In his last Sunday sermon, delivered at Washington's National Cathedral, he challenged Americans to live up to their destiny as a "kingdom of greatness" by accepting their responsibility for "the least of these" among them. Though he would be murdered before he could lead his poor people's march on Washington, he died in Memphis, standing up for its exploited sanitation workers. This morning we remember Dr. King's passion for the poor – and his challenge to us to continue his work.

#### WHILE I'M HERE

The point of all this will be not just to let everyone feel heard, though that's always important. Beyond that, the point is to help us all to understand the many different perspectives within the congregation on what was important as we look back. What were the high points? The low points? When did we feel good about ourselves, and when could we have done better? Sharing these stories may also help us to understand how our experiences have influenced our reactions to later events in our life together – and how we see our future.



Distilling our many stories, how do we as a congregation see ourselves as we look back? And looking ahead, what can we learn from all this that might help us in shaping our future with a new minister?

It's a familiar truism that those who do not understand their history are doomed to repeat it. It's true in families, and it's true in churches. Somehow, even when no one still around remembers what happened, and most of us have come more recently, the congregation, thanks to its "family system," seems to act as if it remembered.

This workshop will look at a timeline of Paint Branch's history, and invite us as we go through it to share our stories of how we experienced things and what we remember. I think there will be some "aha" moments, as we listen to each other.

After we've shared our stories, we'll reflect together on what surprised us, what inspired us, what touched us – and how what we've heard might affect how we approach our future together.

our Board of Trustees has been working hard this year. So hard, in fact, that we have resigned ourselves to starting our regular board meetings 30 minutes earlier so that we can go home at a reasonable time. In my column this month, I want to let you know about some of the work we are doing.

Our ministers have been updating us regularly on their progress of helping us in this interim year to the work churches need to do to get ready for a new settled minister. They are planning several congregational meetings to do some of this work, and some of the items need little of their attention. We continue to work with them in hopes of getting our house in order, so to speak.



We have started evaluating how the Board of Trustees works, in order to improve our efficiency. We have begun to work in earnest on a project to get the

church's policies and procedures compiled into a single, accessible place. We are reviewing our own governance in order to make sure we are living out the 5<sup>th</sup> principle of the right of conscience and the use of the democratic process in our own work. We hope to make a call to become a Trustee to be something members are willing to accept.

Then there are many, general workings of the church issues which come up. I have been asking that most of the work be done within the standing committees so that the Trustees simply have to review and approve proposed actions. The personnel committee has brought us several proposals recently regarding staff time off, and they are also busy filling working with the church administrator and treasurer to fill our bookkeeper position.

Each of us has commitments to work with the various groups within the church. This efficiently gives groups access to bring issues to the board.

Our hope is that our church will be in a good place to accept the change that will occur when we settle a new minister. Given all the hard work that the search committee is doing, I have no doubt but that the change will be good. As we clear the debris from our basement, figuratively and literally, we'll have room to start planning for the future.

# Financial Notes by Ellen Cotts, Treasurer

ere it is - 2009! (I'm really writing this just before Christmas.) We hope that 2009 will bring many good things for all of us. But of course, PBUUC remains the warm and nurturing place it has always been.

Financially the church is doing well so far this year. I will give you the results of the first six months of the church year (July-December) in the February Branches.



I know that many of us (Ron and I included) have lost lots of money in the market and we aren't feeling quite as optimistic as we have in the past.

Yet our bills continue. And the church bills continue too. I try to remember that the best things in my life are not dependent on our bank balance. We have our family and our health and of course the church. We will continue to support the church budget because it is important to us. We must all do what we are able and trust in the culture of giving, sharing and abundance that we have at PBUUC.

The office will send out statements in January showing how much you donated to PBUUC in 2008. The statements will show all the contributions which we consider deductible. In our lexicon, that is defined as a donation for which you did not receive anything in return (other than the church community itself). Thus your pledge and any donations to the Legacy Fund or the Piano Fund are deductible. Purchases from the Auction or for the Holiday Dinner are not deductible and will not show on your statement.

We do not plan to send statements to visitors who put in a check once or even twice during the year. However, we do have the capability of sending such a statement. If you are one of those people and you would like a statement, just let me know. You can call me at 301-572-3983.

We are making strenuous efforts to get these statements correct this time around. We will also try to make them more readable. Please pay attention to your statement and let me know if your records disagree with ours. We want to get it right and that means figuring out what happened if there is an error and then revising our systems to avoid that error in the future.

