# Monthly Ministers' Article: Roots and Wings

he clock is ticking. The wheel is turning. It is time to reflect on what we've accomplished this year. Together, did we find the main thing? And keep it the main thing?

But this year was different than other years because of the departure of your ministers, Barbara and Jaco ten Hove, after nine years of sharing your lives. Of course, the ongoing work and mission of the church continued, but the main thing we set out to do this year was to work beside you and reflect back to you what we saw as you prepared for new directions and new ministry.

You have talked openly about the good and not so good times of this congregation. You have recognized that each of us reacts differently to a particular model of ministry and that each of your ministers has had strengths and weaknesses. Just as we did. Just as Diane Teichert will.

You've completed surveys, talked in small groups, attended workshops, all of which provided the Ministerial Search Committee with the information it needed to find a minister who was a good fit for the needs of this particular congregation. Your vote for your new minister has confirmed the Committee's judgment.

You are about to vote on a vision for your future, and the mission you plan to follow in the immediate future.

Behind the scenes, your leadership has been working on organizational structures that will serve you and your new minister better – providing clearer descriptions of the recently enlarged position of church administrator, annual calendaring meetings to avoid scheduling conflicts, gathering mission statements/statements for church committees, and beginning the work of by-laws revision. This work can help avoid some of the frustration and conflicts churches run into at your size because not everyone operates on the same assumptions. This is the "work, common as mud" that left undone, leads to burn out and flare ups.

Although, like Barbara and Jaco, we are also co-ministers, we think we provided three different models of what ministry might be (his, mine, and ours) that might work at Paint Branch. John the introvert, humanist UU Christian, who tears up at the fall of a sparrow; me the passionate Broadway wannabe, mystical theist, who wants to change the world. And the two of us together, in love with ministry, in love with this congregation, trying gently to share our truth in that love.

We have lifted up this congregation's vision in word, song, silence and dance. You have changed us. We hope that we have changed some of you.

This last month is a time now for us to start packing our suitcase and saying our goodbyes. Before it ends, we hope that we, too, will know where we will be "this time next year." If it is with another congregation, we know that we will bring all we have learned in this, our first interim year. If it is a "sabbatical" year, we will cherish the time with family, friends, garden and books.

It is a time of endings. It is a time of beginnings. May they bless us all.

### From the Board Chair

his has been a very busy month for our congregation. We met in early May to discuss and then call Diane Teichert as our next settled minister. By the time you read this article, we will also have had our annual meeting to do our normal yearly work, such as elect our incoming Board members, discuss the coming year's budget, and thank all of the volunteers for their work.

Our DRE has announced her resignation this month and we have a team of volunteers working hard to decide how to fill that vacancy. Based on discussions with Diane Teichert, Carla Miller, and JPD staff, we have decided to hire an interim DRE, who would both run the RE program for a year or two, and evaluate what we do and how we do it, in order to improve the program. Now that we have had a good experience with the Interim Ministry Program, I have high hopes for what we could learn from an interim DRE.

The business of the church takes a great deal of time and effort. As this is the last of the Branches articles that I will be writing as your Board Chair before the end of my term in June, I want to personally thank all of the other Board members for their commitment, time, and effort to the work of the church. The Board meetings this year have been used for reviews of many issues, at least in part due to the fact that we were listening to our interim ministers as they evaluated important aspects of our congregational life. We have tried to use this interim year to look at the church critically and identify problems.

It has been my pleasure to serve the church as your Board Chair. I have learned a great deal: about the church, about many of the members I had previously not worked with, and about all that is entailed in running a large organization. I have made mistakes and had to deal with the consequences of additional work to fix them. On the whole, however, I found my experience on the Board to be rewarding, challenging, and a learning experience. I hope you will think about saying yes when someone asks you to participate to help run our church in some way, big or small. If we all take on a little of the work, we will not burn out volunteers who have to do more than they are able or willing.

### Church Office Corner

I'm very excited about our most recent success, in collaboration with the ministerial staff, church leadership and major event planners – our very first annual calendar planning meeting, which was held on May 16.

