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The Minister's mUUsings...

n Sunday, March 28, the Worship Associates stood together, with my support, at the time in the service when the Sharing of Joys and Sorrows would normally be announced, "to express our sorrow and concern about statements that were made during the Sharing of Joys and Sorrows" the previous Sunday. "Words were used to characterize members of one political party in angry language... Members of our congregation who belong to the maligned political party and guests they had invited to join us for Sunday's worship service were hurt by the statements. One of those members has told us that he no longer feels welcome in this church."

There have been apologies since. I think most of us recognize that our "open mic" format is such that this kind of thing was waiting to happen.

The Worship Associates went on to say, "We want this church to be an open and welcoming community for everyone. We value diversity of opinion and recognize that people of good will can disagree yet remain in community. As our Unitarian forebear Francis David said, 'We do not need to think alike to love alike.'"

"Keeping our sharing of Joys and Sorrows focused solely, and briefly, on major joys and sorrows has long been a struggle in our congregation. Many members have requested that we have only silent candles of Joys and Sorrows, while other members value the verbal sharing highly."

So, since then, throughout the month of April, we have had candles available for silent expressions of joy and sorrow during the Offertory and no opportunity for verbal sharing in the service. This is the first of a series of different models for Joys and Sorrows (many of them used by other Unitarian Universalist congregations) which we will try out, one each month into the fall; seeking congregants' feedback and suggestions in various ways along the way, starting with the Suggestion Box on a window sill in the Meeting House Foyer. I am sure that the process will lead us to a new ways to be the increasingly caring community we aspire to be.

On a personal note, I want to share a Joy with you here. My spouse Don Milton and I have found, after looking at many houses for sale in the general College Park area, a home to buy around the corner from where we are renting in University Park! It meets most of our most important criteria including easy wheelchair access for my mother, space for gatherings, and more than 500 meters distant from a busy roadway (Don has an inherited lung condition); and it's in nearly move-in condition, which is good because between our new jobs in a new state and involvement with my mother, we don't have time for a fixer-upper. I look forward to welcoming you to our sweet new home!

MEET THE GUEST MINISTER



Rev. John T. Crestwell, Jr. is Associate Minister at Unitarian Universalist Church of Annapolis. Other than his duties of preaching, teaching, and counseling, he leads the PathWork Adult Religious Education program, as well as overseeing social justice initiatives, including being

the Director of Outreach for the Unitarian Universalist Legislative Ministry of Maryland.

He is formerly the minister of Davies Memorial UU Church in Camp Springs, Maryland, where he assisted the congregation in expanding into a multiracial congregation. Under his leadership, Davies was 40% racially diverse.

He currently serves on the National Cancer Institute Institutional Review Board under the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Maryland. He is formerly a board member of the Church of the Larger Fellowship (CLF) and the Unitarian Universalist Legislative Ministry of Maryland.

He has also been an adjunct professor at Potomac College in Washington, DC, teaching Comparative Religion, Ethics, and Public Speaking. John also hosts an Internet podcast: "The Barbershop" political radio show on local and national issues during the Maryland General Assembly.

He is author of the books, Conversations: The Hidden Truth That Keeps The World From Being At Peace, published in 2001, and also The Charge of the Chalice in 2007, which tells the story of Davies Memorial's growth in racial diversity. John is also a contributing author in two Skinner House books: The Growing Church: Keys to Congregational Vitality, as well as The Arc of the Universe Is Long: Unitarian Universalists, Anti-Racism and the Journey from Calgary.

* Prior to ministry, Rev. John worked in marketing and advertising. He has three children.

Religious Exploration News

hen I first became a youth advisor in my congregation in Bowie some 20 years ago, I was fairly new to Unitarian Universalism. I had long ago left behind the religions of my childhood – Catholicism and "bornagain" Christianity – but remained among the unchurched that saw little need for organized religion. Still, I felt there was something missing in my life.

At the time, I was a reporter and editor for The Associated Press in Baltimore and often spent my Sunday mornings working. My husband, Ken, who discovered Unitarian Universalism many years earlier, had been trying to get me involved in the Bowie congregation. So when he asked if I could work with the youth group, which met Sunday evenings, I ran out of excuses and signed on. It turned out to be one of those decisions that started me down an exciting new path.

I discovered I really enjoyed working with youth. We talked about our beliefs and how we could make a difference in the world as we explored life's big questions. Together, we also learned about Unitarian Universalism and I realized at last I had found my church home after many years of wandering in a spiritual desert. I also found a kindred spirit in my co-leader, a gifted writer who went to become an inspiring director of religious education and my mentor.