As for cash - we get lots of cash in the plate and have no way of knowing who gave it. I understand the IRS will no longer allow deduction of cash donations. If you do give cash and you want it to be deductible, please put it in an envelope and put your name on the envelope. We will credit it to your account and it will show on your statement next year.

There are really two reasons for wanting your cash donations to be counted.

- One reason is that we can give you an official statement which will allow the contribution to be tax deductible.
- Another reason is that it is a "contribution of record" which is required for continued membership in the church.

I hope that each of you had a lovely holiday and am happily enjoying the memories of the season. It is a new year, a time of hope and hot chocolate. Enjoy!

## Ministerial Search Committee by John Bartoli

#### HELLO, THIS IS PAINT BRANCH CALLING

Il the work that the Ministerial Search Committee (MSC) has put into finding a ministerial match for Paint Branch is finally starting to pay off. We have received serious inquiries and applications from a number of ministers in search and have been busy evaluating each of them.

We looked at the on-line ministerial records of quite a few interested candidates and requested packets from those that interested us. Some packets were in physical binders that we passed around to read. Other packets were available online with password-protected access. We were very careful to make sure that everyone on the committee had read a candidate's packet before we discussed that person in a committee meeting. We did not want to unduly influence each other before we had a chance to read the candidate's information.



We developed a standardized list of evaluation guidelines based on the information we gathered from the congregational survey, the cottage meetings, individual & congregational interviews, and our responses to the questions on our Congregational Record. We have been applying these standards in an equal and fair process to all interested candidates.

As I write this article, the MSC is currently conducting phone interviews with those candidates who seem to be the best fit. For this portion of the search, we also developed a standardized list of about 12 questions that we ask each candidate. We add more individualized questions to this list as needed to clear up any questions we might have as a result of reading the candidate's Ministerial Record.

During this process, the MSC has met two and three times a week choosing which candidates to call, actually calling the candidates, and spending time evaluating their responses to our questions.

Once we have spoken to all the candidates on our phone interview list, we will decide on the 3 or 4 candidates that we would really like to see and hear in person. Our only agenda is to find the ministry that is the best fit for our congregation. We're looking for a minister who leaves everyone with a strong conviction that the match is right for both parties. We will not settle for anything less.

The eight members of the Ministerial Search Committee are: **Bettie Young** (co-chair), **Michael Léger** (co-chair), **John Bartoli, Beth Lyons**, **Rene McDonald, Muriel Morisey, Tricia Most**, and **Marge Owens**. #### **IMAGINE NO LONGER**

magine; An African-American President of these United States! When Barack Obama was declared the projected winner on election night, November 4, I was almost delirious with joy. I could hardly believe what I was hearing. So many African-Americans, young and old, had believed it would never happen in their lifetimes. But here we are, at the beginning of a new day.

When Obama first announced his candidacy, my first thought was -- yes, we need to have an African -American running for President, so as to pave the way, so that eventually that breakthrough will be possible. My next thought was I hope nobody tries to assassinate him. That second thought stayed in the back of my mind. In February 2008, I went to the Barack Obama rally at the University of Maryland and, while waiting in line, I spoke with others waiting. One was an "elderly" Black woman ... "elderly" in quotes because she was a very fit, very limber 81-year old. I told her that I was afraid someone would try to shoot Obama, and she said she had heard several others express that fear, then she said, "But, you know, we cannot be afraid. We cannot. We must move on to the future. We cannot let fear hold us back." I can still hear her voice. After talking with her, I tried to put those fears away.

When Barack Obama won the hard-fought Democratic nomination, I began to think - maybe this will really happen. In the last few weeks before November 4 I dared to hope that the polls were right but I was still wary of Election Day problems coming into play, such as we saw in 2000 and 2004. Fortunately those did not materialize this time.

Now Barack Obama is our President-Elect. During the time since he announced, I believe he has proved to be a man of keen intelligence and compassion, a man of substance and grace. With his decisive victory, a huge win for African-Americans and everyone, some folks are saying that Dr. King's dream has been realized.

But, if Dr. King were here with us today, I think he would say his dream has been realized - in part. He would recognize, as our President-Elect does, that we still have a way to go towards a colorblind society, a society in which differences of any type do not influence the way a person is treated by others. As Barack Obama realizes, we have much work to do in our homes, communities, workplaces and churches to continue to move towards the dream realized. I believe our 44<sup>th</sup> President will lead us in that direction. And we don't have to imagine having an African-American President any longer.



