Walking Together by Rev. John Manwell

The financial since the Great Depression. The financial markets swing wildly from day to day. Companies that have been rocks of stability are collapsing and being taken over by the government. Our jobs and savings are at risk, and our economy seems almost on life support. And our nation seems in denial about the impact of global warming on human life.

What will be left for our children? Indeed, for ourselves?

All that we have learned of spiritual strength and wisdom will be put to the test in the months and years ahead.



Our first challenge is to remain calm, to find that place within ourselves which allows us to feel centered. "How much time," the student asked the guru, "do you spend each day in prayer?" "An hour," came the reply, "except when life seems overwhelming, then two." Like the guru, this is a season for redoubling our devotion to our spiritual lives

Our second challenge, in our calmness, is to take stock of our situation. How can we simplify our lives, live on less, set aside more for the future and for others? How can we see that, with all we have at risk, there is still so much that cannot be taken from us; the blessings of our families, all that has brought us to this point in our lives, and all that sustains us: our education, our faith, and the beauty of the earth which we inhabit?

Then surely our third challenge is to remember that we are not alone, we're all in this together. We can look to others for help, and others will look to us, friends and family members who may depend on us, and all those around us who may be even more vulnerable than we are. How can we reach out to them?

Taking stock of all of this, we may find that even in the face of the challenges which threaten us, we have resources to spare, some of them material, many of them spiritual, as we reach out a helping hand, speak a word of encouragement, and open our hearts to others.

In a poignant scene in the Hebrew Scriptures, an ambitious courier persuades the king to order the death of his kingdom's Jews. Not knowing that she is Jewish, the king has taken as his queen the beautiful Esther. Her uncle Mordecai urges Esther to plead with the king to save her people, though both of them know that it may cost her life. "Who knows?" he says, "Perhaps you have come to royal dignity for just such a time as this." She summons her courage, and succeeds.

Could it be that all that life gives us has been for just such a time as this? Together, and in the bonds of love we share, may we find the strength we need.

A Word from our Board Chair by Kate Brett

s most of you know, I did not contribute to *Branches* last month because I had been sent south for 3 weeks to help coordinate Federal medical and public health assets with state needs. I worked in Alabama, South Carolina, and Texas for 3 separate hurricanes. The federal response was still slower than one would want, and bureaucracy slowed things down, but even with that, I saw progress in the way that persons with medical needs were treated, including a much improved process for moving people into and out of harm's way.

Fortunately, several very capable people picked up the day to day work I do during my time away and most people barely noticed the absence of a Board chair. I want to thank the 2 vice-chairs, **Jonathan Mawdsley** and **Carol Carter Walker**, for stepping up.

The Board of Trustees has been very busy these last few months, and many special concerns have been raised. I want to let you know about several of these.

The Paint Branch Montessori School is dealing with the results of an incident in which two young students were found after having walked off the school premises. The Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE), Child Care Services Division came to inspect our RE building and grounds as a result. The Board has appointed a liaison committee to work with the school once their administrators receive written evaluations from the MSDE, as well as being a stable group of individuals interacting with the school. We are pleased that **Abby Crowley**, **Evangeline Wells**, and **Daniel Everitt** have agreed to take on this important job.

A woman who came to **Bob Holloways**'s memorial service fell while getting out of her car and was injured. We are concerned about her well-being and hope she gets well soon.

Finally, the Board met with the Ministerial Search Committee at the end of October. The Board affirmed our strong support for their continuing hard work to find the best ministerial candidate for our church.

They are finishing their work to create a packet that summarizes who we are as a church to exchange with potential candidates in the coming months.

I hope to see you around church. Come talk with me or any of the other Trustees with any concerns or issues, as our mission is to make sure the church is working well.

