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# The Minister's mUUsings...

In congregational life and in our own individual lives as well, there are times when we sense change is needed, is soon to happen, or is already underway, but we don't yet know the shape or scope of that change. We don't yet know what it will mean or set in motion and we surely don't yet know how that change will change *us*. It's a numinous moment, a "between-times" kind of time, like the moment just before you raise your foot to step over the threshold into what will be your new home.

In "A Walk" by Rainer Maria Rilke (1875 -1926 / Prague / Czech Republic), translated by Robert Bly, such a time is described. I love this poem.

My eyes already touch the sunny hill. going far ahead of the road I have begun. So we are grasped by what we cannot grasp; it has its inner light, even from a distance-

and charges us, even if we do not reach it, into something else, which, hardly sensing it, we already are; a gesture waves us on answering our own wave... but what we feel is the wind in our faces.

We are in such a time here at Paint Branch Unitarian Universalist Church. It's the end of the "church year" which always has its own "in flux" character, as summer services and informal Sunday activities for children begin, terms of lay leaders' office end, and vacation weeks pop up here and there for many people scattering us until the Sunday after Labor Day when larger numbers of us will gather again. But that's not all that I'm observing.

The decision last fall to not renew the lease of the Paint Branch Montessori School is far behind us now, the financial fall-out of that decision was accounted for in the budget adopted for the fiscal year that begins on July 1, and now all of the many rooms used by the School are empty of their belongings (and very quiet)! Gorgeous spacious spaces are now revealed, with lovely woodland views. They await our transformation! Stay tuned for ways that you can help make that transformation happen, led by Polly Pettit and Peter Dowling (deep gratitude to them and all those who help out!).

Our "eyes already touch the sunny hill" far ahead in the direction in which we are already headed. We are "grasped by what we cannot [quite] grasp," but aspects of it are emerging. Just to mention a few, having to do with worship...The experience of trying out different models for the Sharing of our Joys and Sorrows has already changed us some, even though we don't yet know which we'll adopt. Come fall, we will further embrace the gift of being a "multi-generational" community (and simplify the arrival of families) by starting every Sunday service with the children and youth in the Meeting House for a brief period after which they will leave for their Religious Exploration classes in the RE Building (except, as in the past, on "All Ages" Sundays when they remain in the Meeting House for the entire service).

Even though we may be most aware of the "wind in our faces" (the challenges) along the road of change, if we pay attention to the "inner light" of the changes underway, and note where our actions are reinforced by the actions of others, where a "gesture waves us on answering our own wave," we can move ahead with confidence and creativity.

Already looking forward to Ingathering Sunday, September 12.

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# **Financial Notes**

First, for those who are paying attention there is a new name at the bottom of this column. Ellen Cotts has completed five years as our Treasurer, and she has restored order to our books and our procedures for maintaining them. I will be following her approach very closely; there may be minor details where I'll do things differently, but one doesn't change something that works well.

What one does with something that works well is to document it so it is repeatable. This is because I do not really want this job for 5 years. The first step is to write a guide to finance for the congregation and to write procedures for the Treasurer so that others can understand Ellen's (and my) approach. After that I intend to document the other finance related jobs around the church, ranging from counting the collection on Sunday to being on the Finance Committee.

You won't be completely done with Ellen, though; I will be away from late July until early September as Resident Officer in Florida, overseeing my project's main contractor. Fortunately, this is a rotating assignment, so I'll be back! Ellen has graciously agreed to cover for me in the meantime.

Next year is going to be a tough year financially, as we will have substantially reduced income. The Budget Leadership Team did not assume heroic and probably unsustainable fundraising efforts, opting for belt-tightening on the expense side of the ledger. We do have a balanced budget, but will need to be careful not to exceed budgets for anything short of an emergency.

I do expect that by this time next year we will have sorted through all the recommendations of various task forces and will be generating rental income in a way that does not interfere with our church's ministry, especially our children's religious exploration. So while this year will be tough, our balanced budget will put us in a good position for future years by not digging a deeper hole to climb out of.

