuss one of the chapters in the book "Soul Work." "Soul Work" is a collection of essays that explore various aspects of the spiritual work that is necessary to confront racism and other forms of oppression within church congregations. Because many of the authors are Unitarian Universalist ministers and theologians, our group found this to be an especially relevant book to read and discuss.

Although the book was fascinating, the real work of the group took place as we openly and honestly discussed issues of race and diversity in our congregation. Through the personal sharing that took place in the group, I began to understand for the first time what our church looks like to persons who come from different ethnic and racial backgrounds than my own. The conversations raised some difficult and challenging questions about the ways in which we welcome (or do not welcome) newcomers - and even long-term members – who are from diverse backgrounds. Our conversations also touched on the images and messages that our church conveys about itself (knowingly or not) to our visitors and to the broader community in which we live.

I have to admit that I have always wondered why our church did not look more like the community in which it is situated. According to the U. S. Census Bureau, the population of Prince George's County is approximately 67% African American, and only 27% European American. If you look around the meeting house on a typical Sunday, this is certainly not the demographic make-up of the Paint Branch congregation. We pride ourselves on being a friendly, liberal, and welcoming congregation, and yet somehow our church membership is significantly different than the broader community around us.

Now that we are in a period of ministerial transition, we have a unique opportunity as a congregation to ask the hard questions about who we are, how we got that way, and what specific steps we need to take in order to build a more inclusive community at Paint Branch. I would encourage every Paint Brancher to participate in the series of movies, workshops, and discussion groups that the Diversity and Anti-Racism Transformation Team will be sponsoring over the coming church year. For me, the Soul Work discussion group was a truly transformative experience in my spiritual journey as a Unitarian Universalist, and I am looking forward to the challenging yet rewarding work that lies ahead. h