UU CIVIL RIGHTS LIVING LEGACY PILGRIMAGE FEBRUARY 11-18, 2009

he 2009 Living Legacy Civil Rights
Pilgrimage is more than a civil rights tour. It is
being planned by a team of people who
participated in Meadville Lombard's Southern Civil
Rights Tour last March and found themselves deeply
moved to the point of envisioning something more.
Perhaps you could call it "the next step," or "building
from the past to create the future." It will begin and
end in Birmingham, Alabama, and will include stops
in Marion, Selma, and Montgomery, Alabama, as
well as Meridian and Philadelphia, Mississippi.

Visiting the sites of civil rights activity forty to fifty years ago and talking with veterans of that Movement affects one's thoughts and feelings. It could be a superb preparation for deepening one's understanding and commitment for work on the issues of race, oppression, and injustice that still bedevil Unitarian Universalism.

This Living Legacy Pilgrimage is intended to bring together people who can create a vision that will connect our Unitarian Universalist legacy of work in the Civil Rights Movement to the UUA's current commitment to becoming an anti-racist, anti-oppressive, multicultural institution and to understanding the responsibility of the UUA and our congregations in doing the important work of racial reconciliation where it is indicated and necessary.

Ministerial Search Committee by John Bartoli

CONGREGATIONAL RECORD

he "Congregational Record" is what the Unitarian Universalist Association calls the exhaustive historical, financial, demographic, and philosophical description of a congregation in search of new ministry.

Our own Congregational Record, when complete, will be placed on a special password-protected UUA Transitions website. Our Ministerial Service Representative, Nancy Dean, and the UUA Transitions Director, John Weston, will review our work. Once our Congregational Record has been approved, it will be made available to all UU ministers who are currently in search. Each minister will have his or her own resume on this website which our Search Committee will then be able to see. This will allow all parties, potential candidates and our search committee, to get a sense of what the other is about and whether or not we want to find out more about each other.

There are many interesting facts that compiling the Congregational Record has brought to light. Did you know that we have 229 official adult members and that our average Sunday attendance is 114? Or that our children and youth enrollment in the Religious Exploration program is 58? Our operating pledge income this year is over \$261,000 a year from 125 pledge units. If you do the math, that means we average just over \$2,000 per pledging unit, a very high average (we are told) when compared with other UU churches. Did you know that we "employ" 12 people? our interim co-ministers share one full time position, One employee is full time (40 hours a week), two employees are part time (20 hours a week), one works quarter time (10 hours a week) and the rest are paid 5 hours a week of work or less.

Some sections of the Congregational Record require much more thoughtful answers: "Provide a profile of the minister you seek." "Provide a profile of the congregation." "What are the congregation's strengths, what are its challenges?" You can see why we spent so much time talking with members of the congregation trying to get a sense of what you want.

Though we may not be as visible as we have been in previous months, we are still working hard, meeting every week to complete our tasks. Our only agenda is to find the ministry that is the best fit for our congregation. We will settle for nothing less.

DON'T LET WARM NIGHTS GROW COLD!

hings continue to go well for the church budget, although it is really too early in the year to draw any conclusions. I plan to give you a mid year report after the end of December. Given the deadline for Branches, that will be in your February issue.

In the meantime I have been thinking about the Legacy Fund. (I also serve on the committee that manages that fund.) As you know, the fund reached the benchmark of \$100,000 about two years ago, and this has allowed the committee to make grants for several projects. These include the speaker on Sundown Towns, the purchase of the commercial dishwasher for the kitchen, the new sign on Powder Mill Road, the facilitator for our recent workshop on our Mission and Vision, and the new audio system. All of these projects have added a great deal to our church life.

This year the stock market has suffered huge daily changes in values and our Legacy Fund has fallen in value, but not too far! I look at these gyrations as an opportunity to make additional investments that will help the Legacy Fund continue to make a significant contribution to the life of the church. I believe in the United States economy and I think that over the long run that the conservative investments of the Legacy Fund will grow to our benefit. I want to take advantage of this downturn in the markets to make additional investments. If you are so inclined, why not make an extra donation to the Legacy Fund now?

