finished washing the breakfast dishes while some water came to a boil and then steeped my mint tea bag.

In his little book *The Miracle of Mindfulness: A Manual on Meditation,* Thich Nhat Hanh says "While washing the dishes one should only be washing the dishes, which means that while washing the dishes one should be completely aware of washing the dishes."


So, I guess I should have waited until after the dishes were done before boiling the water! I could have meditated on the sounds of the water heating up and then of the kettle whistling. I could have noticed the minty fragrance wafting up from the cup as the tea steeped. I could have mindfully removed the tea bag, squeezing it gently, and then carefully dropped it into the trashcan without dripping tea on the counter as I often do. Then I would have observed the honey drip into the teaspoon and stirred it swirling into the cup. Finally, I would have sat at the table to sip my tea, savoring its warmth and flavor, meditating on what to write for this column while looking at the birds at the bird feeder.

Instead, I brought my tea upstairs to drink while I type.

Many of us are multi-taskers, and proud of it. I remember as a new mother being amazed that I could cook dinner with my right hand while holding my baby in my left arm. I also remember gazing into her blue eyes, marveling at what was far more amazing than my new-found dexterity: her very life. A week short of twenty-seven years later, I have to wonder, did I give her my undivided attention more often than not?

In a front page article in today's *Washington Post* (2/22/2010), a young father described how he inadvertently let his four year old daughter's bathtub run over, enough to soak his feet while standing nearby, because he was playing a chess game with his neighbor via iPhone. Did the tsunami cause him to stop the game? No! With one hand he shut off the faucet and with the other he tapped out his next move!

In that same book, Thich Nhat Hanh tells about a young father who discovered how to have more time for himself. He used to divide up his nonwork time— some for his young son, some for his wife, some for their new baby, some for household work and the little bit remaining for himself. But, now he tries to find ways of experiencing *all* of his time as time for himself. For example, when helping his son with his homework, the father "shares his presence, finding ways to be interested in what they do together." So, his time with his son becomes time for himself. Ditto for the time he spends with his wife, baby, and on chores. "The remarkable thing is that now I have unlimited time for myself!"



If we live each moment in the moment – not "in our head," not dwelling on something in the past nor worrying about what is to be in the future, and not plugged in – then we will truly be present to the present, a present (as in gift!) to ourselves and anyone in our company.

MEET THE INSTALLATION GUEST PREACHER

The Reverend Kathy Huff has served First Unitarian Church of Oakland CA since 2002. She is an accomplished minister with a deep commitment to transformative spiritual growth, religious pluralism and social justice. Raised as a Roman Catholic in the South Pacific islands, Kathy has traveled and lived around the globe and is a lifelong student of world religions. She was ordained into the Unitarian Universalist ministry in 1998. Prior to coming to Oakland, she served the First Parish Unitarian Universalist Church in Arlington, Massachusetts.

Rev. Kathy holds a Masters of Divinity from Harvard University, and a Bachelor of Fine Arts from Syracuse University. She has received numerous awards for her dynamic

leadership, social justice work and visionary preaching. She was named as the 2007 *East Bay Express* Readers Poll Favorite for the area's "Most Inspirational Sermons." As a recognized leader in our movement, Rev. Kathy addressed the 6,000 delegates at the opening plenary of our 2003 General Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) in Boston. She spoke about the imperative of giving body and form to our justice centered faith. A sought after public speaker and workshop leader, her writings and quotes frequently appear in magazines and meditation manuals.

Kathy is passionate about our mission to build the beloved community. Her many years of work to end racism and eliminate heterosexism is helping the Oakland UU congregation grow into a more inclusive congregation. With her inspiration they became a Welcoming Congregation and are active in the UUA's Journey Towards Wholeness initiative.

Prior to ordained ministry, Kathy was the founding member and producing artistic director of a New England touring theater company based in Maine. She eventually left the professional theater to work with battered women and children. As the Director of the YWCA Family Violence Project in Cincinnati, Ohio, she became recognized as an expert in the field of domestic violence and was co-founder of the Alliance Against Same Sex Domestic Violence.

Notes from the Board Chair

ur Trustees and Officers have been very busy over the past few months hosting a series of mini-Town Hall meetings on Sundays during Enrichment Hour. The purpose of these meetings is to share information with the congregation about the November, 2009, decision not to renew the current lease with Paint Branch Montessori School. I would like to thank all of the Board members and Officers, as well as the members of the Space Options Task Force, for their help in facilitating these meetings.

