### The Minister's mUUsings...

o you remember the mini-town hall meetings held by your Board of Trustees back in December and January regarding Reclaiming Our Space in the RE Building after the departure of the Paint Branch Montessori School?

At those meetings, excitement and energy grew as we brainstormed ways to use the newly liberated space. Well, the opportunity to put that excitement and energy to use is upon us!

The "Move-Out" is headed by Muriel Morisey and Abby Crowley, working with our office staff, to identify which furnishings are ours and press upon the tenants the terms of the lease, which commits them to be out by June 18. If you were involved in refurnishing the building after the 2004 fire, and made purchases, please contact Church Administrator Daniel Everitt, Muriel or Abby.

So, the space should soon be empty and ready for our sprucing up, refurnishing, and re-decorating! A "Move-In" team is now forming of people to organize that effort (for which there is an adequate budget) over the summer months, so please contact Vice Chair Bettie Young if you are happy to help (301-490-4957 – bettieyoung@hotmail.com).

(If you have read thus far, thank you! The first five people to call the church office and leave a message on my line (301-937-3666 x 1) saying "Hi, this is (your name) calling to tell you that I read your June Branches article" will get a small chalice for your home use.)

Beyond the "Move-In" is the question: how shall we use our newly liberated space? At the town hall meetings, I recall the energy around ideas such as giving it a UU identity for our own children, youth and adult RE programs; using it to serve (and get to know) our nearby neighbors, such as with an arts studio or summer day camp; hosting a GLBT-friendly youth program; developing it as a retreat site; and renting out a couple rooms as a 24/7 rental (whose space we would not use for our own programming).

It's not clear yet how the congregation will choose which of the brainstormed ideas to put into action, in what order, when and how, but I am sure we will move forward!

To the end of getting to know our neighbors, I and two members of our Diversity Anti-Racism Transformation Team (Tricia Most and Kweli Powell) recently met with Principal Michael Brooks of High Point High School, which is less than a mile north of PBUUC on Powder Mill Road. It was a most favorable meeting. He welcomed the congregation's involvement in quite a number of ways. Of all the ideas that came up, two struck me as good ways to start: staffing tables at their Career Night with our members willing to talk with students about their line of work and providing community service opportunities for students (possibly in conjunction with DARTT's plans for us on MLK Day?). Stay tuned!

### Notes from the Board Chair

ach June, the members of Paint Branch UU Church gather for the church's Annual Meeting. One of the highlights of this meeting is the election of new members of our Board of Trustees. The Board is our church's only elected governing body; it has key responsibilities for the church's finances and works closely with the staff and minister to support the operations and programs of the church. Board service is not all hard work, however; there are usually summer and winter retreats and occasional Board lunches where we get to know each other and have fun.

Any member in good standing is eligible to serve on the Board. At a minimum, service on the Board means attending monthly Board meetings, participating in the Congregational and Annual meetings, and working closely with one or more of the committees or groups within the congregation. Terms of service on the Board typically last three years, and there is no obligation to become the chair or serve in another leadership position unless one really wants to.

Right now, the Nominating Committee, under the capable leadership of Kate Brett, is actively looking for candidates who are willing to serve on the Board of Trustees for the new church year that begins July 1, 2010. If you have not previously served on the Board, or even if you have served many years ago, I hope that you will take a moment to think about the possibility of Board service for this coming year. The Nominating Committee is looking to fill five vacant Trustee positions and my understanding is that several of these critically important volunteer positions are still open.

Having now served on the Board for three years, I have come to believe that every member of this church ought to consider serving at least one term on the Board of Trustees. Each of us has unique talents and gifts to share with the congregation, and each of us brings a unique and valuable perspective on the issues facing the church. Serving on a Board also provides great opportunities for personal and professional growth in areas such as leadership development, conflict resolution, finance and budgeting, and organizational management. I sincerely hope that you will consider serving on the PBUUC Board of Trustees this coming year.

### Religious Exploration News

ur Seventh Unitarian Universalist Principle talks about the interdependent web of which we are all part. Often, I think of it in terms of our relationship to the earth. But it also applies to our relationships with one another. We cannot afford to ignore people, cultures or traditions that are different than our own. We are all part of the web of life.