In a desire to have a unified, accurate and comprehensive calendar, and to give priority to all church programming and events, the church office sent letters to all those involved with programming and events in our congregation, requesting that they plan, to the best of their ability, dates, times and room locations for their 2009-2010 events. Approximately 35 groups responded with their requests, an impressive number. Requests were combined into a draft working calendar that was brought to the May 16<sup>th</sup> meeting, co facilitated by **Daniel Everitt** and Carol Carter Walker. Also attending were James Alexander, Ethelyn Bishop, Ann Bolt, Julie Dahmer, Tish Hall, Rev. Phyllis Hubbell, Tim Illig, Tricia Most, Marilyn Pearl and Mary Rooker (who are all generously thanked for taking time from their weekend to attend).

The result of this three hour meeting was an appreciation of and commitment to annual planning, a clearer understanding of how events are prioritized (with church programming and events always given a priority over outside groups and commercial rentals at this planning meeting), and a web calendar that will now include all events, inclusive of Enrichment Hour activities and off-site events that are of congregational importance, as well as more detailed event information. The church office has committed to update the web calendar daily and to have all 2009-2010 events on the web calendar by June 5. The congregational calendar will be a useful way to keep in touch with all church happenings, and be an effective planning tool for any events your group or committee might be developing. After June 5, we urge you to visit our web calendar at www.pbuuc.org and click on the calendar link. Each date will show events by time and location. Clicking on any event will bring up a page providing more event and contact information.. Once you've visited, let us know what you think, or of any errors or omissions you find, as the web calendar is always a work in progress. Once again, thanks to all, who helped to make this meeting and calendar a better tool for all of us.

The ministerial search is over. Candidating Week was filled with meetings, lunches, dinners, and walks in the Glen. Our candidate summed up everything she had heard from everyone she had interacted with all week long in a wonderful, heartfelt sermon that convinced many people she

was the best fit for Paint Branch. Finally, on Sunday, May 3<sup>rd</sup>, the congregation called the **Rev. Diane Teichert** as our new minister by a very comfortable and significant majority vote of 147 to 4, or 97%.

Diane will provide us with a type of ministry that we have not had in quite a while. For the last ten years, our congregation has been served by co-ministry, including the most recent and greatly appreciated interim ministry of **Phyllis Hubbell** and **John Manwell**. Just as Diane will be purposefully aware of our needs and wishes for the future, so will we need to be aware of this distinct nature of her new ministry at Paint Branch. It will indeed be an exciting time!

The Ministerial Search Committee is extremely happy with our final selection and very pleased that the congregation endorsed our choice with such an overwhelmingly positive vote. We are ready for what we believe to be a well-deserved respite from serious church matters, at least for the summer. We want to be able to speak openly to our friends and spouses! We want to not have to meet every Monday night! We want to have fun and just enjoy Paint Branch!

We appreciate all the wonderful expressions of thanks you have given us in the time since Candidating Week. # **Board Treasurer Report:**

he fiscal year is winding down even as we look forward to next year with the anticipation of new beginnings. So far this year the finances of the church are going well, although I do know of several large bills that will be coming in before the end of the fiscal year -- the ministers are going to General Assembly, we will be renting a Bobcat to grade the parking lot in June, and there are more pension contributions to be paid. The budget anticipates a deficit for the year of \$5,000, but I am hopeful that the final numbers will be somewhat better.



If there is a deficit, it will reduce our Reserves. If there is a surplus (possible but unlikely), it will increase our Reserves. Reserves currently stand at \$18,000 which is a rather small cushion, given the size of our programs and our property.

Nevertheless, it is an impressive sum given the costs of the fire, the expenses of the search etc. Note: the \$18,000 is in addition to specific amounts set aside for Long Term Maintenance, the Piano Restoration Fund, etc.

I would describe PBUUC as a congregation where most members believe that we should live our values in the real world, and they support our programs with as much money as they possibly can. Huzzah!

In early June you will receive a letter from the office telling you about your pledge for this fiscal year which ends June 30, 2009. One page will show the amount you pledged, the amount you have paid (up to the date of the letter) and the "variance" which is the difference between the two. A second page will show the detailed record of your contributions, including your pledge and other non-pledged but deductible contributions such as to the Legacy Fund. I hasten to reiterate that your pledge is not a legal obligation. Nevertheless, we hope you will take this opportunity to pay your pledge in full before the end of June.

If you don't agree with the record of your payments, please call me at 301-572-3983 so that we can find the problem. Considerable work has gone into making these records accurate and we want to find any glitches that still occur. In the past these records were not always correct, but Rebecca Birnie, our wonderful Administrative Assistant, has worked very hard to understand the database and get it working properly. Please help out by reporting any errors you find.