There are other ways to benefit the fund as well. Have you considered adding the church and specifically the Legacy Fund to your will? Ron and I have done that and I feel pleased that we will be able to continue to contribute to the church after we are gone. All you need to do is add a codicil to your will. We can supply sample wording but it is really best to consult your own lawyer to make sure that such a bequest will be consistent with the other provisions of your will.

And last, if you have provided for the church in your will, please let me know. I would like to start a list of such generous people. You might also give permission for your name to be used publicly. But whether you give permission or not, we would like to know who you are.

EXTENDING A WARM WELCOME by Carol Carter Walker & Tricia Most

In the Fall of 2002, while her daughter was a student at the Suitland High School Center for the Visual and Performing Arts, **Sylvia Lagerquist** invited members of the school's faculty to showcase some of their performers and artists during a worship service on Public Education Sunday. Thus began a relationship that has resulted in a variety of sculpture and other art displays in our sanctuary over the years, and the inclusion of vocalists, flutists, pianists, dancers, thespians and others during the annual Education Sunday service.

Our former co-minister, **Jaco ten Hove**, included this association in his "History of Racial Diversity Initiatives" which can be read by clicking on the "Diversity and Anti-Racism" link from the PBUUC web site home page. During discussions among attendees of the Anti-Racism Covenant Groups and the Soul Work Book Discussion during the past year, Paint Branchers expressed their discomfort with the degree of welcomeness that we extend to the students, their families and their teachers when they come to Paint Branch on Public Education Sundays. These discussions stimulated consideration of ways our church might extend a more intentional welcome.



Peter Morales, a UU Minister currently candidating for the UUA Presidency who is devoted to the mission of congregational growth, poses a question in his pamphlet on Religious Hospitality: "Can we reach out to people who don't necessarily make us comfortable – because it is in working through that discomfort that we grow...."

On Sunday, October 19, participants from a variety of Diversity/Anti-Racism Transformation Team (DARTT) discussions demonstrated such hospitality by decorating the Meeting House kitchen in the Suitland High School colors and providing a continental breakfast for the 6 performers, and 11 of their friends, family members and teachers an hour before the Education Sunday worship service. This allowed for relationship-building conversation and intentional hospitality around a beautiful display of crimson and white roses.

We are grateful to the New Hampshire Avenue Hillandale Shopping Center Starbucks for graciously granting our request for a coffee donation. (Thank them next time you stop in!) Laura Bonkosky, Emma Sue Gaines-Gerson, Renee Katz, Muriel Morisey, Tricia Most, Marge Owens, Bob Rand, Carol Carter Walker and Peter Wathen-**Dunn** provided breakfast breads, bagels, muffins, juice, tea and coffee condiments for the event. It was during this event that "Education for All" Worship Service Lay Leader Leo Jones, Worship Associate Don Henderson, Music Director David Chapman, Sylvia Lagerquist, DARTTeam members and other Paint Branchers inquired about students' future educational plans and discussed common musical interests among people who share our educational concerns and values.

These conversations continued after the service and may encourage more sharing of mutual interests through attendance at future seasonal Suitland concerts (see **Sylvia Lagerquist** for information on these), attendance at the "Music at Paint Branch" series, and requests for Bulletin cover art and displays. The invitation to this breakfast allowed Paint Branchers to reach out in a meaningful way to welcome people coming through our doors for the first time.

Dedicated to Inspiring Vitality (DIV) Team Report by Tim Illig

n October 5, Judith Bauer, the Joseph Priestly District consultant, led over 50 members and friends in gathering information that will be turned into PBUUC's Vision and Mission statements. After the workshop, the DIV team began the process of synthesizing all the information. The process included writing the following things on newsprint:

- 1. Imagine Paint Branch core values.
- 2. Common themes from the workshop's *Memories of Paint Branch* exercise.
- 3. Reframing the workshop's *Issues of Growth* exercise into values of what is important.
- 4. Common themes from the workshop's *Our Vision of Paint Branch Community* exercise.
- 5. Common themes from the workshop's *Mission* exercise.