I've been thinking more about this aspect of our interdependent web since attending a thought-provoking training for religious educators on Multicultural Religious Education last month, led by Natalie Fenimore, the Director of Religious Exploration at the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Fairfax. Some of you may know her as a past DRE here at Paint Branch Unitarian Universalist Church.

Multicultural Religious Exploration is not just about race and ethnicity but also about gender, class and physical abilities. It helps us take in the views and perspectives of others, eradicates stereotypes, broadens our own cultural perspectives and helps others hold on to who they are and understand and accept others, Ms. Fenimore said.

James A. Banks, a major theorist in Multicultural Education, says, "The goal of Multicultural Education is an education for freedom that is essential in today's ethnically polarized and troubled world. It promotes freedom, abilities, and skills to cross ethnic and cultural boundaries to participation in other cultures and groups. It should help people develop the knowledge, attitudes, and skills to participate in a democratic and free society. At its heart, Multicultural Education is "education for social justice."

It also helps prepare us and our children for the diverse world in which we live, where the minority population of the United States is expected to rise to 42 percent of our population by the year 2050, according to U.S. Census Bureau projections.

During the training, we talked about the importance of knowing the stories, both personal and institutional, of who we are, and the need to pay attention to the silences, noticing who's left out, ignored, or avoided, in our lives and the lives of our congregations.

We also talked about the need to engage in critical reflection on the insights of the stories uncovered and the silences heard. We were also reminded that diversity brings not only a new richness but can also engender some grief and anxiety that we need to find ways to talk about.

PBUUC's Diversity and Anti-Racism Transformation Team, known as DARTT, has already done and continues to do a lot of transforming work on diversity and I look forward to working with them as we move forward during this interim period for religious exploration.

Some of the ways that we can send the message that diversity is welcomed, honored and affirmed in our RE program include:

- examining our RE materials for biases including those relating to race, sexual orientation, physical ability, gender, age and class,
- analyzing books and stories we use to ensure they accurately reflect the realities of a multicultural society,
- including stories and songs from many cultures and many traditions,
- ensuring diversity is reflected in our teaching teams, committees and choice of guest speakers,
- posting pictures and posters that represent a variety of races, cultures, families and ethnicities,
- dealing with differences are identified and dealt with in a positive way,
- communicating to our children and youth that we can work to change unjust situations, and,
- making social justice projects, especially community-based ones, an important part of our RE program.

I welcome your thoughts and ideas on creating a multicultural religious exploration program and encourage you to join in this important work.

### Financial Notes

am both sad and pleased to say that this is my last FINANCIAL NOTES article. For the past five years, I have been honored and privileged to be your Treasurer. It has been a great pleasure for me to do this work. (Money is easy for me - but don't ask me to cook a meal or teach Church School.) But no one should continue in the same position for too long and five years is enough. So, on July 1, Mike Stark will become your Treasurer and I will find other ways to contribute to PBUUC.

Over the five years, I have attended virtually every Board meeting and I have had the chance to observe the dedicated people who have given time, talent and attention to all aspects of PBUUC. Through thick and thin, they have carried on and made the hard decisions; from dealing with the aftermath of the fire in my first year, to terminating the lease for the Montessori School in my last year (a courageous and right decision, given current and potential problems of the school).

I have also seen and benefited from the dedicated work so many people do for the congregation. Some of it is largely unseen. John Bartoli keeps track of the Scrip and buys new cards when they are needed. Elizabeth Scheiman, Will Snyder, Becky Nation, Julie Dahmer and Rene McDonald work in the office to answer the phone and do a million small tasks that need doing to keep us humming along. Penny O'Brien always comes early and stays late to help out in the kitchen. These tasks are important to us all, yet they largely go unnoticed. So I am proud to be a part of this church and proud to call many of you friends.

I leave you in somewhat of a financial bind. The budget this year is currently at a deficit. If you have not paid up your pledge, I hope you can do so promptly. We need to save all our reserves to meet the challenges of the next few years.



Next year will be even more difficult with the departure of the Montessori School. The Budget Leadership Team (BLT) has worked hard on the budget and the Board will be finalizing it soon. There is a possibility that we will pay off a part of our mortgage principal. If we can do this, it would have the effect of reducing our budget obligations for many years into the future. \$1,000 paid now not only reduces our mortgage by \$1,000, it saves an additional \$780 in interest costs over the life of the mortgage - a double whammy if you will. This in turn allows us to put our resources where they matter - into programs.