## BOARD APPROVES BUDGET FOR CHURCH YEAR 2010-2011

The Board of Trustees approved the budget recommended by the Budget Leadership Team (BLT) at its final regular meeting of the year. The BLT made further revisions to the recommended budget after its June 6 Hearing and its presentation at the June 13 Annual Congregational Meeting. The final recommended budget reflected reduced income based on some pledges for the new year that were revised downward.

The BLT was unable to make any changes to its major proposals. Copies of the final budget will be available from the new Treasurer, Mike Stark. Committee chairs and activity group leaders will receive e-mails, letting them know what their operating budget is. The final budget:

- Reduces the hours of the Church Administrator from fulltime to part time;
- Includes virtually no operating funds for most committees and activities;
- Eliminates the fair share dues payment of \$56 per person and \$26 per person to the Unitarian Universalist Association and Joseph Priestley District for one year;
- Makes a bridge loan from the Roland Bequest, (a legacy left by a deceased member to aid people who are homeless and in dire need) in order to pay down the mortgage to increase our cash flow by nearly \$19,000 annually. This loan will be repaid.



As the church begins to realize income from rentals, the new Board will have the opportunity to consider revisions.

Before I get into the heart of the administrative concerns, it's important to express some real gratitude to the following persons:

- Rebecca Birnie, Administrative Assistant, and Ellen Cotts, church treasurer, for their continued assistance, financial wizardry, love of detail, and perseverance;
- our unbeatable staff and the Board of Trustees, in particular to Rev. Diane Teichert, and Jonathan

Mawdsley, for their important support of and insights into administration.

As many of you know, despite having an excellent stewardship campaign, budgetary constraints resulted in a very difficult decision to reduce the Church Administrator's hours from 40 to 30 hours per week for all of FY 2010-2011. One resulting effect of this decision will be to close the church office on Mondays, at least for July and August. The office will be open Tuesday-Friday from 9 am - 4:30 pm beginning July 6.

Another effect will be to re-evaluate how to make the best use of the total available hours spent doing church administration, (30 by the church administrator, 10 by the administrative assistant, and 20 hours donated by church volunteers.) The following questions will be looked at: Can tasks currently done by the church administrator be shifted to the administrative assistant and can more clerical duties be given to the office volunteers? Can more volunteers be recruited? Can some projects and tasks be placed in the hands of relevant committees? What services and tasks will have to be let go of, at least for the coming year? All avenues are being explored and information will be sent out as it becomes available.

The summer will see a transition to a new church management software program called Church Windows. It is considerably more user friendly then our current database software and will enable us to do more; two examples being – update the congregational directory with greater ease and frequency, as well as track participation of members, friends and their children in the numerous activities that are offered. The office staff will be using the summer to learn the new system and become familiar with all its features, in time to put it to work before September.

If you are wondering how you can help, consider donating some time to the church office, your favorite committee or event, particularly when the church year gets back into full swing in September. Mark your calendars for the Involvement's Fair which is slated for our Ingathering Sunday on September 12. You will have an opportunity to see the full array of activities and events that need your particular gifts, your special touch. # Diversity/Anti-Racism Transformation Team (DARTT) News & Events

### HEART-FELT APPLICATION OF OUR PRINCIPLES

n Sunday, January 24, the film 'With All Deliberate Speed: Brown vs. Board of Education' was presented at PBUUC by Polly Pettit. The discussion that followed led to a keen interest in our church's partnering with nearby High Point High School. As some may have heard, since then Reverend Diane Teichert has recently led a committee to meet with Michael Brooks; the principle of High Point. The meeting went well, and many in our congregation responded with well wishes and insights when Diane reported the many ways that he said we might help out there.

Since then, at the June planning meeting for the Diversity/Anti-Racism Transformation Team, it was brought to our attention that the High Point Parent Teacher Student Association (PTSA) was at risk of dissolving. Upon hearing this, we decided to send a committee representing PBUUC to attend and lend support toward efforts to keep the PTSA together. The resulting committee of two people, Tricia Most and Kweli Powell, was, therefore, in attendance at the 7:00 pm meeting at the school on Tuesday, June 15.