At this time of year many people are paying off their current pledge and others are getting started on their pledge for next year (July 2009 - June 2010) You will help me keep it straight if you put the year in the memo line, either Pledge '08-'09 or Pledge '09-'10.

As I write this, the Budget Leadership Team is still struggling with the budget for next year. There are several unknowns that make it difficult to come up with a final budget. Personnel changes in both the ministry and the DRE position may necessitate a significant change in insurance costs, etc. A draft budget will be presented at the Congregational Annual Meeting on May 31 but the final budget will not be approved by the Board until June. I'll give you a summary of the final numbers when they are known. If you need specific numbers for your committee, just send me an email later in the summer.

I will join the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Columbia, as their Director of Lifespan Growth and Learning.

I look forward to this opportunity to serve in the field of liberal religious education as a full-time professional. I am also truly hopeful that this change will be "both/and" -- a healthy growth experience for both myself and this wonderful religious exploration program. I am sure that this change will be an experience of growth, and we can work together to make it so.

I have done my job, of course. And, I truly hope that I have done all that was needed for my part of the race. Of course, my work here has included its share of mistakes and challenges, too. We couldn't be creatively living and growing without making mistakes!

I have tried to give you my very best. I hope that my work has positively supported this religious exploration program and allowed it to play an important part in many of your lives, as it has in mine.

How and when will I pass this on, and who will pick up the baton of DRE? I will be with PBUUC until the end of July, and I will take this time to put things in order for the next person who comes in to do this job. Who that will be we do not know for sure, but as I write this a small group prepares for the search. **Tina Van Pelt** and **Kelly Wester** are doing the groundwork to explore the possibility of an Interim DRE.

The DRE Interim Program is modeled on a ministerial internship. It provides the congregation an opportunity for evaluation and visioning in RE, creating a smooth and well-supported transition, and building a foundation upon which the next settled religious education professional may build. This process would also help to allow Diane a year to settle in, and give her an opportunity to have a say in the process of seeking the next settled DRE. Or, Paint Branch may choose to search for another settled DRE as my replacement and to form a full DRE Search Committee.

While the transition process for Paint Branch RE leadership is not yet clear to me, I'm sure that by the time you are reading this it will have been decided. And whatever choice is made, it has been heartening to see this congregation move so quickly into gathering the information needed to make a well informed decision about this transition! It seems to me that we are learning from our many recent transitions and beginning to handle change more effectively! This will make this transition smoother for the congregation and for the next person in the door.

I have no doubt that Paint Branch's Religious Exploration ministry will keep going and growing, for people of all ages. As the church transitions to a new ministry, there is a great deal of potential for growth -- growth of spirit, of outreach to the community, and of organizational structure to support a flourishing RE program -- all of which will lead to growth in numbers.

May we continue the Mission and Ministry of Paint Branch's Lifespan Religious Exploration: strengthening spirits, encouraging ethical actions, and creating a caring community. This work is so needed in our world today!

I feel truly blessed to be able to stay on at Paint Branch as a member of this wonderful congregation! My children and husband will continue to attend and enjoy this warm, creative, and energetic community each Sunday. I will not be present on most Sunday mornings, particularly in the coming year. ## Diversity/Anti-Racism Transformation Team (DARTT) News & Events

#### **BRAGGING IS IN ORDER!**

The Diversity/Anti-Racism Transformation Team (DARTT) is approaching its second birthday. It's a good time to look back before going forward to take note of our accomplishments.



At its June 2007 Annual Meeting, the Congregation voted to make antiracism its major social justice initiative for the year. In August 2007, **Marge** 

Owens, Social Action Chair (SAC) and Jaco ten Hove, Co-minister, convened the first meeting of DARTT. Leo Jones was its first Chair. In September 2007 the Board sent a letter in support of the initiative to the entire congregation. Tricia Most and Carol Carter Walker became DARTT co-chairs in early 2008. The Board approved DARTT's charter as a separate committee in March 2008.

DARTT and SAC co-sponsored a book reading/discussion of *Sundown Towns* by author James Loewen. **Mike Stark** led an Enrichment Hour book discussion group based on Charles Barkley's *Who's Afraid of a Large, Black Man?* 

DARTT formed two six-week covenant groups led by Tricia Most and Evangeline Wells which created a safe space for a diverse group of members and friends to talk candidly about their experiences at the church. practice of socially responsible investing (SRI) by UU congregations as well as by individuals.