I would also like to thank each and every member and friend who came to the Mini-Town Hall meetings and expressed your thoughts, joys, and concerns about this bold new step for the congregation. To date, we have heard from over 100 members of the congregation, including adults, children and youth.

During the meetings, members and friends expressed considerable excitement that we would now be able use more of the space in the RE Building for our own programs and activities. For the RE Program in particular, the "Reclaiming Our Space" initiative comes at a perfect time. With Interim Director of Religious Exploration Karen Scrivo, we are engaged in an exciting process to re-imagine and re-invigorate our entire Religious Exploration program. An important part of this re-imagining process will include thinking creatively about how we can best use the additional space in the RE building.


There was also considerable excitement about ways that we could use our space in the RE Building to better serve our surrounding community. Whether offering space to local community groups and non-profits, hosting events from local schools or the University of Maryland, or providing a beautiful setting for a retreat center or UU conference center, there is much that we can be doing with our space that will help our church community better engage with our broader community and the world.

Along with these hopes and aspirations, we also heard considerable concern about the loss of rental income from the current tenant.

The income from the school is significant and forms about 17% of the annual church budget. To help address these concerns, the Board and Finance Committee met on Saturday, February 20th, to discuss options for funding the shortfall. The four areas which the group considered are: increased stewardship through the pledge campaign; identification of new tenant(s); belt-tightening; and new fundraising activities. We are particularly excited about the possibilities for new fundraising activities such as a church craft fair or church bazaar. We also hope that the upcoming stewardship campaign will serve as an opportunity for all of us to give generously to support our religious community.

Speaking personally, I am planning to increase my pledge significantly this year, and I know that many other congregational leaders will be also. If you are financially able, I hope that you will consider increasing your pledge during this important time of transition. And even if you are not able to increase your pledge this year, I hope that you will find other ways to give of your time and talents to help build and strengthen our shared religious home.

Religious Exploration News

RE-IMAGINING RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION AT PAINT BRANCH

Vision is the product of the head and heart working together. ~ Marjorie Parker

ne of the important tasks of this interim period is for Paint Branch Unitarian Universalist Church to discover and articulate its unique vision of religious exploration.

As part of that process, some 30 people participated in last month's RE Workshop conducted by Pat Infante, the Lifespan Faith Development consultant for our Joseph Priestley District of the Unitarian Universalist Association. In addition to Rev. Diane Teichert, myself and the RE Committee, the workshop attracted parents of current and former children and youth in the program, teachers, two former DREs, as well as members of the board of trustees and committee chairs.

Pat talked about the characteristics of congregations that promote religious exploration for all ages, different models of successful RE programs, ways to create multigenerational community and societal trends that are challenging RE programs throughout the country. I'll be sharing more about those in the future.

For now, I want to highlight two questions Pat asked participants that are important for you to think about as we move ahead in the interim period. What do you value most about the RE program? And what kind of people do you want children to be when they leave the program as young adults? Answering these will give shape and direction to Paint Branch's unique vision of its RE program.

What do you value most about the RE program at Paint Branch? Here's a sampling of what some of the workshop participants said:

- ✓ Opportunity for children and youth to be their authentic selves and to be respected for their voices
- ✓ Friendships, a safe place for children and youth to get to know others

- Multigenerational opportunities (and longing for more)
- ✓ Beautiful natural surroundings, opportunities to commune with nature and a curriculum -- Web of Life -- that focuses on nature
- ✓ Our Whole Lives (UUA's program for youth on human sexuality and relationships framed by our UU values)
- ✓ Wonderful and caring teachers, strong teaching teams for classes
- ✓ Diversity and work of the Diversity Anti-Racism Transformation Team (DARTT)
- ✓ Musical opportunities for children and youth
- ✓ Nursery and toddler care
- ✓ Snack

What kind of young adults do you want children in the Paint Branch RE program to become? Pat called this a vision of RE-Topia and one to keep in mind and work toward. Participants listed many qualities including being:

- Open-minded and tolerant
- ➤ Able to communicate with tactful honesty
- > Caring about the community
- > Possessing a sense of humor
- > Demonstrating leadership
- > Stewards of Unitarian Universalist faith
- ➤ Appreciative of diversity, knowledgeable about other religions
- ➤ Accepting of differences in sexual identity, race, class, religion, points of view
- > Confident, good self-esteem
- > Empathetic
- > Inspired, and leading a meaningful life
- ➤ An activist
- > Independent

As we move forward, I urge you to give some thought to these important questions. And share your answers with each other. They are important guideposts in charting the future direction of the RE program at Paint Branch. And I look forward to working with you on this important task.