The meeting was extremely well attended, not simply by parents, but by members of the community. In fact, Principal Brooks repeatedly expressed his gratitude that we, members of PBUUC, came to take part in the event. He even described the prior meeting with PBUUC during which Rev. Diane Teichert originally offered our church's assistance.

The best news of the evening was that the PTSA was indeed salvaged. New representatives stepped forward to replace those whose children had graduated, and veteran officers offered helping hands to show the new recruits the ropes.

Notably, Principal Brooks presented a list of suggestions as to how the PTSA could assist the school. Some of these suggestions, such as "beautification efforts" led to conversations about the details of community service criteria; requirements that PBUUC "deck repair", etc. could likely fulfill.

Another topic that came up was the fact that local professional High Point alumni might be a desirable community from which to solicit career guidance for students. This idea of local professionals acting as mentors and/or way-showers to the students is also a niche that we Paint Branchers could likely help fill.

Our "diversity-justice-equity" sensitivities were aroused by the relative lack of participation of the several Latina moms present, whose attendance required them to even bring their young children. In a school in which 40%+ of the students come from backgrounds in which Spanish is the central cultural language, we left the meeting with the sense that more could have been done to include non-native English speakers in the dialogue.

In sum, we left with the sense that our church's partnership with High Point High School will provide us with the opportunity to grow profoundly in terms of practical, heart-felt application of our principles; particularly with regard to respecting people's INHERENT worth and dignity, regardless of race, nationality, ethnicity, class, and/or linguistic background. It will, therefore, require not only acceptance of one another, but STRONG encouragement towards spiritual growth in terms of applying our faith in our community. *Kweli Powell*

Taking time to read the articles in advance allows the group to share the same information and facts about the topic at hand in addition to sharing from their own personal experiences. We meet during Enrichment Hour on second Sundays and we welcome all to join in as we engage our minds and our hearts in exploring and sharing both the challenges and the opportunities of personal and collective transformation to embrace diversity in all its forms. Maryland has moved from 44<sup>th</sup> to 16<sup>th</sup> in the nation for providing health care to lowincome adults and is well on the way to achieving the goal of securing quality, affordable health care for all Marylanders! ### **CROP WALK COLLECTION**

CROP Walk 2010 will be the beneficiary of our special collection on July 25. Becky and Dave Nation joined the 368 Walkers (and 15 dogs) that walked around Lake Artemesia on May 2. I received a certificate for the oldest walker (91 years). Last year Paint Branch donors gave \$781. Of the total collection, 25% will support the local Help-By-Phone emergency food pantries throughout the area, which helped 5,500 people last year. The need is critical due to the harsh economic conditions. Church World Service sponsors Crop Walks across the nation to meet hunger emergencies here as well as internationally. Agricultural training is offered to farmers in various countries and this year an emphasis on access to safe water is receiving emphasis. Women may walk 6 to 8 miles in certain places to carry water that often weighs 48 pounds.

### ETHNIC DINNERS, TIMES TWO: PBUUC NEEDS YOU!

his is a tale of *two* dinners, one with *two* committees and *two* themes; the other with *two* problems. And *two* advance opportunities for you to decide where you can help.

There are normally 3 dinners per church year in October, February and May. Each is preceded by a menu-planning meeting, lots of publicity and three Sundays selling tickets and recruiting cooks and volunteers. Each relies on a great menu, 60-70 attendees, 35-40 cooks/volunteers and a busy leftover sale, to be successful. Success equals fantastic food, the magic of UUs in social gathering, and around \$700 net proceeds, per dinner.

The May 2009 dinner, *Chile*, had to be cancelled due to conflict with Candidating Weekends and was rescheduled in October, hence, only 2 dinners in that fiscal year. *Senegal*, held in February 2010, almost cancelled due to snow, was smaller than normal. Now, the dinner which would have occurred in May 2010 has been intentionally postponed until

August 28. Its theme, Maryland Locavore, requires holding it in crab and harvest season. Being organized jointly by the Ethnic Dinner and Green Team committees, it will include traditional Maryland foods, fresh and in season, some from our own gardens and nearby farmers' markets. It will be held earlier in the day so children can attend and maybe help provide and prepare some of the food. We anticipate a large attendance (you're coming, aren't you?), great menu, local wines, and special activities for the kids. So obviously, we need lots of help, cooking, setting up, cleaning up, and organizing stuff for the kids. If you have a garden, a favorite farmers' market, some Maryland related music, ideas for kids, appropriate recipes, a good source for crabs, or ideas for something we haven't thought of, let's hear from you!