My favorite Election Day story: my daughter Kristin called our 101-year-old uncle and his 97-year-old wife on November 4. I had just assumed that they would vote absentee, but no, they were waiting for their ride to the polls that morning. Now that is something I wish I could have witnessed. That would have brought tears to my eyes, for sure.

# DIVERSITY & ANTI-RACISM DIALOGUES Honoring the Inherent Worth and Dignity of Each Person

In 2008 there were several exciting and significant "firsts" for our country in the realm of diversity: the appointment of the first blind governor, the first female contender for the presidency, and of course, the election of the first biracial president of the United States. These events have renewed a focus on diversity and race in our country, eliciting excitement and fear, harmony and hatred. Some have suggested the outcome of the election indicates the dawning of a post-racial era. Others perceive the recent displays of nooses or the lack of acceptance of a multi-racial, multi-cultural vocabulary as demonstration of how far we have yet to evolve to reach wholeness as a society. What are your thoughts?

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The Diversity/Anti-Racism Transformation Team (DARTT) will launch in February the Diversity &

Anti-Racism Dialogues -- monthly sessions for personal reflection and discussion on issues of diversity and race in our own lives, our communities, our congregation, and our world

The dialogues will focus on short articles and essays (to be selected in advance each month) as a starting point for deep conversation. The sessions stand alone and it is not necessary to commit to participate every month. We will meet during Enrichment Hour on second Sundays in Room 4. 

#### Weaving The Web By Mike Stark

iven that there were 18 pages and lots of good holiday stuff in the December newsletter, I'm not sure anyone missed this column while I was helping my wife Kim recover from hip replacement surgery. But I'm back now to talk about how the website is set up to handle weather cancellations.

Simply put, all you have to do is click on the "Breaking News/Cancellations" link on the front page of <a href="www.pbuuc.org">www.pbuuc.org</a>. You can find it under the "PBUUC Town Square" column. For those who are techies, this links to a PHPBB message board on which your stalwart ministers, administrator, and webmaster have privileges to post such announcements. You will be presented with a series of "topics" you can click on, for weather cancellations you will see the date in the subject line, and it will usually be the top one on the list of topics as they are organized by most recently posted first.

If you aren't technically inclined, just click on the message that has the date of interest in the subject line, and all the information you need will be there. The Web is not the only avenue for finding out about cancellations. An e-mail will also be sent to the Paint Branch listserv (yet another reason to contact **Ken Montville** and register), and a message will be put on voicemail (option 6) on the church answering machine. But for those of you who live on the Internet, the link to the message board is the way to go.

For those who are even more adventurous, if you register on the PBUUC message board, you can post notices of PBUUC-sponsored events, you can post notices of events of interest to UUs, and there's even a general notices area you can use to sell that '66 Dodge Dart you've been looking to unload. If you look a couple of lines down from the "breaking news/cancellations" link, you will see a link to the PBUUC forum, along with information about the forum and how to register. Finally, as ever, you don't have to be a tech geek to help with the web site. The most important skills are writing ability and a sense of presentation, an "artist's eye". people said we needed a
new dishwasher; some said
it should be a commercial
dishwasher. All I knew
about commercial
dishwashers was that
Hortense Parr, a former
member of the

congregation who served as the Kitchen Committee, suggested one many years ago. Ron Cotts investigated and found that to purchase and install a commercial dishwasher, even with him doing most of the work, would cost about \$5000. We had less than \$4000 in the entire kitchen fund. Then it was announced \$5000 would be available from the Legacy Fund for the most deserving proposed project. Kathy **Kearns** said, "There's the dishwasher!" So I wrote a proposal, and to my amazement, it was accepted, but not for the entire \$5000; we had to add most of the kitchen fund to it as well. Ron ordered the dishwasher; it was delivered, but its sink and drain board took another month or two to arrive. Ron installed them, but there was a problem which required a technician. Finally, it was used a few times to wash coffee cups, but when we ran it after the October Ethnic Dinner, it leaked. Ron fixed that, but the next Sunday after coffee, it wouldn't heat the water. Ron fixed that in time for the Auction Dinner, and, knock on wood, it's worked fine ever since! To use it, training is necessary. Maybe 10 people know how to use it now. So, thank you to the Legacy Fund team for the grant, to everyone for your patience, and let's all give Ron Cotts a personal "Thank you" for all his work, expertise and diligence in providing us with this dishwasher!