After synthesizing all the information, the DIV team came up with the following draft:

What is the status of Paint Branch Creek relative to water quality and wildlife habitat? It was reported that the soil condition in the Glen is severely degraded. What would be required to restore it to its earlier condition?

Don Gerson promised a report at the next meeting on the Social Action issue adopted at GA about ethical eating and how food and environmental justice are related. This is a Congregational Study/Action Issue (CSAI) that was adopted at GA for 2008-1012.

On display in the gallery we have photographs by **Ellen X. Silverberg**, who offers this insight into her photos of local waterways:

The Northwest Branch and Sligo Creek radiate their changing wonders throughout the year as I spend hours walking and seeking out their quiet miracles. My artistic goal is to visually awaken the unfamiliar in the familiar, to rejoice and celebrate nature as an aspect of the sacred, and to reaffirm our compelling human responsibility to protect the earth. I especially enjoy leading workshops on "The Art of Seeing," designed for artists and non-artists alike, to develop visual awareness, imagination, and a spirit of sacred joyfulness.

The **Northwest Branch** watershed is the largest sub-watershed of the Anacostia River. It stretches over 19 miles from Sandy Spring, MD to Hyattsville, MD including Northeast DC. It covers approximately 41 square miles and includes over 180,000 residents. Neighbors of the Northwest Branch are committed to protecting, promoting and restoring the water quality, natural habitat, and ecological well-being of the Northwest Branch watershed.

Sligo Creek flows eight miles, from its headwaters in Wheaton, through Silver Spring and Takoma Park, through the western edge of Hyattsville. It then joins the Northwest Branch, which flows into the Anacostia River, until it becomes part of the Potomac River, flowing into the Chesapeake Bay. Friends of Sligo Creek, a non-profit community organization, is committed to restore to health the water quality, natural habitat, and ecological well-being of the Sligo Creek watershed by bringing neighbors together to build awareness, improve natural habitat, and protect our community's heritage.

Ms. Silverberg's photographs will be on display through November 30 in our Meeting House, which will be the location for an artist's reception on November 23 from 1 to 4 pm. WEAVING THE WEB by our webmaster, Mike Stark

his month's "Weaving the Web" column focuses on Paint Branch's e-Church – the areas of the phuuc.org website that facilitate electronic communications of all sorts. This article briefly outlines some of the features; more detailed information can be found by clicking on the "Paint Branch's e-Church" link on the front page – it is the second link in the "Town Square" area at the top left of the page.

The key features of the e-Church are:

Contact information: e-mail links for our Church Administrator Daniel Everitt (the primary office contact), our ministers, staff, and key leaders. At this point the directory is still small, but it is designed to grow as big as volunteers are willing to make it.

News and Schedules: There are online schedules for services, Enrichment Hour program, and other PBUUC events. There are also locations for breaking news such as weather cancellations and links to our newsletter, *Branches*. The latter is a password protected link; the password is made available to subscribers who contact the church administrator to subscribe. Subscribers receive an e-mail notification when a new issue is available to download.

Online Communities: This includes a message board associated with this site, an unofficial blog, and a directory of electronic mailing lists one can subscribe to. The message board includes a Bulletin Board in which both official information is provided (the breaking news/weather cancellation mentioned above is actually part of this), and a Say Anything area in which various different issues can be discussed or joys, concerns and kudos can be shared. The Online Communities link will take you to full documentation of each forum and of how to register.

About phuuc.org: A brief guide to how the site is set up and how to navigate.

So feel free to have some fun and explore pbuuc.org. The site is designed to allow anyone in the congregation to collaborate in maintaining and improving it. Skilled writers, artist's eyes and people with basic Web skills (using HTML editor and FTP are the only real requirements) are all necessary.