Since then, I've taught children of all ages, led adult religious education classes, and served as interim director of lifespan growth and learning at the Columbia Unitarian Universalist

Congregation and now here at Paint Branch Unitarian Universalist Church. What a wonderful journey it's been – one that started with the simple step of becoming involved in religious exploration.

I'd like to encourage you to consider being a part of the wonderful religious exploration here at PBUUC. Although it's only May, we are already thinking about next year's programs and classes for children, youth and adults and are looking for people who feel called to this wonderful and transforming work.

Dr. Barry Andrews, the minister of religious education at the UU Congregation of Shelter Rock in Long Island, NY, provides a good description of the qualities we're looking for, in a recent essay, "The Soul Only Avails: Teaching as a Spiritual Act." http://archive.uua.org/re/reach/teaching/the_soul_only_avails.html.

"The essential qualities of a good church school teacher are a love of children, a sense of wonder about life, empathy and the ability to listen, and a willingness more to share who you are than what you know," Andrews says. "Above all, teachers are mentors and companions of children as they undertake their religious journeys in life."

Andrews goes on to say that teaching religious exploration is a spiritual practice that requires "a certain discipline or adherence to fundamental principles" and lists seven essential to the practice. They include: respect for children, be true to yourself, promote community, make it sacred, cultivate your soul, grow in your faith and put down roots.

Teaching religious exploration and working with youth has given me a wonderful chance to share and deepen my own faith, learn from others, and be continually refreshed and renewed by the wonder and hope of children and youth. I hope you'll consider getting involved in religious exploration at PBUUC. It's an experience that keeps on giving both to others and to you!



Diversity/Anti-Racism Transformation Team (DARTT) News & Events

BUILDING A COMMUNITY THROUGH SONG

n Saturday, April 3, the DARTTeam hosted a long anticipated guest to Paint Branch: Dr. Ysaye Barnwell. This member of both All Souls, Unitarian and the popular folksy-soulful music group, 'Sweet Honey in the Rock,' gives regular workshops throughout DC/MD/VA that aim to encourage people to integrate the gift of song/singing/music into their everyday lives in profound ways. Set in the main meeting room of the church, the workshop began with Reverend Teichert introducing Dr. Barnwell. Among other things, Reverend Teichert noted that, while music has always saturated Dr. Barnwell's life, she had actually made her formal career/living (prior to joining 'Sweet Honey in the Rock' presumably) in fields that applied her doctoral expertise in science-related areas. In my experience, such double-skill and/or talent are quite unusual/impressive. Hence, my interest in her was particularly peaked.



Dr. Barnwell's overall 'lesson plan' involved our metaphorically 'time traveling' with her through the path that the ancestors of African-Americans took from their West African homelands to the Americas. Hence, we started in Africa, made our way to the Caribbean, the Southeastern regions of the US, and finally, the Civil Rights Era. Each batch of

songs was interspersed with rich contextual narration/understanding from Dr. Barnwell. Among the first batch comprised of songs derived from Africa, one piece stood out for me. It was composed by people who live in the African rainforest and it literally and beautifully seemed to mimic the cacophony of the insects, leaves, animals, regular rainfall, etc., that are typically associated with life therein. Dr. Barnwell commented that these same people frame their rainforest home as their God. She then challenged us to imagine how the people throughout the world might treat the environment if we all framed it in such a sacred light.

Upon completion of the first batch of songs, we proceeded to the Caribbean. The piece that was highlighted here was composed in Haiti. It is sung in French and one line, as translated by Dr. Barnwell, leads the singer to soulfully call upon God to 'dwell in his/her heart.' Dr. Barnwell noted that that work is significant to her because the citizens of Haiti have been through a lot of tragedy, both in terms of recent earthquake-related hardships AND (implicitly) the long tradition of inhospitable treatment they've received from their Western Hemispheric neighbors since their ancestors' famous successful revolt against slavery. From there, Dr. Barnwell led us into understanding and singing 'Spirituals' the sacred work/life songs of those who were enslaved in the Southern United States. Interestingly, her take on these songs is that they were actually means by which the slaves maintained their basic West African spiritual aesthetic (hidden behind an Old Testament focus). Such syncretism, she asserted, was a crucial help for them in enduring the dehumanizing treatment/identities that were imposed upon them in America

Dr. Barnwell then guided us toward deeper understanding and appreciation of the Civil Rights Era reality/songs. This culminated in our singing 'We Shall Overcome' while spontaneously, beautifully, and touchingly, joining hands and encircling her. The event was complemented by wonderful weather and food that enabled indoor AND outdoor dining, and great conversation at lunch. Overall, the workshop was a very enriching experience for me that I would recommend to any and everyone!