I know you will be in good hands with Mike. He is smart and quick and he is resigning most of his other church work to take this on. I know he will do a great job. Mike, it's all yours!

### BEST EVER UNITED NATIONS INTERGENERATIONAL SEMINAR: REPORT FROM NEW YORK CITY



Picture a room that looks out on the UN headquarters; flags of all the member states are blowing in the wind; the room is full of over 200 UUs. Half of them are high school and early college students; the other half are older. And

half of both age groups are from the US, while the others are Canadians. Even if none of the scheduled speakers showed up there would be constant good discussions of the topic for this year's Intergenerational Seminars: "Ethical Aspects of a Climate Treaty." People come prepared every year, especially the younger crowd.

The first day of presentations was predominantly an overview of the science of climate change, given by two senior investigators from Rutgers University. The second day we had a panel of UN officials who had prepared working papers for the negotiators at the Copenhagen Treaty Conference in December 2009. They left us with the view that a satisfying amount of progress was made on extremely thorny issues. Lowell and I have gone to at least four of these seminars. I hope I can get to at least ten more.

### NETWORK OF SPIRITUAL PROGRESSIVES HOLDS NATIONAL CONFERENCE IN WASHINGTON, JUNE 11-14

Join liberals and progressives at a national conference which will develop strategies for the Obama years that will move us towards creating a more caring society, both for each other and for our earth home. Believing we need to redefine "progress" as moving towards a society focused not on maximizing profits but on generating love and kindness, and supporting ethical, caring and environmentally sensitive behavior, this conference will take those values and consider how to apply them to new directions for our country. A small group of PBUUC members have been attending the monthly NSP meetings and have read Rabbi Lerner's books and articles. His ideas are eminently practical and seem so obvious when the context is supplied that we wonder why anyone has reservations. The meetings are generally the fourth Wednesday of the month in Room 1 of the Religious Exploration Building.

Resisting the corporate takeover of American society is another conference theme - with a call for the *Environmental and Social Responsibility Amendment* to the U.S. Constitution. It would require corporations with incomes of over \$100 million per year to demonstrate their environmental and social responsibility to a jury of ordinary citizens every five years in order to maintain their corporate charter. Electoral reform is also needed to reduce the power of money in politics - especially in light of the Supreme Court's recent decision in *Citizens United* - which opened the door to unlimited spending by corporations in our elections.

Other issues to be discussed at the conference include immigration reform and an end to the harassment of immigrants, Middle East peace - focusing on a settlement of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, and countering the idea of tax-cutting for the rich and protection for corporations with a vision of a society founded on love and caring.

Speakers include an array of well known and respected progressives such as Bill Moyer, David Korten, Congressmen Keith Ellison, Dennis Kucinich, Rabbi Michael Lerner, Rev. Brian McLaren, Sister Joan Chittister, and Jeremy Ben-Ami from J Street - along with many others. Flyers about this important national conference are in the church lobby. Our Paint Branch Social Action Committee is proud to support the Network of Spiritual Progressives. And welcomes its Maryland Chapter which has been meeting at Paint Branch monthly since the last NSP national conference was held at All Souls Unitarian Church in Washington D.C. a few years ago. SAC members hope that many Paint Branchers will join them in volunteering for and attending this important national conference. It will be held on Capitol Hill at the Lutheran Church of the Reformation at 212 East Capitol Street between June 11-14

Upcoming beneficiaries include CROP/Church World Service for Hunger, Waterkeepers Alliance and the Rainbow Youth Alliance, a ministry to GLBT and questioning youth of the UU Church of Rockville.

### UUA BOARD OF TRUSTEES ASK 2010 GA DELEGATES TO VOTE TO MOVE 2012 GA FROM PHOENIX

The UUA Board has approved a resolution to ask 2010 General Assembly (GA) delegates to vote to withdraw from Phoenix for the 2012 GA. PBUUC's Denominational Affairs Committee will be asking the congregation to instruct our delegates on either voting their conscience or to vote for or against the resolution.