A NOTE FROM YOUR MINISTER ABOUT JOYS AND SORROWS DURING SUNDAY SERVICES.

Why do we have a time in our service for the sharing of our joys and sorrows? I believe that our intentions are to create a space in which the congregation's sense of community can deepen and to open up avenues for bearing each other's burdens and multiplying our joys.

As you consider coming forward, please ponder what you want to share in light of those intents. There is a fine line between sharing with the congregation the joy of a personal (one's own or family member) or organizational accomplishment and promoting the availability of the product of that accomplishment. Brevity (one or two sentences) will help you stay on the better side of that line. If your joy or sorrow requires an explanation or the telling of a story, or is the prelude for an announcement that benefits you or an organization (even PBUUC), then it may not be right for Joys and Sorrows.

Rules are, of course, made to be broken, so I hesitate to suggest that two to three sentences is a good length and that the words "the website is" and "for sale" are out of bounds for this intimate moment in our worship together. On the other hand, if you have never, or not in many years, come forward during Joys and Sorrows and spent the morning working up your courage to reveal yourself in this way, I sincerely hope you will take the risk and I trust that your sharing – however it tumbles out – will be received with love and respect by all who are present.

JOURNEY TOWARD WHOLENESS FILM, SUNDAY MARCH 28 AMERICAN VIOLET

The Diversity/Anti-Racism Transformation Team (DARTT) will present American Violet during an extended Enrichment Hour on Sunday, March 28, beginning at 11:45 am.

A single African-American mother struggles to clear her name after being wrongly accused and arrested for dealing drugs in an impoverished town in Texan. Powerfully produced and directed, *American Violet* is a film based on the racially charged drug war scandal that rocked the town of Hearne, Texas, several years ago. This film explores the devastating impact of America's "war on drugs."

Financial Notes

It has been a relatively slow month for the financial sector. The bills have been paid, the annual statements of your deductible donations went out in January, and the income has been deposited. Not much news there.

So I think instead I will write about my experience at the Davies Memorial UU Church yesterday (February 21st). I went there because they are in search of a new minister, much as we were a year ago. I work with congregations in search and thus I went to talk to the congregation about their search. They asked lots of questions as UUs always do and they seemed to appreciate my work.

But what was special was the service. They are getting ready to start their annual canvass (as we are) and there were two presentations from members about why Davies is their spiritual home. One couple of mixed race talked about finding a comfort zone at Davies that they do not find elsewhere. They have two sons who are getting a rich religious education in an atmosphere where race is not a factor in how they are treated. And I know that is true at PBUUC also and at all UU churches.

Another man talked at some length about seeing a sign some years ago that said the congregation was going to discuss Building Your Own Theology. He thought this was exactly what he wanted and so he came. And now after many years, he is still coming and feeling that strong pull that makes Davies his home. And again I am reminded of Paint Branch and what makes it home to all of us.

It was a warm reminder of why I am a UU and perhaps why you are too. The service went on with Joys and Sorrows. Afterwards, the minister gave a benediction in which he mentioned all the joys and sorrows that had been brought forth. He mentioned the father that had died recently, the new job, the surprise birthday party and so on. It wasn't long but it was a warm confirmation that the congregation is a community.

The sermon followed and it was about dealing with trauma. It was insightful and a good reminder of how we can support and help one another. Then the congregation closed the service by saying "May the light we share in this community now be returned to each of us, to give us strength, to bring us hope, to warm our paths as we go our separate ways."

I came away feeling a part of that congregation as I am in every UU congregation I visit. I am so proud to be a part of this faith where love and kindness are practiced and where even a stranger can feel a part of it all. We are fortunate to have found PBUUC and I hope we can help others who are looking for us to find their spiritual home with us

The Board has appointed the following members to the 2010 BLT: Ellen Cotts, Treasurer; Susannah Schiller, Trustee, Will Snyder, Chair, Personnel Committee; Mike Stark, Assistant Treasurer; and Carol Carter Walker, Trustee and Chair, BLT.