However, by moving this dinner from May to August, we moved it from FY 09/10 to 10/11, so once again, we've held only 2 dinners in 2009/2010. To make up for this double assault on essential income at absolutely the worst time, we want to hold 4 dinners in 2010/2011 – August, October, February, and May.

The problem is October. Cathy Helmold, my co-conspirator in the dinners, and I will be traveling to Portugal with Nancy Boardman October 6-23. So, no October dinner? Wrong! It's already on the church calendar, Saturday, October. 30. We *promise* to hold a menu-planning meeting in September, get the tickets made, print all the sign-up forms, do all the publicity, and be back in time to sell tickets October 24 and help cook for the dinner. <u>All we ask</u> is that a couple people agree to set up a table in the lobby to sell tickets and recruit volunteers on the first two Sundays – October 10 and 17. If you don't know how, come help or just observe when we sell tickets for August's dinner. It's not rocket science, and the forms will guide you through the process.

I said this dinner has two problems. The second is, it needs a theme. Two have been proposed. The date suggests *Transylvania* (*Romania*) with which we could observe our UU roots and have some Halloween fun (costumes anyone?). The other is *Mexico*, now celebrating their bicentennial this year. Or, let's hear other suggestions. # THIS MAY BE YOUR LAST PRINT ISSUE OF THE BRANCHES NEWSLETTER!!

# Beginning next month, with the August edition, we will begin sending the newsletter <u>only by email</u> to all members and friends for whom we have an email address.

Over the past few months, letters have been sent out to members and friends, and announcements have been posted in the Sunday bulletin, regarding the Board-instigated "Branches Going Green" project, in which our newsletter would be sent out principally via email, beginning with the July issue. This deadline has been moved to begin with the August issue. The church office has also begun placing telephone calls to:

- members and friends who have an email address on file, yet receive a printed version of the newsletter, asking them to consider choosing an electronic version of the newsletter rather than a printed edition mailed to their homes,
- members and friends for whom we do not have an email address on file; asking them if they have an email address and would consider receiving an electronic version of the newsletter, in lieu of a printed one in the mail. <u>Members and friends who do not have access to email, or for specific reasons have requested to begin/continue receiving the "snail mail" edition of the newsletter, will be mailed a printed Branches edition.
  </u>

By switching from a print edition to an email edition, we take a large step in embracing further our UU environmental values. Less paper and toner result in less overall waste, which reduces our impact on landfills. A substantial financial savings in lowering our production and postage costs is also gained. This is particularly important in this upcoming fiscal year, in which our revenue streams, outside of the generous pledges made for FY 2010-2011, have dropped significantly, and necessitated significant budgetary cuts in some areas of administration – the newsletter being one such area. If you or any member of your family wishes to receive and electronic version of Branches, send an email address for each individual to newsletter@pbuuc.org or call the church office at 301-937-3666 with this information.

Members and friends may continue receiving a printed edition by calling the church office and requesting a printed edition to be mailed. A large-print edition is available upon request. If a printed edition is requested, we ask the member to consider making a \$25.00 contribution to cover newsletter production and postage costs, as the FY 2010-2011 budget amount allocated for these areas was considerably reduced. This contribution is not mandatory, but anyone able to assist with a contribution would help us avoid going over budget. It is hoped that in future years, the financial situation will be such that a contribution need not be solicited for the newsletter. If, after repeated attempts to contact an individual, we do not specifically hear from those members and friends, for whom we have an email address, that a printed edition is desired, we will begin sending the electronic version of the newsletter and drop them from the mailing list. Your understanding and support of this effort is appreciated. If you wish to make this contribution, please send a check made out to PBUUC with "Branches subscription" in the memo line. Thank you in advance for your consideration. (*Thanks to those who were able to send in a contribution to help cover costs for this budget year.*)