The UUA Board's action comes in response to the passage of an Arizona law cracking down on illegal immigration which many fear will lead to increased racial profiling and civil liberties violations.

According to the UUA Treasurer and Chief Financial Officer, the UUA would be subject to penalties of up to \$615,000 if it cancels its contracts with Phoenix hotels after June 15. According to the resolution the 2010 GA delegates will consider, this money would be offset by funds raised by UU congregations, although it is unclear how the resolution would raise this money—or the "equal or greater amount" it also pledges to raise to support public witness efforts in Arizona—without cutting funding for other UUA programs and services.

Trustees opposed to a boycott cite the need to stand in solidarity with the people of Arizona; the importance of honoring commitments; and the likelihood of harming the hospitality industry, which employs many of the people potentially affected by SB1070.

Trustees favoring a boycott said that the UUA would be standing with other groups that are boycotting the state. (Just before the meeting, the National Council of La Raza, the largest national Hispanic civil rights and advocacy organization in the country, called for a boycott of Arizona. They were joined by the Asian American Justice Center, the Center for Community Change, the League of United Latin American Citizens, and the Service Employees International Union, among others.) A boycott would also be a way of asserting UU values in the world, and would avert the possibility that UUs coming to the conference might be targeted.

Reaction to the UUA Board of Trustees not making the decision has also been mixed, with some castigating the UUA Board for tossing the difficult decision into the hands of delegates who may not be fully informed or prepared to vote and who may not have time to solicit their congregations' input. Others applaud the UUA Board for involving a wider range of voices in this significant vote.

### LEARNING TO TWO-STEP

[In this column Jessica Sharp writes about a specific experience that took place in November of 2006 during her yearlong cross-country road trip.]

Two-Step and Crazy Freddie. There was Zydeco music and cold beer in a dark room. And there was me

I knew going in that I would be out of place, but I did it anyway. After 11 months on the road I had gotten used to being an enigma, as unfamiliar faces usually are in America's smallest towns. But when I walked into T. Willie's Bar and Lounge, however, I wasn't just unfamiliar. I was white.

Baldwin, Louisiana is a nearly all-black village 90 miles west of New Orleans, so I planned on getting some strange looks. But beyond that, I had no answers. Would they be nice to me? Would they kick me out? Would they say mean things?



You know that moment in a movie where a lot of activity is going on, then someone walks in or says something and there's a "record scratch" sound, followed by everyone freezing and staring? Well, it was like

that, except in real life. Glasses stopped clinking. Beer bottles were suspended in air mid-sip. So I smiled, pretended not to notice, and ordered a Miller Lite from the old woman behind the bar. She handed it to me wordlessly.

Just when I was starting to think that I would leave without making any new friends, he came over.

"I'm Leroy!" he said brightly. "What are you doing here?"

I laughed. "Just hanging out. I'm Jessica, I'm a travel writer."

"That's cool, baby, that's cool!" We chatted for a few minutes, during which everyone in the room seemed to take a deep breath and go back to normal. "You like music?" he asked, and I nodded. "Two-Step! Turn them speakers on and let's show this girlie how to dance!"

A Curtis Mayfield look-alike in suspenders and a straw hat turned on some modern Zydeco with a hip-hop beat, and Leroy began to twirl me around the 'dance floor,' which was really just any space not taken up by a barstool or a table.

"Like this, Jess, yeah, that's right!" As we passed other patrons he introduced me. "This here's Janie. And this is Old Roger."

An older gentleman cut in on our dance with awkward steps. "And this is Crazy Freddie," Leroy said, handing me off. Then he whispered in my ear, "No, really, he's crazy. Don't get upset about a word he says, he's just touched in the head." So as Crazy Freddie mumbled to me about how he was going to marry me, the little cracker, the little cracker, I just laughed and tried to keep up with his steps.

"You have to stay all night," everyone told me. "Leroy gonna be DJ'ing some *down-home* music tonight! You stayin'?"

"Of course!" I said. "I wouldn't want to be anywhere else."

They gave me directions to a motel, told me to "check in and hurry back, we 'bout ta feed ya!" and then filled me full of sweet oysters and shrimp po'boys upon my return. Later that night, after we had all danced for hours, Two-Step told me, "You a good girl. You come on back sometime."

I just smiled. I had my answers.