The next steps in this process are to:

- Contact Committee Chairs, Affinity Group Leaders and Staff, requesting their input to the 2010 budget at three levels ranging from austere to visionary;
- Meet with the chairs and leaders to review and clarify their budget submissions;
- ➤ Hold mini-town hall meetings to receive congregational input to a draft budget
- > Submit a draft budget to the Board of Trustees;
- Submit a proposed budget to the Congregation at its June 13 Annual Meeting;
- > Submit a recommended budget to the Board of Trustees for its final approval.

ANNAPOLIS RALLY FOR "FREE SPEECH FOR PEOPLE. NOT FOR CORPORATIONS"

Some of us attended the February 22 rally that was organized by our own Jessica Sharp, who has formed a new group, "Fair and Clean Elections Maryland, who can be found on the web at www.fairandcleanmd.org.

SPECIAL COLLECTIONS

Recent beneficiaries include the Christmas Eve collection for Warm Nights, Cafe Community, etc. - \$1536, Haiti Earthquake Relief - \$3286, Goodloe Memorial UU Congregation Scholarship Fund - \$679 and I Got Heart - \$296.



Our March recipient on the 21st will be a local group, "Little Friends for Peace," which has been teaching peace-making skills for almost 30 years. They have led peace camps here at PBUUC a number of summers. This past summer Little Friends for Peace led peace camps almost every week, sometimes with three different camps running simultaneously. Their programs recently expanded with the acquisition of a Peace Education Oasis in Piscataway National Park.

DID HE REALLY JUST SAY THAT?

his past January, it came to light that Senator Harry Reid said presidential candidate Barack L Obama had a good chance of winning because he is "light-skinned" and had "no Negro dialect." Of course, in the current partisan and media-hungry environment, Republicans and newscasters jumped on this statement and many referred to it as racist. I disagree. During the elections, I made an almost identical statement about President Obama in reference to America's perception of him. Due to the current state of race relations in America, Reid was merely stating a true fact. Amazingly, the media got over the comments relatively quickly. Then came the President's State of the Union address and the commentary of MSNBC's Chris Matthews saying President Obama is "post-racial" and that while watching the address, Matthews "forgot the President was Black."

Did he really just say that? Unlike, Senator Reid's comments, this is not a factual statement but a misguided statement. The fact that America elected a Black president does not make the US post-racial and by no means eliminated discrimination overnight. The fact that since President Obama took office, "the rate of threats against the president has increased 400% from the 3,000 a year or so under President George W. Bush" indicates that there is still a large number of people who do have an issue – and it is most likely with his race.

More to the point, however, is that Matthews is someone who embraces the notion that we are now a post-racial society. The idea that everything is okay and White Americans don't have to feel guilty about slavery or Jim Crow laws anymore. A Black president means the chains of oppression are gone and there are equal opportunities for everyone! If only Matthews could learn about the issues we are addressing here at Paint Branch – he doesn't seem aware of his "invisible knapsack of white privilege."

He has exposed himself to being in the group of people who think that telling a Black person that they "seem white" or "I forgot you were Black" is a compliment. That type of thinking assumes that White mannerisms/culture is the norm to be achieved; that somehow being educated, articulate and intelligent is something inherent to Whites. That the standard of beauty is light skin, straight hair and European features.

The sad thing is that many of us are culturally conditioned to believe this. When presented with dolls ranging from light to dark hues, small Black children select the White doll when asked to pick the "pretty" one. Chris Rock made the movie "Good Hair" when his daughter asked him "Daddy, why don't I have good hair?" Thus, I am not outright calling Chris Matthews racist but I will call him culturally and racially ignorant. My attendance at DARTT activities has helped me realize that being culturally and racially aware is just another form of education all Americans need to partake in.

Attorney General Eric Holder's words from last February ring true: "Though race-related issues continue to occupy a significant portion of our political discussion, and though there remain many unresolved racial issues in this nation, we, average Americans, simply do not talk enough with each other about things racial." To break the long-standing cultural conditioning that White is Right, we need to start talking, observing and asking questions so we can be aware of the undercurrents we subconsciously (or sometimes purposefully) try to ignore. I am echoing many of the thoughts Mary "Tyrtle" Rooker shared in her DARTT article "Racist? Not me; I'm a Good Liberal!" (September 2009 Branches or

America is <u>not</u> post-racial, but we are in a new and different part of the cycle. Barack Obama's election to the presidency hasn't obliterated racism, but is making us stop, take notice and start talking. Even if it's to talk about the unthinking comments of others, we now have an opportunity to make a conscious effort to tackle what has dominated our subconscious for decades. Hopefully, putting us on a path towards greater awareness, more understanding and acceptance.


